**Mid-West Construction Gets Final Contract on Sewer-Water Job**

Tuesday morning the City Council awarded the final contract on the sewer-water improvements to Mid-West Construction Company on low bid of \$148,301.25. Other contracts previously let were water well, \$10,392, and incidentally, that man's had hard luck, losing a bucket in the well, and is now down around 200 feet on the second trial.

The pump contract amounts to \$5,275, the fence \$2,039, \$2,000 for the well site, and the grand total is \$168,889.25.

**GISD Tentatively Locates New School East of Homes, Left US 84 Outside City**

It's located! Gatesville Independent School District's proposed new school. The tentative location, as announced Tuesday evening is on the property owned by Mrs. Blanche Powell on U. S. 84 east of Lover's Lane on the left side of the highway and just east of the few houses on that side of the highway.

According to the announcement, the board would like to have up to 25 acres of this property, and a just settlement with the owner is contemplated. They, the Board, will have a surveyor go over the property and see just what is necessary.

Any number of sites have been looked over: (a) part of the Kendrick and Witcher properties, ad-

acent to the present school property; (b) the Ricketts and possibly Gaines Franks property on Bridge Street; (c) east of N. 14th, just back of the houses facing south on Saunders, north to St. Louis and east to the County Barn or further to the railroad if necessary; (d) the old R. E. Powell place on Hwy 36, either side of the highway. At least these are the ones "talked" about, and you might also include the D. H. Culberson and Euel Swift homes on College street, and maybe others.

**Savings And Loan Ass'n To Be Opened Here About October First**

Preparations have been made for some months for the opening of a new business here; something new to Coryell County and Gatesville, the Gatesville Savings and Loan Association.

This will be the first business of this nature, and one which will handle savings accounts.

A charter has already been received from the State Department of Banking and is valid on receipt. Officers and directors have been named, including Horace Jackson, president, George B. Painter, vice-president and Byron L. McClellan, secretary-treasurer. Directors are Wm. Culbert, Dr. K. R. Jones, E. W. Jones, Jr., Dr. O. W. Lowrey, E. Price Bauman, and Erle Powell.

The home of the business will be the building adjacent to the Gatesville Drug Store at 715 Main now occupied by the Cozy Cafe, Britain's Barber and Beauty Shops. Remodeling will start about September 1 and completion is expected around October 1.

The new firm has an authorized capital stock of \$1,000,000, and all stock and surplus is paid up.

According to their spokesman, the business will promote and encourage savings, afford the opportunity of loans to those seeking to build, purchase or improve homes in Coryell County and in a radius of 50 miles.

**Brannan Says Dropping \$ Might Affect Cotton**

DALLAS, July 28. (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Brannan said here today the dropping dollar balance of sterling bloc nations "could seriously disrupt the South's exports in cotton and tobacco". He spoke before the Annual Cotton Research Council.

He said farm purchasing power had been reduced through farm prices which were "falling faster and further than non-farm prices". One solution he offered was for the United States to import more goods so other countries will have dollars to purchase cotton here.

**Acheson Says Re-arm Western Europe**

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 28. (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson told Congress today the United States should begin promptly to help re-arm Western Europe because the "possibilities of direct military aggression" by huge Soviet forces cannot be ignored.

Testifying on the administration \$1,450,000 (million) Foreign Arms program, he pictured Western European countries as living under the constant fear of Russian armies which are the greatest the world has known in peacetime.

**CIO's Murray Wants "30c Package Increase"**

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 28. (AP)—President Philip Murray of the CIO Steel workers wants a package increase of 30c an hour in their current dispute with the steel companies. This includes a fourth round wage increase of 12½c, 11.23c for pensions and 6.27 cents for social insurance.

Murray made the demands before a fact-finding board appointed by President Truman to avert a steel industry strike.

The current basic steel wage is \$1.65 an hour.

