

This unique situation developed in 1913 when the US Supreme Court was asked to settle a conflict between New Mexico and Texas concerning the location of their common boundary in El Paso county.

Thsi line ran along the Rio Grande 15 miles as the crow flies, roughly from near An\_ thony, Texas o El Paso.

Attorney General Wilson says that the cunk of territory they scraped over was four miles wide

Each state agreed that the true boundary line was the middle of the date the Compromise of 1850 became effective.

While Spain had all of this territory seh established El Passo Del Norte where Camino Real route between Chihuahua and Santa Fe crossed the Rio Grande. There was no clear cut and fixed bocndary between Chihuahua nad New Mexico.

In 1824 the Mexican government settled this by a line drawn from east to west from he town of El Paso del Norte.

After the United States defeated Mexico in 1848 came the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo ceding the western one-thir of the present United States.

The line fixed in this treaty was based on an incorrect map location of El Paso. This led to much conwusion in land grants since lands in Texas were handled through Txas state government and lands in New Mexico through the federal government. o make matters worse the Rio Grande changed its course.

A compromise was reached by making the boundary the river bed as it was in 1850.
