### Four In One Family Found Shot In Fort Worth Home

FORT WORTH, Oct. 10. (AP)—Four members of one family were found shot to death today at their home in Suburban Oak Noll. Identified by neighbors as Mrs. Richard G. Finch, about 33, Allan, 7, her son; Penelope 8, her daughter; and a Mrs. Walker, her mother. All were in night clothing and in bed. A .22 colt revolver was found about three inches from Mrs. Walker's hand.

Investigators said the deaths apparently occurred Saturday. Finch was reported visiting with his parents in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

### Navy Fliers-Radar Say Russians Are Undoubt'ly Ready

WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 10. (AP)—Navy fliers and radar experts told Congress today that Russia undoubtedly has both warning system and fighters needed to detect a knock down high flying bombers like the B-36. They continued before the House Armed Service Committee the Navy's barrage against a defense policy that puts so much of military funds into the B-36.

### Tornadoes, Rain, Fog Kill 8, Injure 54 In U. S.

Tornadoes, rain and fog killed eight persons and injured 54 others over the nation last night and today.

Tornadoes took one life in Nebraska. A Rock Island passenger train derailed by a washout near Meade, Kansas, today caused four deaths. Near Cheyenne, Wyoming, a Shick Airways plane hit a knoll in rain an fog, killing its crew of three.

### Gatesville Man Shot In Shoulder: Reported Serious

W. C. Bartlett, Gatesville, was seriously wounded about 6:30 Sunday evening by a gunshot wound in his right shoulder, following a difficulty at Faunt Le Roy's Crossing near here.

Sheriff Joe White arrested R. T. Boone in McGregor, or near there, Monday morning, and he was lodged in jail, awaiting bond, and was charge with attempt murder.

The difficulty followed an argument according to Sheriff White, and he was shot with a 30-30 rifle, the bullet ripping his right shoulder. Several blood transfusions were given him Monday morning at Coryell Memorial hospital.

### Walter W. Pyle Is Killed Near Flat Sunday Evening

Walter W. Pyle, 72, of Route 2<sup>nd</sup> Moody, was hit by a car and instantly killed Sunday evening about 7:30, in what was said by Sheriff Joe White to be an unavoidable accident.

Sheriff White, said the man was walking on Highway 36 toward Gatesville. A car stopped to pick him up, and, as he crossed the road another car, going east, hit him.

James Mosely, now of Bastrop, and formerly of Pearl, was driving the car that struck Mr. Pyle. He said the lights of the first car blinded him. Other witnesses who saw the accident, said it was unavoidable.

Mr. Pyle's remains were prepared for burial by Scott's Funeral Home, and were to be taken to Moody for burial.

## The Texas Poll

The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, October 8. The idea of making women eligible for jury service is approved by two out of every three representative voters in the latest statewide survey by The Texas Poll.

Voters will ballot officially on this issue, along with nine other proposed constitutional amendments, in the special election November 8.

The Texas Poll has been measuring public opinion on the question of jury service for women since before the war. In 1941, just before the U. S. entered the war, a survey showed that most men did not approve of women serving on juries. However, most women did. Of all adults interviewed in the pre-war survey, exactly 50 per cent said they thought women should be allowed on juries.

In 1947, The Texas Poll found 65 per cent of a cross section of adults approved the idea. That survey indicated the rank and file of Texas men had come around to the view that women should be allowed on juries. But members of the Texas Legislature, after considering the question, failed to submit it to a vote of the people.

Six months ago, before the Legislature finally adopted the proposed amendment, a statewide survey by The Texas Poll showed almost the same result as the 1947 survey. Now the latest Poll, completed last month, indicates opinion among all qualified voters has remained fairly stable during the past six months.

Division of voters in the last two surveys is compared below:

In the most recent survey, 63 per cent of the qualified voters as compared with 77 per cent of the women voters approved jury service for women. Analysis of the results discloses also that the proposal finds greater acceptance among the upper income groups than among the lower levels.

If a majority of the voters who go to the Polls on November 8 gave their approval, Texas will join thirty-one other states that now permit women on juries.

