**Britain Slashes Buying
From United States**

LONDON, England, July 14. (AP)—Britain today sliced 25 per cent off her buying from dollar areas for this year in an attempt to ease the shortage of dollar exchange.

Sir Stafford Cripps, Chancellor of the Exchequer, told Commons Britains imports from the United States and other dollar areas will be limited to \$1,200,000,000 billion.

Robert P. Dupree, Assistant vice-president, First National Bank of Waco was the Wednesday Lion Luncheon speaker.

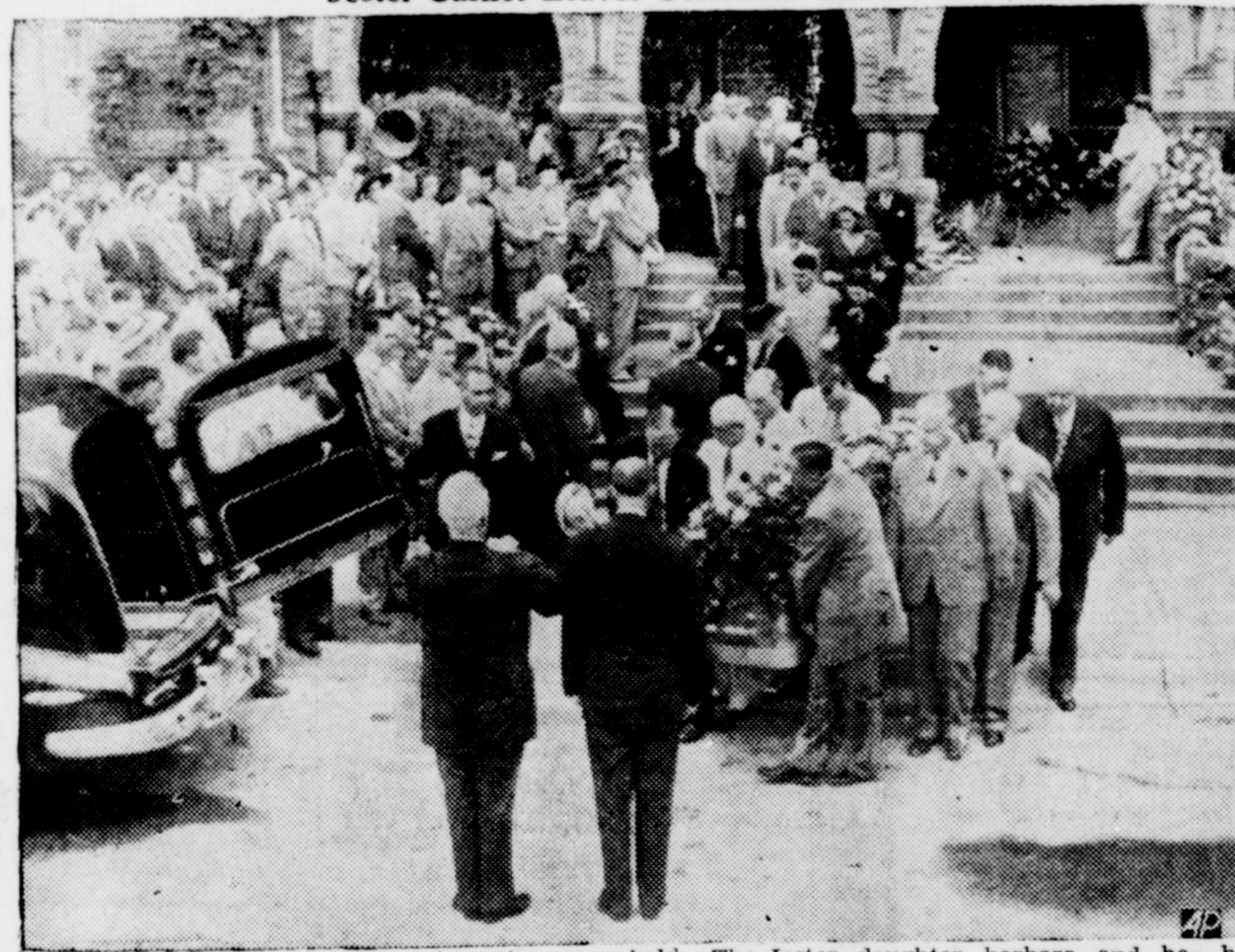

Cotton Insects

Cotton Insects are not as numerous this season or the County Agent checked the wrong fields. At least early season infestation is below normal. Extra dry weather in late summer of 1948 might be the answer. The early season treatment is over. Outbreaks of many weevils or boll worms will have to be met with heavier doses of 3-5-40.

Much Terracing In Progress

County Agricultural Agent has completing surveying seven miles of terraces at the Possum Oak Dairy Farm. This system together with several miles already constructed will control erosion on this farm.

County Agent Graham and Soil Conservation District Supervisor Virgil Lockhart, attended a meeting last Friday at Stephenville. The meeting was another move to get cooperation of all agencies in carrying out the State Soil Conservation Program.

Coryell County is in the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District. It is one of 151 such districts in Texas. Sixty thousand farmers in Texas have enrolled in the 151 districts to do everything possible to conserve their soils.

Coryell County till has many farms which need terracing and with this treatment the growing of a soil building crop every three years. The addition of superphosphate along with the planting of legumes seems to be the answer to, "what should I do to increase soil fertility."