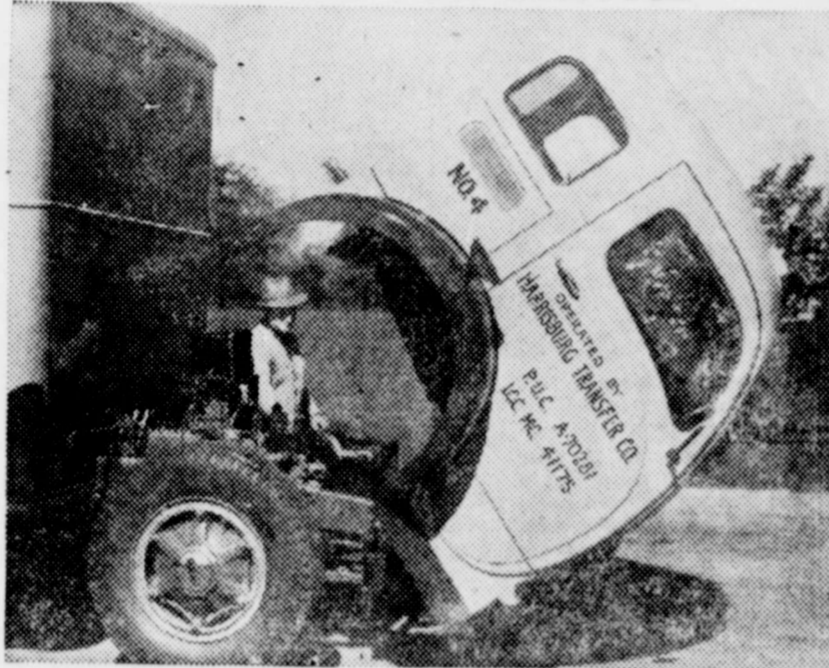

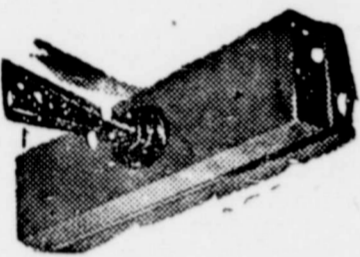
### CAB TIPS FOR SERVICE

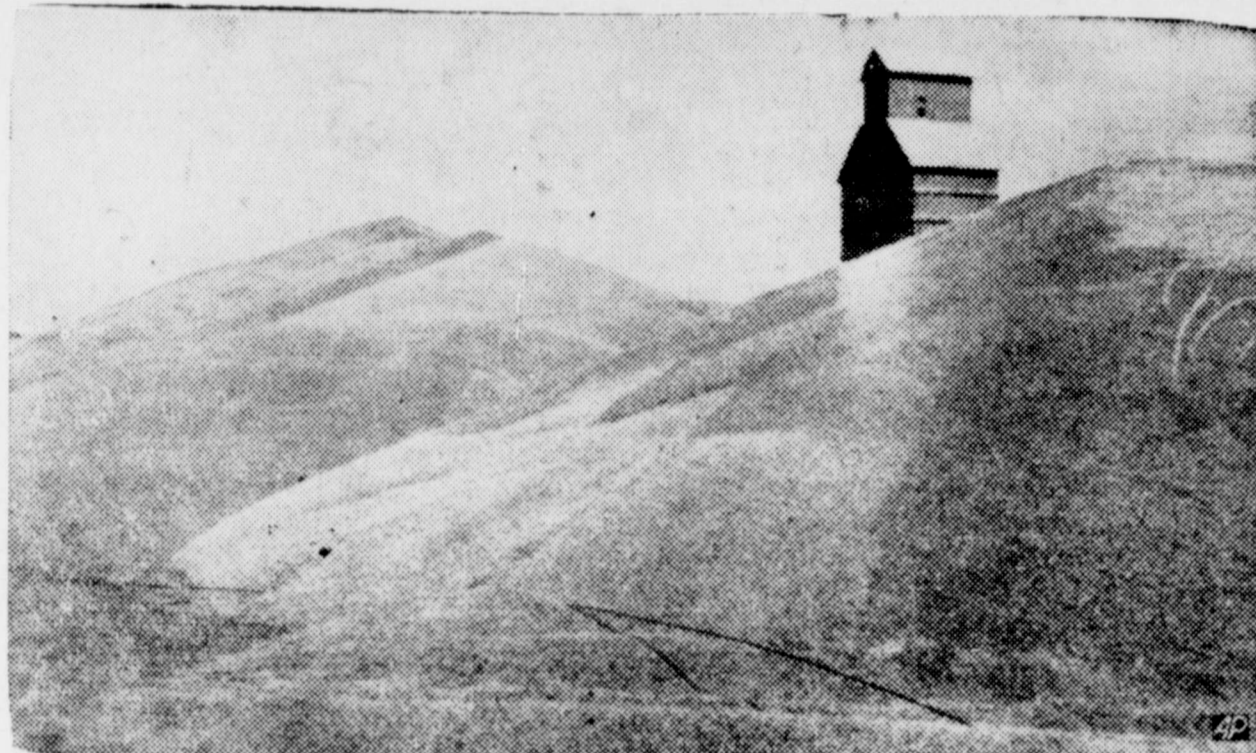

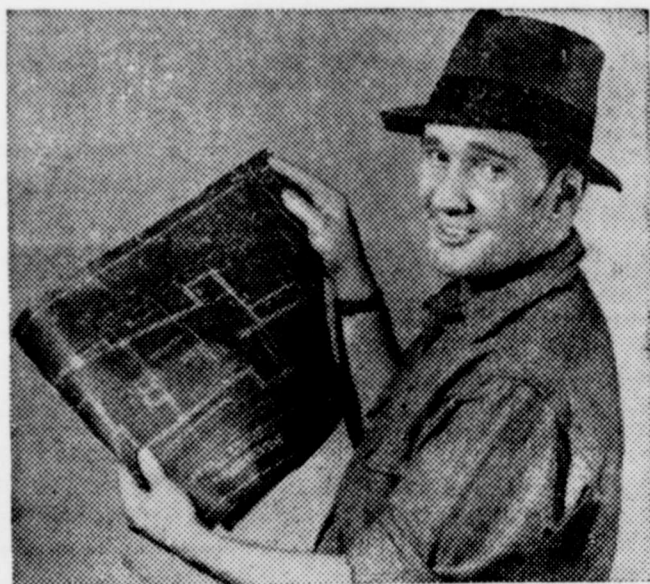

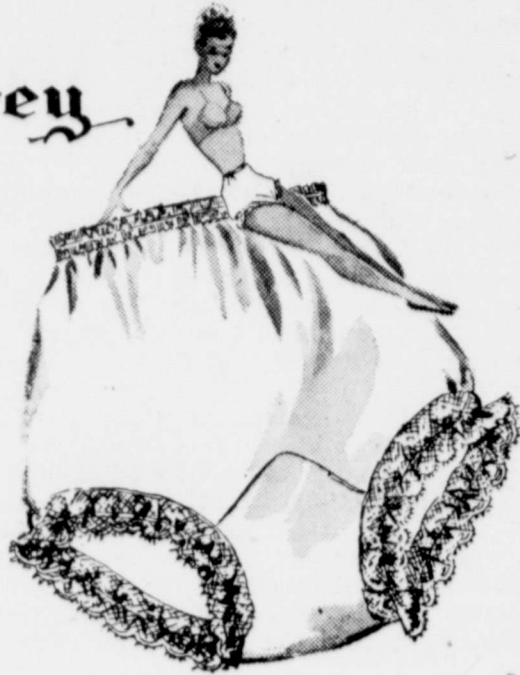

**HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION.**

The Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors wish to announce to all farmers of the district that this is farm safety week.

President Truman has proclaimed the week of July 24-30, 1949 as National Farm Safety Week. Farm people all over the United States should stop and give some time to making life on the farm safer and more profitable.

The National Safety Council reports that accidents cost farmers \$36,000,000 for medical and hospital care in 1948. Work time lost amounted to 17,000,000 work days which when figured at the prevailing average rate of pay for farm and ranch workers plus the cost of property damage would amount to much more than the hospital and medical costs. In addition to these direct costs there were many fatalities and thousands of permanent disability and

partial disability injuries which reduces the earnings of the victims throughout life.

Falls are the leading type of accidents on farms all over the United States. Faulty ladders, slippery concrete and farm tools lying around cost hours of painful suffering and much needed farm income. Injuries from falls range from death to sprained ankles and skinned shins. Twenty-five percent of all farm accidents result from falls and all age group of farm people suffer equally.

Accidents involving machinery and livestock are prevalent. Power tools such as mowers, clippers of all types and power take-off machines are particularly dangerous and should be handled carefully. All farm animals should be handled with care and precaution. A draft horse may step on a farmer's foot and cripple the man for life.

Most any man would pick up a twenty dollar bill he saw lying on the ground, so why not pause a short while, farm people, and remove some of the hazards—Pick up that broken glass, that board with the rusty nail in it, or that broken handled hoe that has been lying out in the corner of the yard since last year. Either of these could cost a farmer \$20, besides the pain of a cut foot or a sprained ankle and the time that might be lost from work. The best safety device is a careful farmer. Won't you please check your premises for hazards?
