



Lockjaw, or tetanus, cases jump in summertime because exposure in the form of cuts, or puncture wounds are more frequent in warm weather when people are out-of-doors.

The germs of lockjaw are commonly found in soil - especially manured soil. They enter through a break in the skin and emit a deadly toxin which cause jaw and neck muscles to constrict so severely that jaws involuntarily close, vice-like.

Slowly the muscle construction spreads to other body muscles, until the victim is bent like a bow.

Lockjaw germs are spore-formers, which means they can live for years outside an animal body. Its life processes lie dormant in a tiny sede-like pod, sifting about on the ground until finally, perhaps Lutterloh at Gatesville, Texas. through a nail puncture, it gets back into live tissue.

The wound may heal over, but inside, protected as it is from the air, the spore may begin "revegetating" and emitting deadly toxin.





With the outbreak of the steel strike, President Eisenhower declared that he would not use the power of government to interfere because he believes in what he called "free bargaining." In keeping government out, he was proceeding on sound, Constitutional principle.

But what is this thing called free bargaining"?

In building a home, you invite a contractor to sit down with you and discuss wages and costs. He asks for so much, you say you can pay so much, and you reach an agreement. If you don't offer what he thinks he must have, he regretfully says he can's work for you, and you look for somebody else.

That is completely free and legitimate bargaining.

But scppose he tells you that if you don't pay his price, he will not only refuse to build your house, he wont let anyone else build it, either!

You recognize at once that that is coercion, and you dont hesitate to call it what it is, a monopolistic shakedown!

Apply this simple illustration to the situation in steel, or any other like it. There is no difference in




