

Note to Texas Youth Council. Two of Perry's Punks, 16-year-old SSB goodboys, got out Friday that's usual.



... With EDWARD W. GREENFIELD REDISCOVERING FREEDOM Some weeks ago I cited works of

futuristic fiction that carry us in fancy into atomic annihilation or regimented tyranny - and asked, "How about fancying some peace and freedom for a change?"

Felix Morley's "Cumption Islad" (Caxton Printers, Caldwell, Idaho, 1956) does it. To be sure, the novel begins with an explosion and, science fiction-wise, hurls a Chesapeake island and its people 50 million years into pre-history. There the story thoughtfully pursues the question: if we could start over, as Morley's Americans had to, what kind of government

Watch the Gumption Islanders wrestle with survival, social and racial cleavages, production, dismeaning of life. Both intelligent past week. and ignorant, virtuous and venal, no different from most of us, they talk out and act out their salvation.

And before destiny restores their experimental world to our own, what do they come to? Pret-

ty much what our Founding Fathers came to -- constitutional, limited government, bent only on keeping the peace; free, private enterprise, with reward according to achievement; equal justice under law and equal freedom under God.

We ourselves could do with rediscovering the meaning of freedom!

Of course, the argument for overnment health insurance is nat many people cannot afford lness at today's costs.

It is known, however, that uner a free enterprise system the najority of the nation's people ave some type of private health asurance, and there are such lans open to most of the rest, nerely by paying the premiums. lowever, that fact does not seem o be so germane at this time. here is a more serious aspect o this desire for government to e all things to all men.

It is quite possible that a case ould be made for the thesis that nany people in the country tolay cannot actually afford to eat.

Thus, if the sole measure of what the government shall do. not do, is the criteria for Compulsory government medical

For one thing, every tax that is ever passed by any legislativ body is eventually, in one form, or another, passed along to the consumer, and usually by the time it goes through the distribution channels, the mark up on the goods that reflect these taxes, pyramids the tax several times adding to inflation. . . .

In addition, the costs of government administration soar sky high, so that any tax levied for welfare purposes is either an assessment on the payer that is higher than the same services can be secured for elsewhere, or there is just not enough in the fund to take care of the needs, requiring the dipping into general funds.

For example, the proposal be-fore Congress is to tax 3% on each dollar of income up to \$6,000 per year. This could mean an annual cost of \$180. Yet many families of not inconsiderable size are protected by one of the existing private health insurance plans for just about half this

amount in annual premiums. Actually, the belief held by some that government can provide any low cost services of any kind is a snare and a delusion. Government services are the most expensive possible. It often doesn't appear this way, because the hill for such services does come in one statement, but is hidden in many taxes.
