Boy Scouts To Be Baylor Guests Saturday

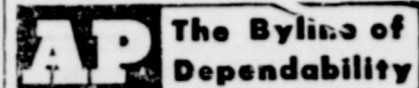
Gatesville and Coryell County

Crommelin Out: Navy Denies Bad Morale

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 6 (AP)

The Navy today suspended Capt.
John Crommelin from duty and de-
nied to Congress that the morale
of Navy personnel is in bad shape.

These developments piled up in
the wake of Crommelin's admis-
sion he is the man who Monday
gave a reporter official correspond-
ence commenting on Navy Morale.
Crommelin was restricted to his
home indicating a probable court
martial for revealing confidential
documents. Navy Secretary Mar-
shall meanwhile went before the
House Armed Services Committee
and said the Navy Morale is good.

President Truman also announc-
ed he had ordered Matthews to
get to the bottom of the contro-
versy concerning charges the
Navy is not getting a fair deal in
Military unification policies.

U. S. Fires Reds A Note

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 6 (AP)

The United States sent strongly
worded note to Russia today pro-
testing the mistreatment of Amer-
icans who strayed into the Soviet
Zone of Germany.

"This treatment, the United
States Government finds to be in-
shocking contravention to the most
elementary standards of interna-
tional decency, the note said. It
also asked that Russian officials
responsible be punished. It cited
several cases of Americans held
by Russians.

Hennegan Dies, Former P.M. Gen.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 6 (AP)—
Robert E. Hennegan, former Post
Master General and one time own-
er of the Saint Louis Cardinals,
died here today.

Cause of his death was not im-
mediately disclose. He had been
in poor health for some time.
Hennegan, 45, gave ill health as
the reason for selling his interest
in the Cardinals last winter.

Matt J. Winn, 88, died here early
today.

He was president of Churchill
Downs and director of the Annual
Derby Classics. Winn had been
seriously ill for several weeks fol-
lowing two operations to correct
stomach disorders.

River from Gatesville to Bell and
McLennan county lines, are eli-
gible to vote.

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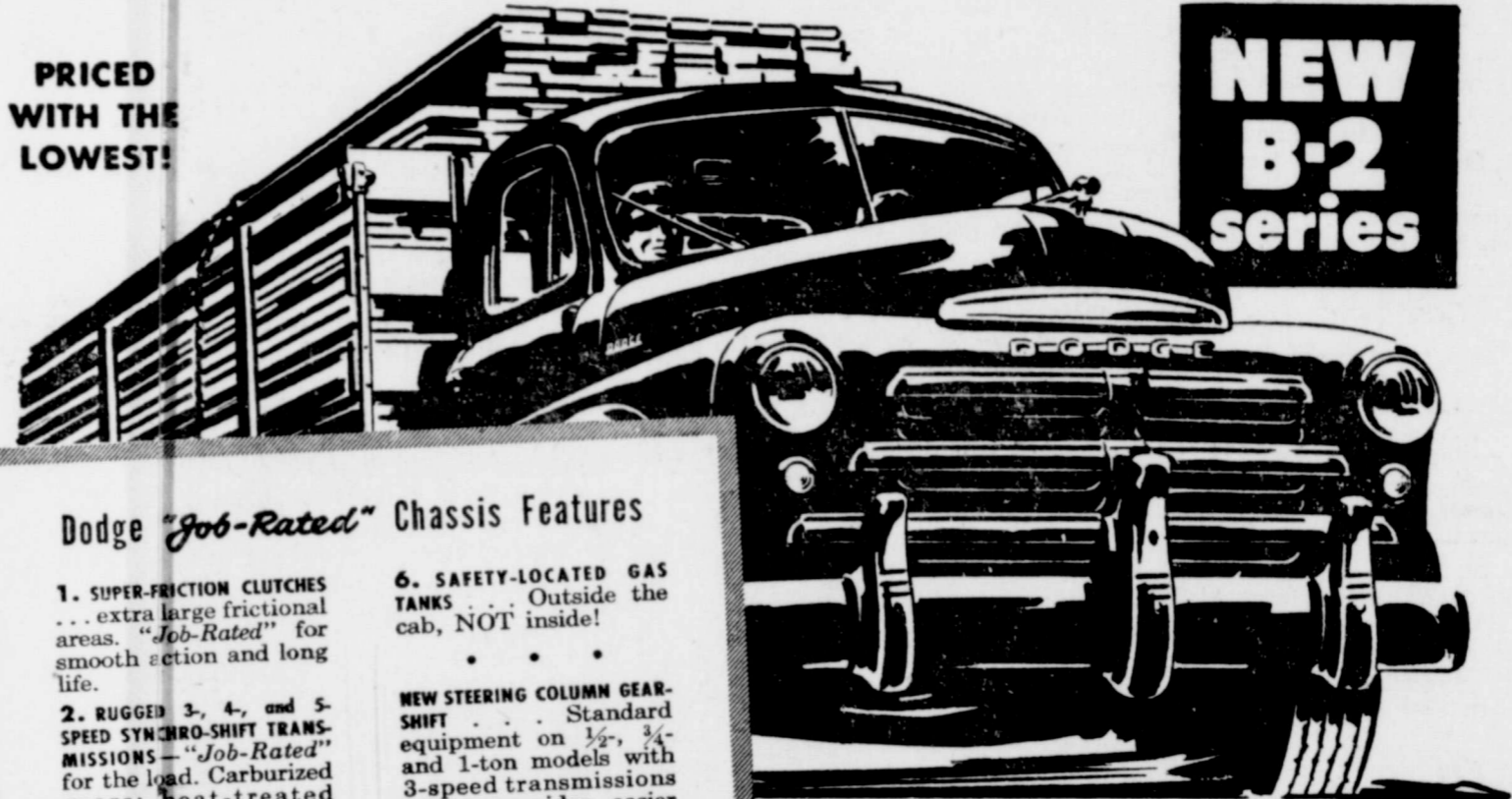

