



# YOUR MERCHANT MARINE

"America has the lead in atom power for ships. Let's keep it!" said Ralph E. Casey, president of the American Merchant Marine Institute, at the July 21 launching of the nuclear merchant ship

Besides the Savannah, we have an atomic aircraft carrier, a destroyer, a cruiser and 33 submarines built or building. The private merchant marine industry must accept this responsibility

One American company, Esso Standard Oil, has already offered to build and operate a nuclear tanker, provided the Government contributes the power plant. A second American Line, Isbrandtsen, has proposed cutting one of its present ships in half and inserting an atomic power unit in a prefabricated hull section.

It is forward thinking like this which will give substance to President Eisenhower's prophecy that the N.S. Savannah will be the "forerunner of atomic merchant and passenger fleets which will one day unite the nations of the world in peaceful trade."


# Proper study light at home means a better student at school

Brucellosis is a contagious disease of animals and man caused by a bacterial agent. In cattle, it has been called Bang's disease and contagious obsortion. In swine it also is referred to as contagious absortion. It sometimes is referred to as undulant fever in man.

Livestock raising is a gamble at best. But animals with brucellosis are like crooked dice-your only profit 's experience.

Infected cattle suffer a 20 percent reduction in milk production. They calve on the average of once every year-and-a-half rather than once a year. In addition, the resulting absortions, sterility and difficult breeders increase replacement needs by 30 percent.

Whether you are a producer of milk or beef, these losses apply to you. A beef cow that loses 20 % of her milk production will wean a calf 10 percent lighter than nor-

Swine producers fare little better with this disease. Infected sows abort or give birth to weak litters. Sows frequently become sterile following abortion. The disease damage the bone of the spine, with resulting paralysis in up to 20 percent of infected swine.

And that's not all. Brucellosis is the most common cause of fistula of the withers in horses. It frequently is responsible for waterbags forming on the knees of both horses and cattle.

Human cases of brucellosis are being diagnosed with increasing frequentcy among persons handling livestock or drinking un-pasteurized milk.

Less tangible losses occur in addition to the ones listed. Loss of markets for Texas breeding and stocker cattle is becoming a serious problem. The shortage of healthy replacement dairy stock is commanding attention. The con-


(Legally Speaking)

You can tell a lot about people by the way they regard time.

Do they put stock mostly in the past-their record; the present-their direct joy in work or play; or the future-their plans.

Why not use all three dimensions of time? Past experience to guide, the present for zest, and the future to realize dreams.

Lawyers report a sharp shift in the way people regard time and the law: Of old they thought of law in terms of past facts like failures to meet legal duties, mis-



On Judges

TF a judge is compelled to torture and punish the innocent because his office and his ignorance constrain him, is he a happy as well as guiltless man? Surely it were proof of more profound considerateness and finer feeling way he to recognize the misery these necessities, and shrink from his own implication in that miscry; and had he any piety about him, he would cry to God: "From my necessities deliver Thou me!"-St. Augustine, 354-430 A.D.

The laws were first taken from the Greeks . . . and then we find that they are reduced into a Latin style . . . How, then, could these old dotards be able to understand aright the text of the laws, who never in their time had looked upon a good Latin book, as doth evidently enough appear by the rudeness of their style, which is fitter for a chimney-sweeper, or for a cook or a scullion than for a uris-consult and doctor in the laws!-Rabelais, French satirist, 1495-1553.

A voluminuos code of laws is one of the inconveniences necesearily connected with the advantages of a free government. To old an arbitrary discretion in he courts, it is indispensable that they should be bound down by cirict rules and precedents, which we to define and point out their laty in every particular case . . . those precedents must unavoidably swell to a very considerable bulk, and must demand long and laborious study to acquire a compotent knowledge of them. Hence it is that there can be but few men in the society who will have sufficient skill in the laws to qualify them for the stations of judges. - Alexander Hamilton, "Federalist;" 1787.

You still have to think of the record, since you may have to go to trial some time. So keep good records of your affairs.

also think of the law in the future tense-in terms of built in safeguards for plans which they want to go through without legal hitches

Our heavy income and death taxes have made people plan ahead legally, rather than wait

for the ax to fall. Any time you buy or sell a home or a business or make an investment you have choices of how you may do it-some wise, some not, in view of your circumstaces. Should you insist on an abstract or accept or offer instead a title insurance policy, (Your lawyer has a definite part to play in either event.)

Should you do business as a sole proprietor, a partnership, or corporation?Do your contracts set out ways of meeting unexpected events? How best may you serve your estate (and also carry out your wishes)-by a will or a trust, or by direct gifts?

While all of these things point forward, the past in the form of court records can serve you by showing where trouble may come from.

As more and more people know the symptoms of legal troublewhere to look for legal hitches in plans before big trouble starts, there will be fewer law suits and better human relations.

And where does trouble sometimes start? Most often where you lack a clear grasp of your relationship, your rights and duties, and your own and the other fellow's resources-in transactions involving large personal or financial stakes.


