So now we come to the end of Texas agriculture ever had-but net farm income is dropping down a full 15 per cent below 1958.

The 1959 Texas cotton crop is estimated at around $4,500,000$ bales, compared with $4,308,000$ bales in 1958. Sorghum grain production is figured at about $277,000,000$ bushels for 1959 , a little up from the $273,066,000$ little up from the 273,0
bushels harvested in 1958.
Rice production for the year is running at $13,136,000$ hundred weight, against $11,938,000$ cwt. in 1958. The corn is due to exceed 41,366,000 bushels, also up from 1958. The Rio Grande Valley is well under way with at least a nine million box citrus season, up
two million from 1958 and the two million from 1958 and the first real bumper
trous freeze in 1951 . Ranges and livestock in general are in their best condition in the past 10 years. There were an estimated $8,510,000$ cattle on Texas ranges at the beginning of the year, along with $5,355,0$
