ANOTHER DUST STORM

In spite of the fact that our weaher men and others who assume to know the vagaries of the Panhandle weather, have said that our severe dust storms for this season were past, we experienced, what is pronounced by nearly one to be the worst we have ever had, Sunday night about 9:30 o'clock.

After the wind had blown all afternoon at a rather swift rate, it suddenly shifted to the north and ere anyone was aware of its coming, the dust storm was upon us in all its fury.

The most intense part of the storm lasted about two hours, but dust continued blowing rather heavily until near morning and there was still a dust screen in the air at daylight, and dust was piled everywhere where any projection presented to

Presumably not a house that was o well built that the fine silt did not find many places where it could shift through and rooms on the orth side of the houses had received so much that is covered competely, not only the floors but everything in the rooms and even clung to the walls and clung so tightly that it equired energetic brushing to get it off.

Visibility was so completely cut off hat a light could be seen more than half way across a street, and at that it was just a faint glow. People who were away from home found it necessary to remain away until the storm began to abate so that they oud see the road by the light of thir cars, provided they were driving. Those who were out afoot found it even worse, for it was not only impossible for them to see where they were going, but it was also almost suffocating and the dirt filled ones eyes until it was painful

On Monday morning all the housekeepers became very busy with Brooms, brushes, vacuum sweepers and some even resorted to shovels and pails in getting rid of the most plentiful accumulation of the dust, leaving the residue to be taken up with dust cloths and mops.

This power they said is similar to he substances found in blood which Inhibit bacteria. It is not, they exlained, the germicidal power of some lant Juices which has been known for iany years, but "a more subtle type of bacterial inhibiting substances."

EIFFEL STRUCTURE **TELEVISION TOWER**

Back in 1887-89 Alexandre Gustave Eiffel built the famous tower which bears his name for the International exposition in Parls. It was then regarded as a mere engineering "stunt." Sober engineers declared it was faultily built and predicted it would be razed. Nevertheless the Eiffel Tower

Today, states a writer in the Washngton Post, important as a meteorological and wireless station and guide for airmen, it still towers above Paris. A short time ago France added to its usefulness by making it a station for the broadcast of television programs.

An interlaced ironwork structure, the Eiffel Tower reaches a height of 984 feet. The many visitors who ascend, by stairway and elevator, to the circular balcony surrounding the glass pavilion which tops the tower can see 55 miles on clear days.

Until New York's Chrysler building came along in 1930, with its height of 1,046 feet, the Eiffel Tower was the world's tallest structure. Later, of course, the Empire State building topped both with 1,248 feet,

Rhine Touched England, Contour Map Revealed

The Rhine at one time formed the astern boundary of England and Scotland and would do so again if western Europe were elevated about 165 feet. This is revealed by a new contour map of the bed of the North sea prepared by R. G. Lewis and published in a recent issue of the Geographical Journal, an English publicaion. This man shows a clearly defined channel of the Rhine. When this channel was cut England was part of the continental land mass and the North sea was dry land. The Rhine flowed westward from its present mouth until it reached what is now the east coast of England and then flowed north and east past Scotland.

An elevation of only 100 feet would create in what is known as the Dogger banks in the North sea a great island about as big as the northera half of England. These shallow banks are believed to have been caused by the dropping of a terminal moraine by the continental ice sheet. This elevation also would provide a land bridge eastward from the Humber river to Denmark and also eliminate most of the English channel.

Meter Tests Driving Ability

FIND "CHAPARRAL" VALUABLE HARVEST

Millions of acres on both sides of th Rio Grande river are covered with stunted growths of trees and bushes called "chaparral." Formerly considered worthless, these plants may soon yield a rich harvest if plans of the Texas planning board materialize, says the Washington Post.

The board has found that the chaparral in the lower Rio Grande valley in cludes a large number of ebony trees Ebony is especially suited for gun stocks, and several arms manufactur ers are interested in obtaining a reg ular supply.

In the chaparral are also forests of mesquite, a bushy tree which covers one-third of Texas and most of north ern Mexico. Mesquite beans have been used as a substitute for coffee by Mexcans along the border for many dec ides. Range cattle also relish the beans. Now mesquite wood is com ng into favor for furniture.

A few years ago a plant was bull at Marathon, Texas, to manufacture rubber from the guayule shrub. Three million acres of the plant were har vested before the factory stopped running. Now a new crop of guayule has replaced the old and is ready for har-

Sun Made Ice

The manufacture of ice is one of the last things one would imagine the sun to be utilized for; yet that is the purpose for which a California man harhis Kingdom will be mentioned nesses it. The sun's rays strike a spherical metal ball and heat a reser ice just as it would in any gas or electric refrigerator. The radiator being spherical, it does not matter from which angle the sun shines. GRAVITY CHANGING, SCIENTISTS LEARN

The force of gravity, which keeps ocks, houses, and men from flying off he rotating earth like water or mud ties from the rapidly turning wheels of in auto, is changing noticeably in some places on our globe. A Soviet scientific expedition in the Caucasus has found inmistakable evidence in that region that over a period of years the pull at the earth's center on all matter around t has varied. Objects whose mass has cemained identical have fluctuated in veight. Since the pull of gravity comes rom exactly the center of the earth's total mass and becomes greater as this center is approached, it is thought the ariation detected must be due to igantic shifts of matter under the arth's crust which result in moving he earth's center of gravity.
