

The Texas Poll has been measuring public opinion on the question of jury' service for women since before the war. In 1941, just before the U.S. entered the war, a survey showed that most men did not approve of women serving on juries. However, most women did. Of all adults interviewed in the pre-war survey, exactly 50 per cent said they thought women should be allowed on juries

In 1947, The Texas Poll found 65 per cent of a cross section of adults approved the idea. That survey indicated the rank and file of Texas men had come around to the view that women should be allowed on juries. But members

100% 100% In the most recent survey, 63 per cent of the qualified voters as compared with 77 per cent of the women voters approved jury service for women. Analysis of the results discloses also that the proposal finds greater acceptance among the upper income groups than among the lower levels.

If a majority of the voters who go to the Polls on November 8 gove their approval, Texas will join thirty-one other states that now permit women on juries.




