#### Two Semis In Accident On Leon River Bridge S. on Hwy. 36 Thurs.

About 9:20 Thursday night on Highway 36 5 miles southeast of Gatesville two semi-trailer trucks were in an accident in the middle of the Leon Rver Bridge.

Harvey Arthur Thomas, Lubbock, driving a '59 Chevy truck semi-trailer loaded with HD compressed cotton bales, stopped at a narrow place in the bridge to let traffic going the other direction by. The bridge is in process of being widened 6 feet.

Rex Juan Kegley, of Pasadena, driving a '47 Diamond-T Truck semi-trailer, loaded with cotton seed oil, hit the left side of the back end of Thomas' truck, knocking loose onnen of the 8 rear wheels, and mving the other 7 out of place. Some 10 or more bales of cotton were unloaded off that truck. Kegley, was taken to Coryell Memorial Hospital where he has had stitches on his nose and knee, and a neck injury, in addition to abrasions on his arms and body. The Diamond-T tractor was practically demolished and a gaping hole was knocked in the forward tank of the tank part of the truck, and cottonseed oil spilled all over the bridge. Damage to that truck was \$14,000 or more, and the trailer part of the other truck had ruined trucks under the back, but the other part didn't seem damaged extensively.

Kegeley was filed on for disregarding warning signs at a construction location. The bridge widening is a part of the new widening from the junction of U. S. 84 at Gatesville to North Ft. Hood.

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**BROILER MARKET REACTION**

Statements by Secretary Flemming of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare against the fitness of poultry treated with the drug known as stilbestrol brought a prompt and bitter reaction from spokesmen for the Texas broiler industry.

These spokesmen saw their markets dangerously threatened and, in fact, all but hamstringed by the Secretary's statements. They spoke out in strong resentment among other outlets, thru Radio Station KDET and the East Texas network out of Center, one of the headquarters of the East Texas broiler industry.

The radio network charged that "there was no good whatsoever to be gained by the statement from Flemming. His own piece of propaganda confessed that manufacturers of stilbestrol had suspended the sale of the product and that the poultry industry had arranged for the immediate dis-

continuation of the sale of treated birds.

"The consuming public has been given the impression that all chickens are suspect because poultry is the one word repeated and reiterated in Flemming's statements. Actually, only an infinitesimal fraction of poultry received stilbestrol. No reassurance from Secretary Flemming will undo the damage from his irresponsible action.

"The consuming public has been could not have been more untimely for the broiler producer locally and nationwide. For the first time in many months live broilers had reached a peak of 19 cents per pound and there was a strong demand which would undoubtedly have put a little Christmas change in the pockets of thousands of growers. That prospect was destroyed overnight.

"The market tumbled here to 15 cents within four days, and instead of clearing out the offerings

at each day's auction the Southwest Poultry Exchange is now stagnated with a daily carry-over of 150,000 to 200,000 broilers.

"It is reported that the auction at Springdale, Ark. failed to move a single bird the day after the Flemming nightmare hit the headlines. The broiler industry, as everybody knows, is in dire circumstances without having to combat adverse government publicity."

