1. In a special election, statewide turnout is usually very small. One or two counties, because of a well-directed local campaign for or against a proposal, may make their votes count way out of proportion to their potential in the total electarate. For example, in the 1947 election on the college building amendment, Lubbock county had more weight in the election than Travis, a county with more than three times as many qualified voters. What happened was that the turnout in Lubbock was 53 per cent, while in Travis it was only 11 per cent. Lubbock was strongly-and actively-opposed to the amendment, while Travis was strongly in favor. 2. Many persons vote blindly, at least on some issues in an elec. tion, according to other surveys by The Texas Poll. The official ballot in November election does not explain the annual-sessions-and-higher-pay a_ mendment, thus increasing the chances of blind voting. On the merely identified as "the constitutional amendments relative to ses_ sions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members." Any voter may mark the ballot "for" or "against" the proposal even though he doesn't know its provisions. This point is made here because in the latest survey, interviewers for The Texas Poll explained to each person interviewed that the amendment would raise legislators' salaries to \$3,600 a year and would require annual sessions. 




