





now have invested in agricultural surpluses through farm price supports that many of our people fail to recognize that surpluses are a relatively small part of total farm output.

In recent years these surpluses have represented onily five to eight per cent of annual production.

Now as to those billions of dollars U.S. taxpayers have tied up in agricultural surpluses: In the 25 years from 1933 to 1958, farm price support lossses have cost the taxpayers \$5,173,788, an average of about \$200 million---NOT billions-per year.

In the same period of time, the House Committee on Appriations has reported, BUSINESS reconversion payments by the government in tax allowances, ta adjustments, tax rebates and many other types of so-called "reconversion payments" have amounted to \$43,362,000,000 - more than eight timse as much.

It must always be born in min that the \$6.8 billion dollars the governmen notw has invested in farm surplus products on hand, mainly wheat, corn and cotton, can by no means be written off as a loss. The stocks are in storage, most of them will finally be sold, and experience has demonstrated that the eventual rate of recovery will be relatively high.

A nationwide poll of the nation's independent businessmen by the National Federation of bedding contracts, welfare state Independent Business reveals that almost 60% are in favor of H.R. 1207, sponsored by Rep.

This bill is a move toward solving one of the most critical national problems of the times.

It is quite amazing what can be accomplished by cheap labor. The retail prices in many imported hardware items are as much as 50% less than U. S. manufacturing costs.


Yet, ever since Russians fired first sputnik there has been a curious silence from those bo who were always shouting U.S. had a corner on all the brains in the world.

This does not seem possible in the foreseeable future. Another is wholesale slashes in American wages and standard of living. This also does not seem to be in the immediate offing. The only other alternative is to protect the American market with suitable tariff structures and reverse the trend that softheaded internationalist do goodrican manufac- ers have foisted in this country.

Do not use any cotton, paper or flammable material for decorating the tree or around the base of the tree. Do not place electric trains or other electric powered devices around the tree because metallic tinsel can fall across the tack, cause a short circuit and start the train transformer to burn.

Safe Toys

Avoid toys operated with flammable liquids. Nitrocellulose (it looks like celluloid or plastic) toys burn with surprising ferocity. Some imported toys are made of these flammable materials.

Select electrical appliance gifts with fire-safety in mind. Choose only those electrical toys and tree-deco stive lighting sets which are laboratory approved. If there is bubt ask your Fire Department if they are approved.

Never place lighted candles in windows. Sentiment and flame do not mix! Keep the curtains or any other flammable material at windows pulled back at least 6 inches from any electric candles or wreaths.

Fire Hazards

As you unwrap gifts on Christmas Day, put all the wrappings in a carton and dispose of them promptly. Don't let them pile up around the tree, the fireplace, or any heating device.

Christmas costumes and paper or cloth decorations can be flame-proofed by dipping them into the following solution, wringing them by hand and allowing them to dry: 3 quarts water, 7 oz. horax, 3 oz. boric acid.



Outdoor Decorations Are Very Popular

Decorating outdoor trees and shrubbery with brightly-colored lights is becoming more and more an American tradition, but while outdoor lighting is attractive and colorful, it is also dangerous and may cause damage to trees and greenery.

Bulbs of 15 wattage are sufficient for use in outdoor lighting arrangements. Electrical fixtures should be of the weatherproof variety, specally designed for outdoor use, and the lights should always be placed so that they do not touch the needles.

Spruce, pines and firs, if they are not too large, are ideal for outdoor Yuletide lighting dsplays, although other varieties such as hemlock, yew, boxwood and aborvitae are more sensitive to heat and easily scorched if caution is not used

Selection of Proper **Toys Important**

There is no hard and fast rule by which one can tell the exact toy for a certain age child, but some toys are better than others


