tle known facts which shaped the Greer County lies at the base of the East side of the Texas Panhandle between the forks of Red

River. For many years people in that county did not know whether they

were part of Texas or Oklahoma. The trouble goes back to the treaty between the United States and Spain fixing Red River as boundary at a time when Texas Panhandle area was unexplored wild Indian territory.

They did not even know Red River had two forks.

In 1852, Captain R. B. Marcy discovered two forks of the river and attempted to locate on the ground the 100 meridan fixed in the old treaty as the northern boundary of Spanish territory. trouble.


