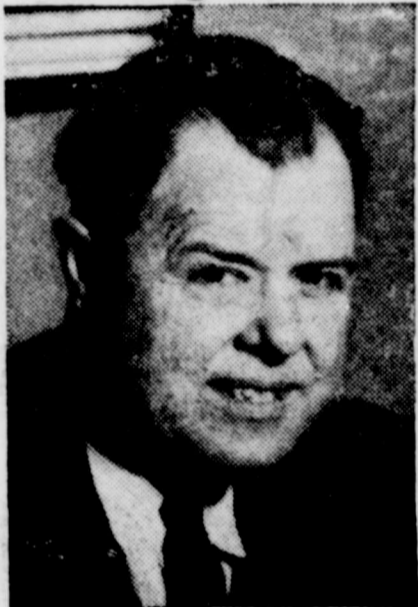

**FARMERS QUESTIONAIRES BEING MAILED TO AREA FARMERS**

Questionnaires for the '59 Census of Agriculture are now in the mail and will be in the hands of local farmers within a few days from Chicago.

The forms will reach farmers about a week ahead of the date when Census takers will begin the field canvass, and will give farm operators time to consult their records before filling in the answers and getting them ready for the census takers to pick up.

These census will get information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment, selected farm expenditures, farm values, and mortgage debt, according to Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office in Dallas.

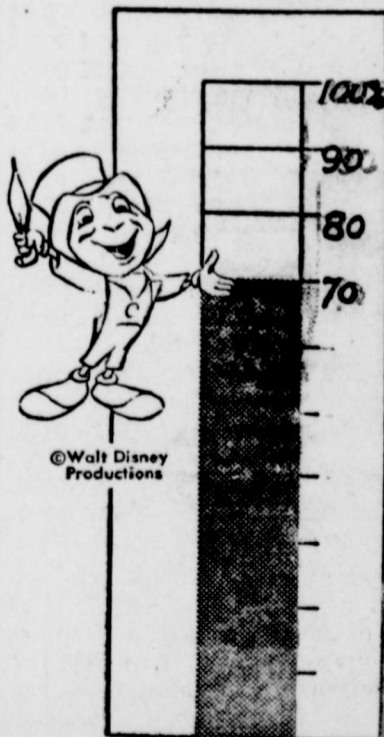

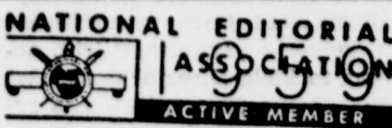

## PICKING UP GAME OFF HIGHWAYS CAN BE ILLEGAL

AUSTIN Nov. 4—Only under very limited conditions is it legal to stop and pick up game animals that have been run down by an auto, warns the director of law enforcement, Texas Game and Fish Commission.

"The same laws that govern hunting game with firearms must be taken into consideration under all conditions," explained the director. "If it's illegal to have a particular species of game animal in possession, it doesn't make any difference whether you ran it down accidentally with an auto or shot it. You are still violating a law if you have one in possession."

"It's best not to take any chances," said the director. "If you accidentally hit a deer on the road, play it safe and notify the nearest game warden or peace officer. Don't pick it up. Just move it clear of the road."

Under no condition is it legal to run down intentionally a game animal with an auto.

When a warden is notified, he will pick the animal up and give it to charity. This is the only way to dispose of an illegal kill.

"Remember," suggested the director, "that laws governing possession when hunting and fishing hold true even when picking up

# 'Battle Border'



Little known facts about Texas boundaries.

A PUBLIC SERVICE OF THE TEXAS ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE.

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles outlining the numerous boundary conflicts dating back to 1716, pointing up little known facts which shaped the Texas of today.)

The Republic of Texas wanted annexation in 1837 but was rejected by Congress.

Sam Houston withdrew the offer and dreamed of a new republic stretching westward from Texas to the Pacific including the northern tier of Mexican states, plus present day New Mexico, Arizona, and California.

Attorney General Will Wilson, a great admirer of Houston, points out how skillfully Houston incited the jealousy of the United States.

"Sam Houston stoked the fire

under the pot of jealousy by ignoring the United States and dickering with France and England, both known to want Texas independent.

"Houston's vision of a large competitive nation between the U.S. and Mexico caused Washington to run a fever."

Annexation followed, resulting in the 1848 War with Mexico in which the Western one third of the present United States was acquired. During this war, Gen. Stephen W. Kearny led U.S. troops overland from Dodge City, Kansas, to capture Santa Fe and remain in possession.