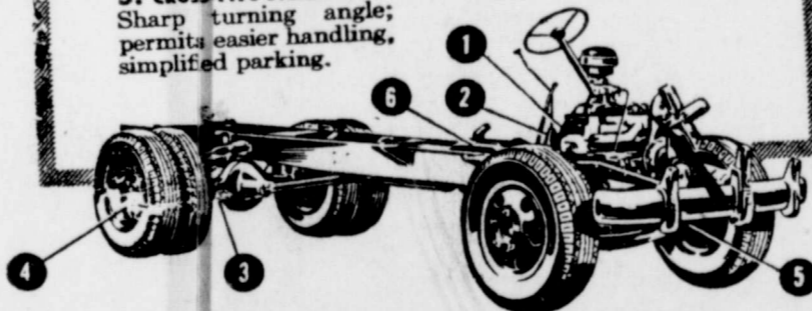

Much interest was created by the report on counselling, given by Miss Aurora Yongue and Mrs. Earl Hite.

Miss Yongue says children are not small adults. Physically, mentally and emotionally each child is a growing, changing person with needs and potentialities which are his alone.

Affection warmth, friendliness and a sense of humor can help us live happily with boys and girls. The child's relationship to his teacher is of utmost concern to him. Interested teachers will make it possible for children to find security and joy in the pupil-teacher relationship.

The playground is called the training school of childhood. It is here that his behavior patterns are established. It calls for wise adult supervision with a minimum of interference.

Emphasis on academic achievement can destroy a first-grader's confidence. Grades or marks should not be mentioned, but each child should be helped to read and write and do numbers when he is ready, and not all first graders are ready at the same time.

Mrs. Hite's three points of view on guidance show us why parents, teachers, the P.-T. A. should work together.

Every teacher is a counsellor, but the class room teacher, the trained counsellor, and the home-making teacher all approach the problem from different angles.

The purposes of any teacher are to build character, prepare the students for citizenship and help them to acquire health and success.

The trained counsellor is a "trouble shooter". She must depend on the teachers for information on problem children, her case records are private, many cases can not even be discussed, and her contact with the P.-T. A. is most important. She can help the parents help their children to emotional security.

The Homemaking teacher has the advantage of being both a class room teacher and a counsellor. She sees the students in class, and because of the nature of the vocational program, she sees them in their home environment.
