OLD CORPORATION GETS NEW NAME NOW FEDERAL LAND BANK ASS'N, WACO

The National Farm Loan Association of Waco which has made loans in this area for more than 40 years has a new name effective December 31, 1959. According to JACK ROACH, Secretary - Treasurer, the association is the FEDERAL LAND BANK ASSOCIATION OF WACO beginning December 31, as a result of the Farm Credit Act of 1959, and he is "Manager" instead of Secretary-Treasurer.

In addition to Mr. Roach, the officers and directors of the association are: Dr. L. W. Helm, President, Ed Koonsman, Vice President, Dave Simons, Hubert Miller, Virgil Lockhart, J. W. Weaver and Frank Lichnovsky, Members. Mr. C. H. Hoel, Clifton, Texas, is Assistant Manager and Mrs. Bobbie Harper is Office Assistant.

Another change permitted by the new law which is of interest to Farmers and Ranchers is the removal of the \$200,000 loan limit. Also, the new law provides that sums loaned to purchase capital stock in the Federal Land Bank Association can be over and above the present loan limit of 65 per cent of the normal agricultural value of the far mor ranch mortgaged.

Mr. Roach stated that the association is now servicing 1158 Federal Land Bank loans for about \$5,197,000 for land owners in the three county area served by the association.

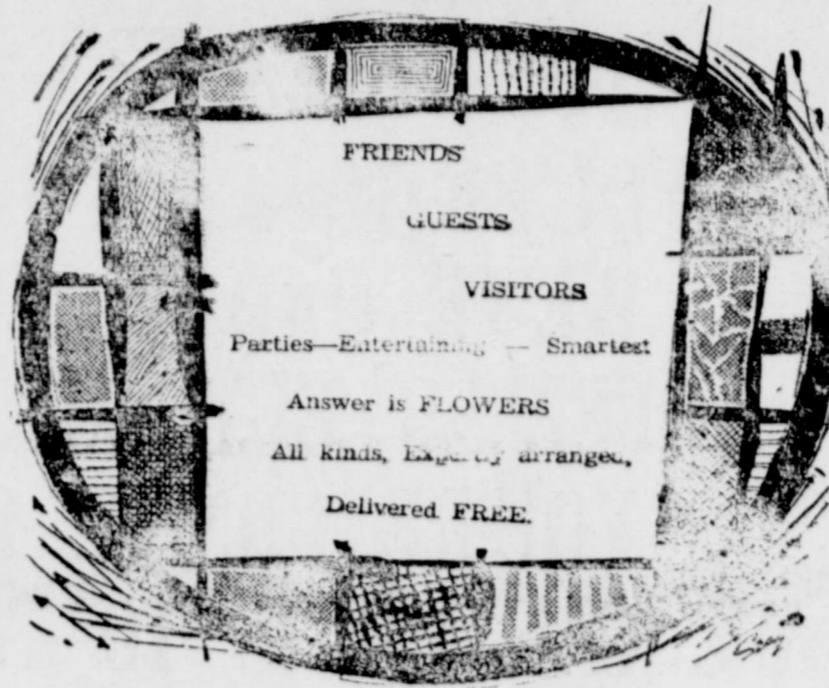

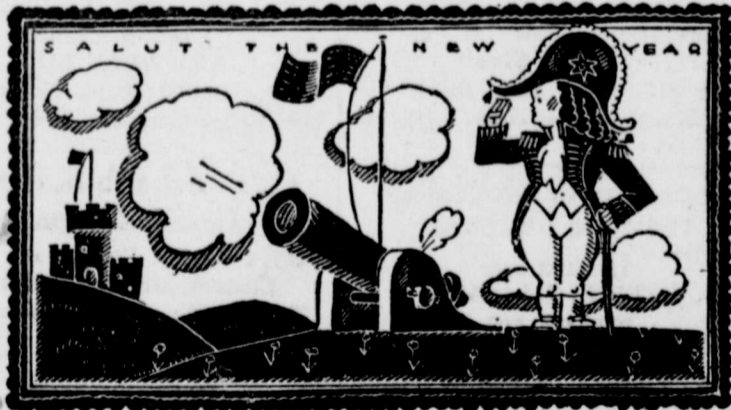

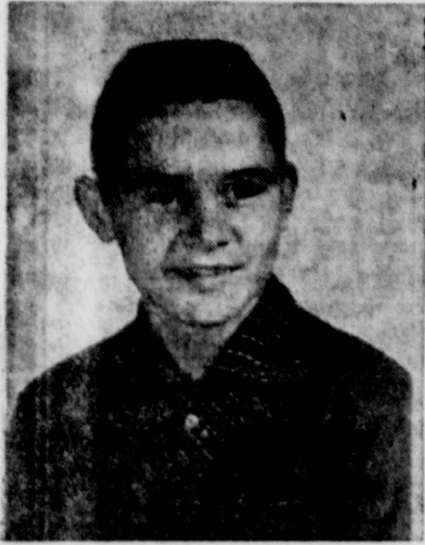

had summoned his Judges and demanded that their decisions should give preference to the King's interests. Coke resisted the King, and held to the position that King and common man alike were subject to the law, and that all men regardless of rank or station, were entitled to justice in the Courts, nothing more and nothing less.