Senator Benton in Congress immediately put the Santa Fe territory into a boiling caldron of debate over slavery by demanding

Texas was a slave state.

A full dress rehearsal of the coming tragedy of civil war began.

Texas sent Spruce M. Baird as county judge to take possession of Santa Fe, but Colonel John M. Washington kicked him out. Texas also sent Robert S. Neighbors as county judge of El Paso.

Since there were no federal troops in El Paso Judge Neighbors successfully established a beachhead and took possession for Texas.

Governor Bell of Texas called a special session of the legislature to organize 3,000 mounted volunteers to capture Santa Fe from the federal troops. The legislature gave Bell an out by providing that the troops be used only if the United States refused to buy the disputed territory.

This brought on another bitter division and debate in our national congress, compromised by fixing the present boundary between Texas and New Mexico and paying Texas ten million dollars for surrendered territory. Texas kept El Paso because she had possession, but Texas lost most of what is now New Mexico.

Historian Will Wilson says Texas got short changed again. Texas had no money in the

treasury but her northern and western boundary had been pushed down more than 100,000 square miles.

"The United States bought that real estate for 15 cents an acre!"

### High School Students Can Compete For Scholarships

Senior students at Copperas Cove high school are eligible to compete for more than 100 four-year college scholarships offered by General Motors under its National Scholarship Plan, according to Mr. Ayres, principal.

Full details of the competition, including registration dates for examination, are available in Mr. Ayres's office.

General Motors offers other scholarship opportunities. Under its College Plan 304 four-year college scholarships are awarded annually by 181 colleges and universities located in 50 states and the District of Columbia. A list of the participating colleges may be obtained from the principal's office. Selection of award winners under the College Plan is made by the respective colleges and universities. Students wishing to be considered under this plan should apply directly to the college of their choice.

Awards under both plans range from \$200 to \$2,000 per year depending on the student's needs.