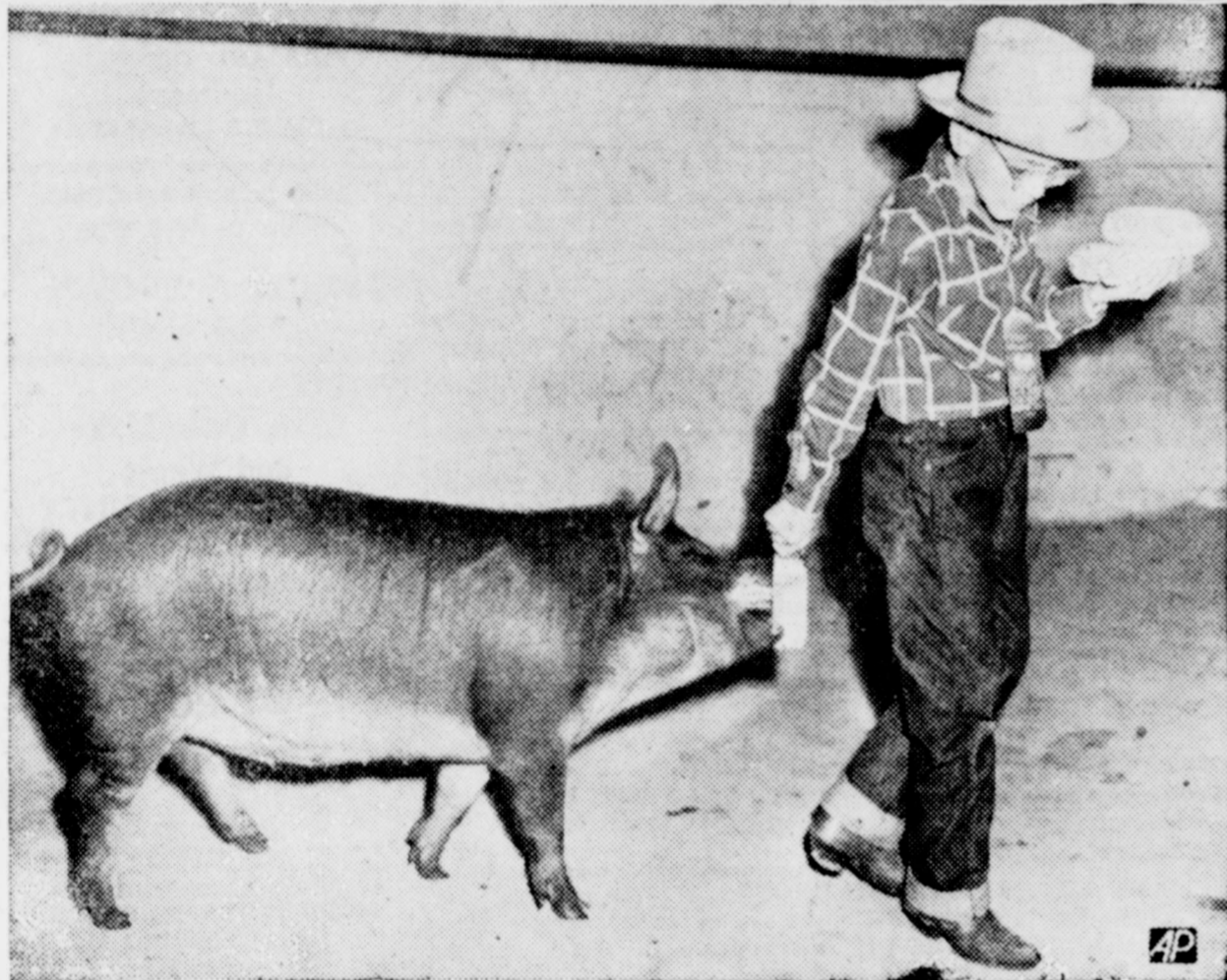

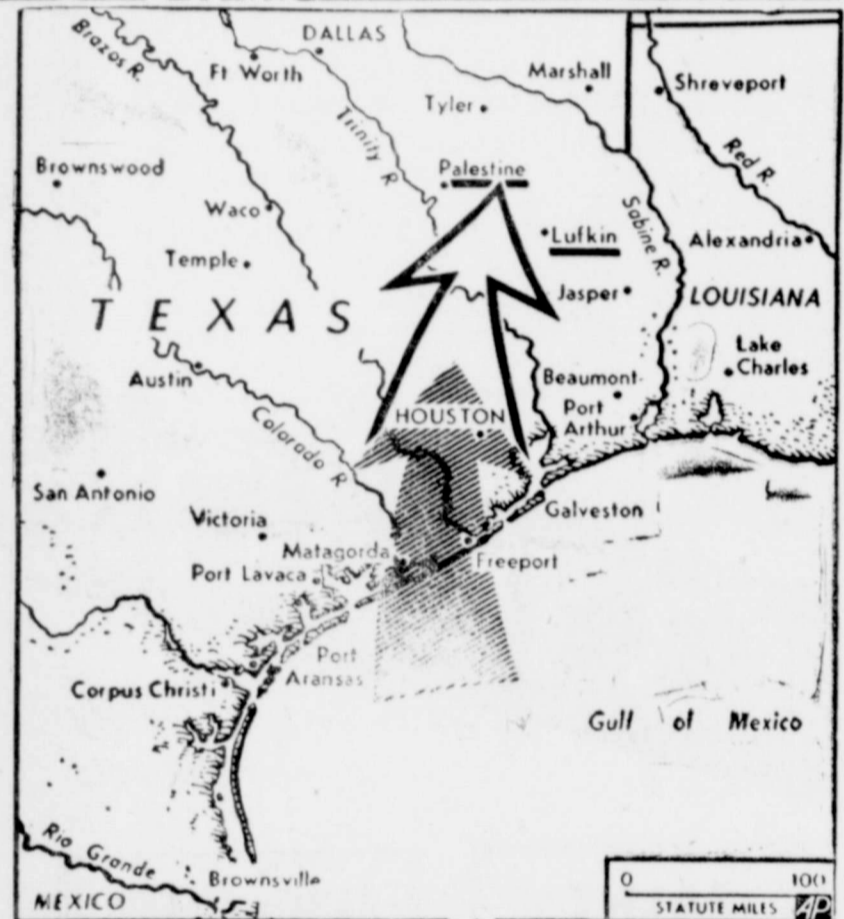