Hertofore, our district has been fortunate to have Judges presiding over our Courts who have carried on in the tradition of Coke, men who have been recognized over the entire State as outstanding Jurists, and known for their fair, just and impartial decisions. I can only promise that I will carry on in this tradition as God gives me the wisdom and understanding to do that which is fair, just and proper."

Mr. Cobb served as District Attorney of his district for six years, 1951 to 1956. He served four years as County Judge at Brady, 1936 to 1940, before coming to Comanche in 1948. He has been in the active practice of law

for 25 years, excepting four years spent in the Army during World War II.

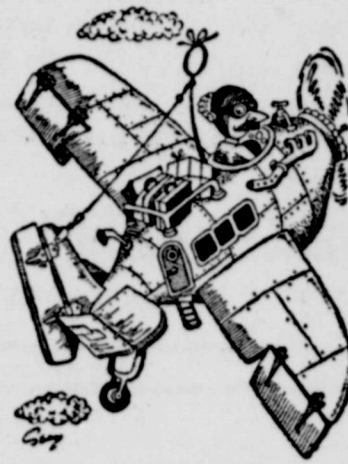

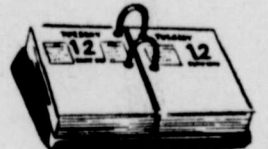
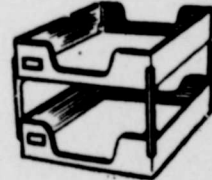

help of Oklahoma's blustery, colorful Governor William J. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray.

Murray, governor of the Sooner state from 1931-35, figured prominently in the "Bridge War" of 1931 between Texas and Oklahoma.

"The Bridge War grew out of the differences of opinion between Alfalfa Bill and Texas officials concerning the opinion of three 'free bridges' spanning the Red River," Attorney General Will Wilson explains.

Built as a joint effort of Texas and Oklahoma they were intended to provide highway travelers with toll-free passage over the river.

In the spring of 1931 three of the new bridges were nearing completion—the Ringgold - Terrel bridge near Wichita Falls; another crossing the river north of Gainesville; and a third span between Denison and Durant, Oklahoma.

By mid-summer the bridges were still not in use and Alfalfa Bill, long a champion of free bridges, grew impatient with the continued delay.

In spite of the fact that half of each bridge lay within the Texas borders, the Oklahoma governor ordered the bridges open. He was also conspicuously unimpressed with the fact that the Gainesville bridge was still under construction on the Texas side while the Denison free bridge had been ordered by the Federal Court in Houston not to open until settlement of certain legal disputes between the owners of the nearby toll bridges and the Texas Highway Commission.

Traffic, swelled by thousands of curious sightseers, began to flow across the bridges.

Crossing the Gainesville bridge a large truck found the Texas side impassible, couldn't back off the bridge and so remained suspended over the Red River until morning.

The Ringgold-Terrel free bridge operated without incident.

At Denison, however, Alfalfa Bill's action defied both the State of Texas and the federal judiciary. Governor Ross S. Sterling promptly ordered the bridge closed. Texas Rangers rushed to the scene, ordered barriers rebuilt of heavy logs and beams to be guarded indefinitely.

Alfalfa Bill responded by throwing up a barrier across the Oklahoma side and ordered highway workers to plow up 200 feet of the road approaching the toll bridge. He then declared the bridge under martial law.

The Texas legislature passed an urgent resolution exhorting representative Sam Rayburn to press for passage of Federal legislation aimed at breaking the deadlock.

Meanwhile Gov. Murray moved troops to the Denison bridge and appeared in person from time to time to review his men, wearing a campaign hat and packing an old pistol.

After a few days, an uneasy truce was effected.

By fall a flurry of legal actions were under way. The toll bridge company obtained an injunction against further interference with the operation of their bridge.

The Bridge War was brought to a final end when the toll bridge company's suit against the State of Texas was won by the state, represented by the late James V. Allred, then Attorney General.

So Texas had fought over practically all of her boundaries—with Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Old Mexico. But the most persistent and aggressive of the land biters had been the federal government.

Attorney General Will Wilson's present case with the Federal