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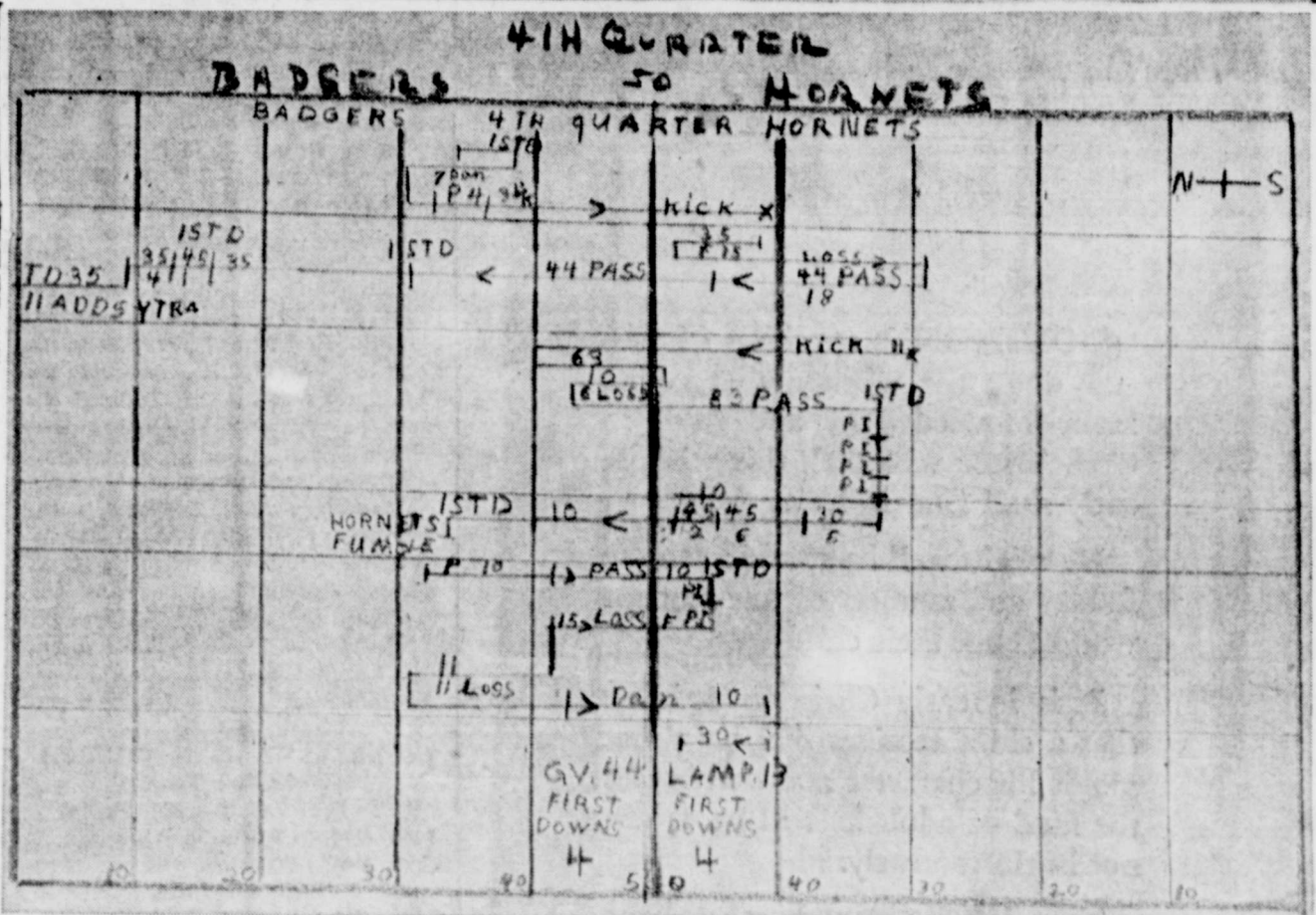
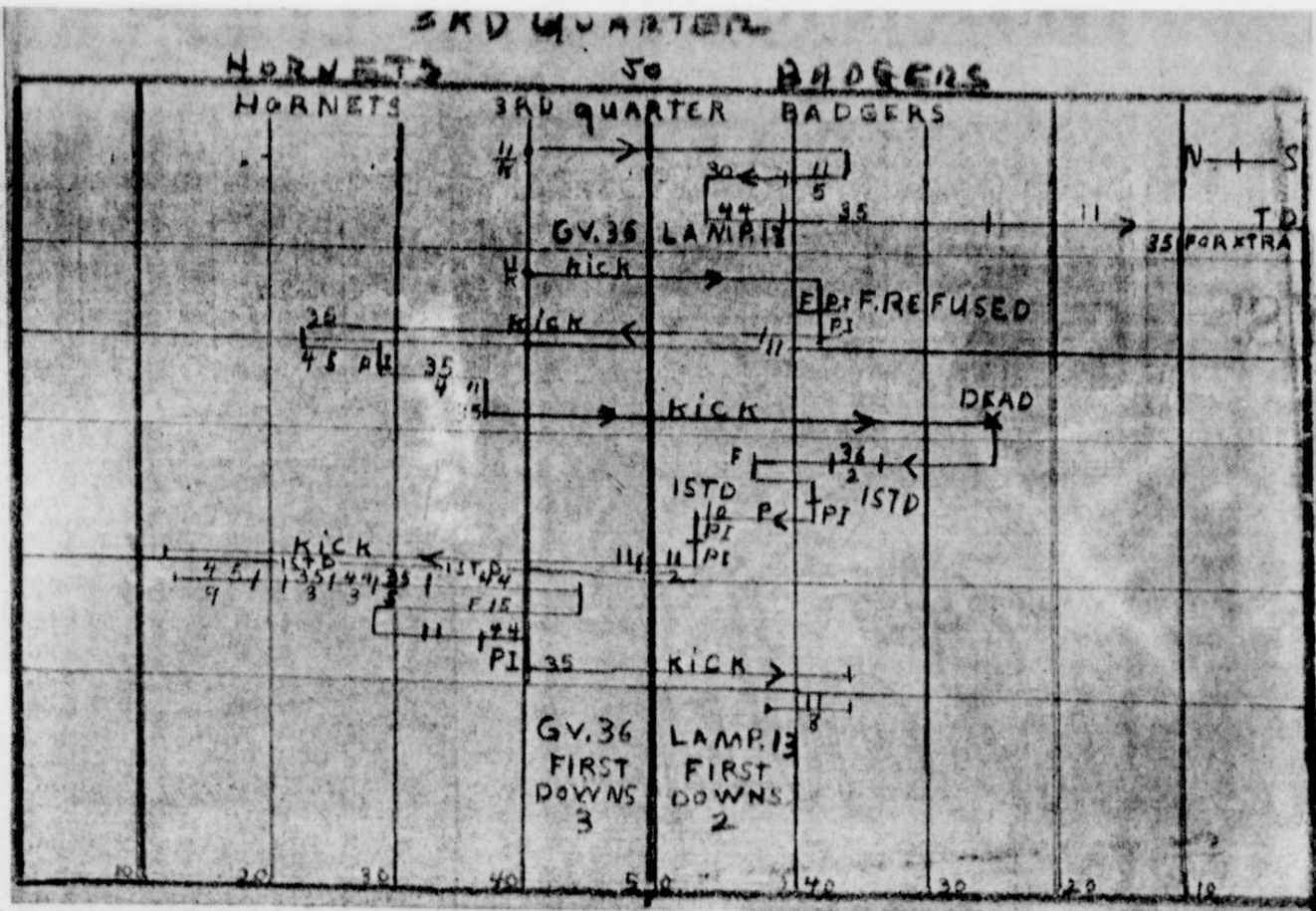

