

First Bale of '49 Crop Comes From Near Oglesby

Robert Fletcher, colored, of Oglesby, brought in the first bale ginned in Coryell County out of the 1949 Cotton Crop. The owner of the land is Mrs. Evalie Courtney, and it was leased to W. C. Layne of Oglesby.

The bale was ginned at Brown's Gin in Gatesville with "Biggun" Woodard in charge, and weighed 480 pounds. It was from a field of 125 acres planted in cotton. No information as to grade was given.

The Gatesville Chamber of Commerce gave \$25 as a premium as usual, for this first bale.

Cotton, formerly the major crop here, is not now. The drop in production is from around 40,000 bales to around 6,000.

Directly and indirectly it helped build Coryell County and Gatesville, with a policy of progressive expansion, limited only by sound banking. It has made it in depressions, panics, drouths, inflation and nine separate and distinct financial institutions have resulted in the present bank.

One high point was in 1938, when The First National Bank and The Gatesville National Bank consolidated, forming the National Bank of Gatesville. At the time of this organization, officers of the Gatesville were Dan E. Graves, President; J. P. Kendrick Vice-President; Andrew Kendrick Cashier and Cam H. McGilvray, Jr., Assistant Cashier. The officers of The First National were Leake Ayres, President, H. S. Compton, Vice President and Dawson Cooper, Cashier.

More information will be available both Tuesday and Friday in the News regarding the bank's celebration.

Gatesville Well Down 690 Feet, Cemented In, And Testing Begins

Gatesville's new well is down 690 feet in the "water sand", and Halliburton Well-Cementing Co. have cemented it in, with 400 sacks of cement.

After this hardens, further drilling, about 100 feet will take place into the sand, then it will be pumped for 24 hours, rest 12, and then be pumped for 36. In the meantime, chemists and technicians will analyze the water for mineral content, health, taste and other factors.

Fire destroyed the Ritz Theatre and Meeks Cafe, on the southeast corner of the square Thursday morning, and the alarm was turned in about 1:20 a. m. Firemen fought the blaze from every advantage point until early morning, using two pumpers, with six or more lines pouring water on the fire.

CORYELL COUNTY NEEDS... A State Ad Valorem tax refund now! Remember when the citizens of Texas voted a Constitutional Amendment which called for a refund of the State Ad Valorem tax to the counties in 1952? Before this constitutional amendment was passed, a minority of counties in the State were enjoying this refund for the purpose of flood control. Since the amendment was passed, Tarrant County asked for and received this refund during the recent Ft. Worth disaster.

We haven't suffered any disaster, but we have lost a tremendous amount of taxable land to Camp Hood and the A and M Bluebonnet Farm. And, what about the taxable land we will lose when the Miller Springs dam begins to back up water in Coryell County? Of course, the 850 acres of non-taxable land at the Gatesville State School for Boys is only a rep in the bucket, but it is something to be considered in the overall picture.

In my opinion, we should ask our State Representative and State Senator to place a bill on the agenda of the next special session of the Legislature which calls for a state ad valorem tax refund to Coryell County. We could use this money on our farm-to-market road program.
