It has been noticed during our contacts with cooperators of the district that a number of houses have burned down during the past year. Most of these houses could still be standing if someone had removed the fire hazards. Check around your farm premises during this week and see if you are doing any of the following things:

1. Storing tractor in barn on loose hay.
2. Storing tractor fuel in barn next to hay or near other frame buildings.
3. Have you checked the flue in your house?
4. Do you keep your mattresses in a safe place where the children can't reach them?
5. Have you cleaned the trash out of your garage and attic?

There are three classes of fires: A, B, C.

A. Fires involve wood, trash, paper, hay and other combustible materials.

B. Fires include gasoline, kerosene, greases and oil fires

C. Fires are electric fires—motors, generators, etc.

The A-B-C's of preventing farm fires are: Always Be Careful. Class A fires can be fought with water, sand and soda-acid type of extinguisher. Don't use water on B and C fires. Check with your local Fire Department for information in lighting Class B and C fires.

Suggestions On Fire Prevention

By J. D. Brown, Jr.

I have three suggestions to offer:

Don't let grass and weeds grow up around your premises to die and become a fire hazard, and if you do, don't set it afire and call the fire department. These men are busy, it costs them and the city a lot every time they are called.

Don't burn trash at your home. The City charges you plenty for the service of removing all trash and garbage and are anxious to render that service. If I am not mistaken there is an ordinance on the City Books prohibiting the burning of trash in the city limits after nine a. m., This ordinance is one of the oldest city laws we have and was drawn back in the early days when the City was almost all wooden buildings. The merchants were supposed to sweep out their stores and saloons in the early morning and burn

this trash before people came to town. In the morning hours it is easy to watch a fire, but if you set one in the afternoon, it may, unknown to you, smoulder all night, and when a puc of wind or a fresh norther blows up, scatter fire over the town.

When you build a new home, or make an addition to it, or have any doubt about any fire hazard on your premises, call in your insurance agent. 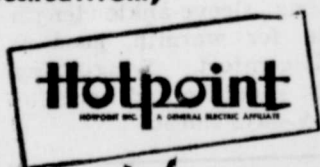

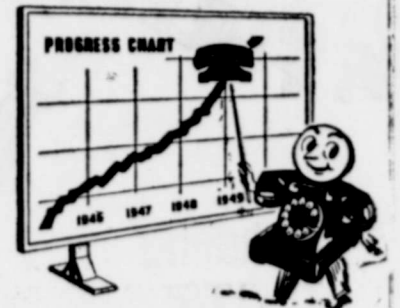

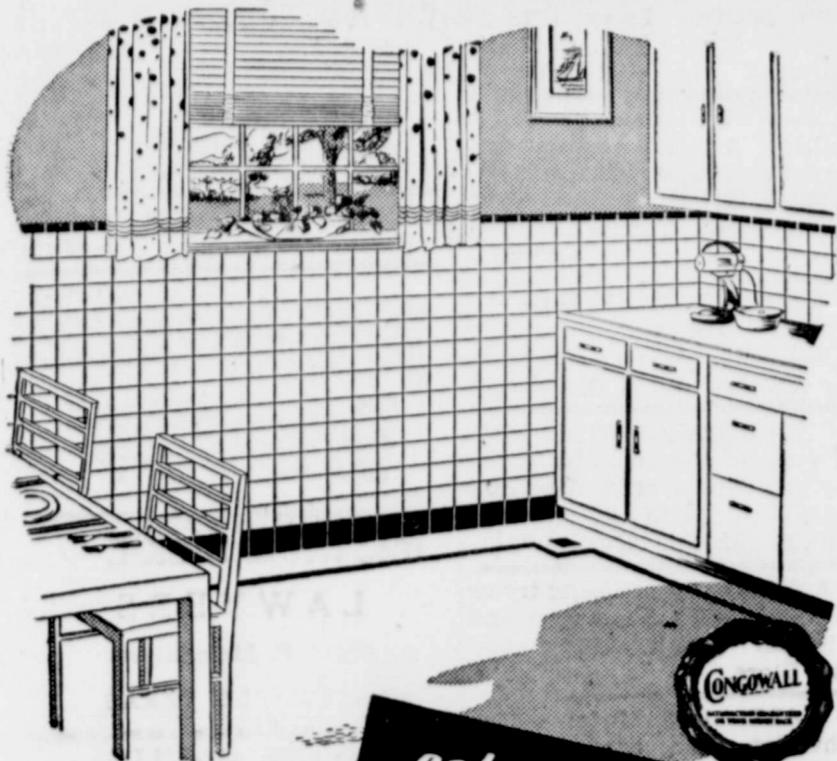

Farm News

By **W. P. GRAHAM**
County Agent

Favorable cotton picking weather has been temporarily interrupted by showers. Rains have been spotted over the county. Oglesby received the heaviest rainfall. Farmers in this part of the county have enough moisture to plant fall grains.

Cotton Defoliation and Cotton Strippers

Chemical defoliation has been tried on several farms. County Agricultural Agent Graham visited the farm of Robert Aleyander to observe result of a cotton field which had been sprayed with a defoliant. Ninety per cent of the leaves were dead. A two fold advantage of this treatment is to hasten opening of all bolls and

prepare cotton for mechanical strippers.

Strippers are being used for the first time in Coryell County. Cotton harvested in this manner has to be thoroughly dried before ginning. Someone reports 3 hours required to gin a stripper harvested bale. This was probably due to lack of drying.

Plans For Dairy Week

Plans were made Friday for Dairy Week. More efficient operation of dairies and farms selling milk will be one of the objectives of the series of meetings.

The last week in October is the time. Elsewhere in this paper definite instructions as to hours and meeting places will appear.

Farm Bureau Activities

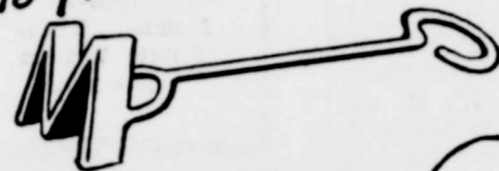
