"The same laws that govern hunting game with firea ms must all conditions," explained the dirctor. "If it's illegal to have a partcular species of game animal in possession, it doesn't make any dif. ference whether you ran it down accidentally with an auto or shot You are still violating a law if "It's one in possession "
's best not to take any chan, satd the director. "If you aclay it safly hit a deer on the road, it safe and notify the nearest Don't pick it up. Just move it clear f the road."
Under no condition is it legal to run down intentionally a game ani. al with an auto.
When a warden is notified, he will pick the animal up and give to charity. This is the only way to dispose of an illegal kill.
"Remember," suggested the director, that laws governing poss-
ession when hunting and fishing nold true even when picking up

The Republic of Texas wanted annevation in 1837 but was rejected by Congress
Sam Houston withdrew the offer and dreamed of a new republic stretching westward from
Texas to the Pacific the northern tier of Mexican states, plus present day New Mexico, Arizona, and California.

Attorney General Will Wilson, a great admirer of Houston, points out how skillfully Houston incited the jealously of the United States
"Sam Houston stoked the fire
under the pot of jealousy by ignoring the United States and dickering with France and England, both known to want Texa independent.

Houston's vision of a large competitive nation between the U.S. and Mexico cause"

Annexation followed, resulting in the 1848 War with Mexico in which the Western one third of the present United States was acquired. During this war, Gen. Stephen W. Kearny led U.S. troops overland from Dodge City, Kansas, to capture Santa Fe and remain in possession.
Senator Benton in Congress immediately put the Santa Fe territory into a boiling caldron of debate over slavery by demanding

The heavy rains a while back caused millions of dollars in prop erty damage. Worse still, there was some loss of life.
Often accompanying such flash flood activity is the danger of un sanitary conditions. These condi
tions range from improper sew age disposal to contamination of foodstuffs which must be destroy foods
ed.
One of the most important con sequences is contamination of private water systems, especial y rural wells. Heavy flooding in ination deposits surface
To remedy the situation, cer tain steps must be taken. The well should first of all be thor ougly pumped out to remove all sediment.
Next the well should be treat ed with a suitable chlorine-type disinfectant. Local health depart ments will recommend the one that is best for a particular sit uation
After the chlorine compound is deposited the water should be circulated so that the chlorine solution reaches every part of the water system. Well, pump, all wa

Mosquitoes can cause disease such as encephalitis (sleeping sickness) and should not be per mitted to breed on your prem ises.
All eating and drinking utenils should be disinfected also. (This is a weekly feature of Public Health Education Division Texas State Department of
Health.)