## Rains Cause Dangers To Public Health

The heavy rains a while back caused millions of dollars in property damage. Worse still, there was some loss of life.

Often accompanying such flash-flood activity is the danger of unsanitary conditions. These conditions range from improper sewage disposal to contamination of foodstuffs which must be destroyed.

One of the most important consequences is contamination of private water systems, especially rural wells. Heavy flooding invariably deposits surface contamination into such wells.

To remedy the situation, certain steps must be taken. The well should first of all be thoroughly pumped out to remove all sediment.

Next the well should be treated with a suitable chlorine-type disinfectant. Local health departments will recommend the one that is best for a particular situation.

After the chlorine compound is deposited the water should be circulated so that the chlorine solution reaches every part of the water system. Well, pump, all water lines, spigots — everything

### IRON CHLOROSIS SUBJECT OF NEW LEAFLET.....

Chlorosis is a condition which results when chlorophyll (the green coloring matter in plants) fails to develop or is destroyed. Iron chlorosis normally appears first on young leaves. The leaves of chlorotic plants range from light green to yellow to almost white.

Iron is necessary for the formation of chlorophyll. When iron is unavailable for plant use, chlorophyll fails to develop properly and plants exhibit chlorosis. Iron chlorosis is most prevalent on members of the grass family (such as St. Augustine grass, Johnson grass and grain sorghum) certain fruit trees (citrus and peaches) many vegetables (particularly beans) and many flowers and ornamentals. Most soils on which iron chlorosis occurs are well supplied with iron, but it is in a form a unavailable for plant use.

Chlorotic plants are more prevalent in areas with alkaline, calcareous soils such as we have here in Coryell County.

To control iron chlorosis, it is necessary to treat the soil so that iron becomes available, or else provide supplemental iron as a spray or soil application. Application of large amounts of well-rotted organic material on a regular basis make the soil less alkaline, resulting in more iron becoming available. Well-decomposed compost plus one pound powdered sulphur per 100 square feet can also be used to make the soil less alkaline. Acid peat can also be used. Iron sulfate or iron chelates are good sources for providing supplemental iron.

### BRUCELLOSIS, A SERIOUS

### THREAT TO LIVESTOCK

An all out effort for the eradication of brucellosis is now underway throughout the United States. Twenty-one states and more than one-half the nation's counties are now modified certified free. Of the 254 counties in Texas, only three - Jeff Davis, Brewster and Presidio are modified certified areas.

placement needs by 30 percent A beef cow that loses 20% her milk production will wean calf 10 percent lighter than normal, a substantial loss in the days of high beef prices.

Swine producers also lose from this disease. Infected sows abort or give birth to weak litters. Sows frequently become sterile follow abortion. The disease damages bones of the spine, with result paralysis in up to 20 percent infected animals.

Brucellosis is the most common cause of fistula of the withers horses. It frequently is responsible for waterbugs forming on knees both horses and cattle. In humans brucellosis is lingering disease the bloodstream, caused by having livestock or drinking unpasteurized milk. Although seldom fatal it causes feebleness, nervous disorders and other physical disturbances.

Less tangible losses occur in addition to the ones listed. Loss markets for Texas Breeding Stocker cattle has become a serious problem. The shortage of replacement stock is commanding attention. There is a constant threat of this disease becoming established in the sheep and goat flocks in Texas.
