Individuals vs. The State

MANKIND must have laws, and conform to them, or their life would be as bad as that of the most savage beast. And the reason of this is that no man's nature is able to know what is best for human society; or knowing, always able and willing to do what is best. There is difficulty in apprehending that the true art of politics is concerned, not with private but with public good (for public good binds together states, but private only distracts them); and that both the public and private good as well of individuals as of states is greater when the state and not the individual is first considered. — Plato, written about four centuries B.C.

He will always, one imagines, defend his claim to individual freedom against the will of the multitude. 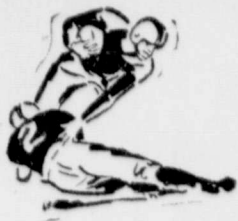

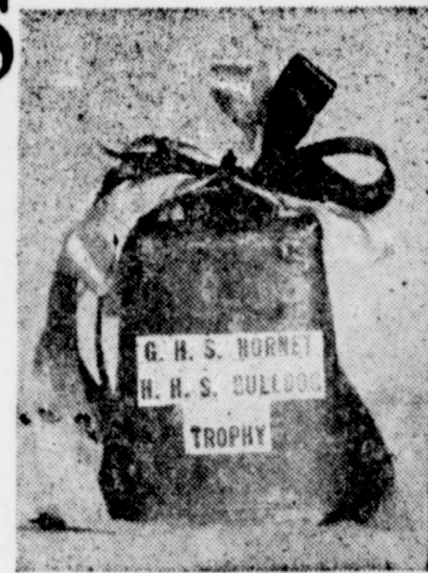

# WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

BY C. WILSON HARDER

As this is written, the steel strike is still in force. By publication time, the strike may, or may not, be ended.

But regardless of the status of the strike at press time, this is the first major labor dispute in which United States foreign policy, long dominated by fussy-headed internationalists, has been an issue, whether spoken out loud as an issue, or not.

The fact remains that in 1946, 1949, 1952, 1955 and 1956, Big Steel settled fairly quickly meeting all, or most of labor's demands.

Altogether, in these five strikes labor won over 50 cents per hour cumulative wages increases, plus pensions, plus overtime, plus holidays, plus vacations, and many other benefits.

And as always, Big Steel boosted the price of their product so that in the end the American consumer paid for whatever Big Steel gave Big Labor. There does not appear to have been any serious consideration in these past strikes of public interest. With 65% of nation's steel production in hands of only four giants, and with another four lesser lights bringing the total up to 82%, there was little chance for consumer to shop.

But now the picture has changed. While Big Steel was blithely giving away the consumer's dollars at the labor bargaining table, the internationalist do-gooder clique was busy giving away the protection the industry had with tariffs.

So today, American steel in-

dustry faces low cost, competition from Japanese, German and Belgian steel mills.

Even that standby customer of steel, Detroit is feeling the pinch as the U. S. now imports almost four times as many automobiles as it exports.

Frank Higgins, former assistant Secretary of the Army, in a recent speech on his observations travelling the world since his retirement last March, termed himself a "modern day industrial Paul Revere" and expressed frank alarm over the inroads that foreign manufacturers are making into the American economy.

He reports that under the U. S. foreign aid program, two and a half ton trucks that cost \$7100 to build in Detroit are being built in Japan for \$3368.

It is known in field of nails, pipe, concrete reinforcing steel, American steel mills are practically out of business as they cannot compete with foreign goods.

Mr. Higgins recommends that a committee from industry, labor, and government be sent abroad to study peril to American industry in the foreign plans and operations. He further believes this committee should report to Congress.

It would probably be well, for a delegation of labor leaders to dip into their treasuries to make such a trip, and broaden their viewpoint of true economic conditions existing with U. S. protective barriers practically eliminated these past few years.

If this were to be done, it would not be unlikely that pickets would be assigned to patrol the U. S. State Dept. carrying cards, "State Dept. unfair to American workers."