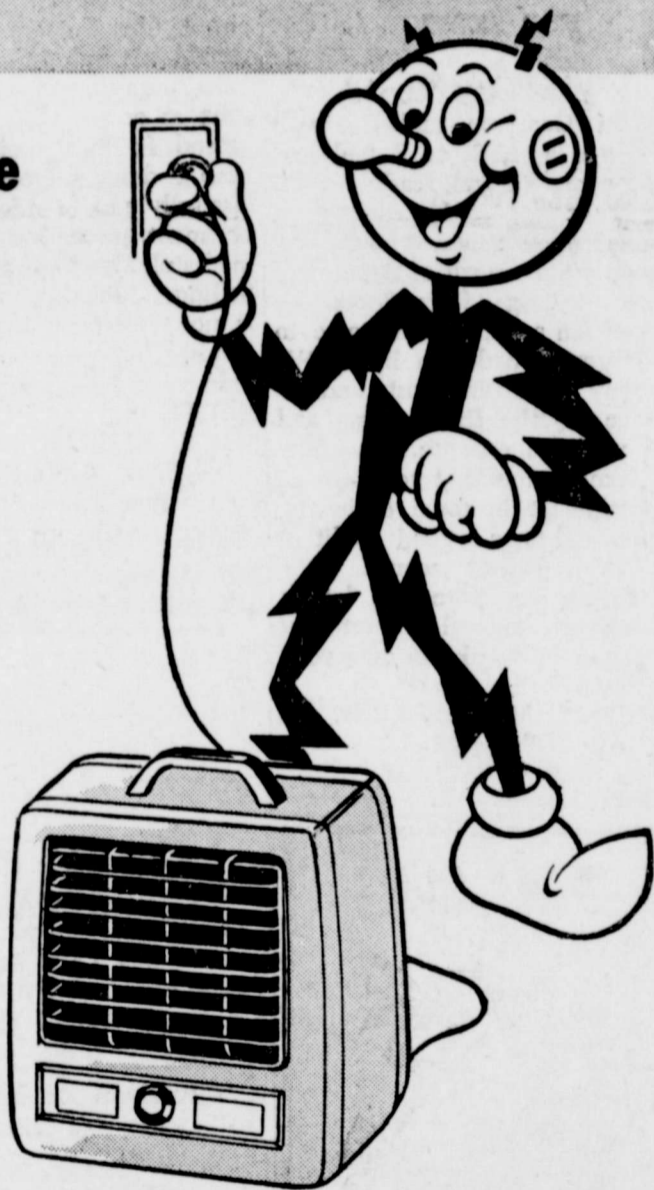

### TAX FACTS FOR THE HOMEOWNER NO. 2

## Buying, Selling Or Improving Your Home

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

**IN TODAY'S** economy, with constantly rising prices and land values, it is quite common for the family man to look upon his home as an investment. Not that he entertains the idea of selling it necessarily, but at least he knows that it will probably climb in value, and that he could then sell it if he wanted to. However, as an investment, the ownership of a home differs in many respects from the ownership of stocks or bonds, and these differences have important tax implications that you should be aware of.

### Changing Your Residence

If you sell your house (which is your principal residence) at a profit and move to a new house, you may not have to pay tax on the profit. Let's say you bought a house five years ago for \$15,000, which you sold last year for \$20,000. Since you held the house for more than six months, the profit of \$5,000 is taxable as a long-term capital gain at a maximum rate of 25 per cent. However, if you move into a new house either one year before or one year after the sale, and if the new house costs \$20,000 or more, then you pay no tax on the \$5,000 profit. If you are having the new house built for yourself and construction begins either one year before or one year after the sale of the old house, then the period of replacement is extended to eighteen months from date of sale, providing you occupy it within that period.

The important point here is that the new house must cost as much or more than the amount you receive for the old house. If it cost only \$19,000, you must pay the long-term capital gains tax on the balance of \$1,000.

You could actually sell your house at a profit and buy a new one every few years without paying a tax on the profit, but you aren't really avoiding the tax, you are merely postponing it. The cumulative gain will be taxed when the last house is finally sold without being replaced.

### Expenses of Owning a House

A home owner is usually in a more advantageous tax position than a person who rents. This is because home owners who elect to itemize their deductions can use the standard 10

to deduct interest and property taxes paid during the year. They can also deduct the loss on damage to their house and grounds resulting from a fire, storm, earthquake, or other casualty (this was discussed in the first article of the series). Taxpayers who rent their homes from others undoubtedly are paying for these costs by rent, but they cannot claim any tax deduction.

### Home Improvements and Repairs

Repairs to your home are considered personal expenses. They are not deductible, and for tax purposes, do not increase the cost of your house. Although repairs and maintenance costs are not deductible, they can be used to reduce the amount which must be spent on a new house in order to postpone payment of tax on the gain. However, this only applies to such costs if they are incurred within 90 days before contracting to sell the house, or paid within 30 days after.

Improvements to your house are not deductible either, but they do increase the cost of your house. This is an important point to remember when planning to sell your house. To determine the amount you will gain from the sale of your house, add the cost of improvements you have made to the original cost of the house and subtract the total from the selling price. If you bought it for \$15,000, added \$2,000 worth of improvements, and sold it for \$20,000, your gain would be \$3,000.

When you invest in a home, it is almost like investing in a business. To be able to take advantage of the legitimate tax considerations you are entitled to, you will need to keep accurate records of your various expenses. So don't forget to save

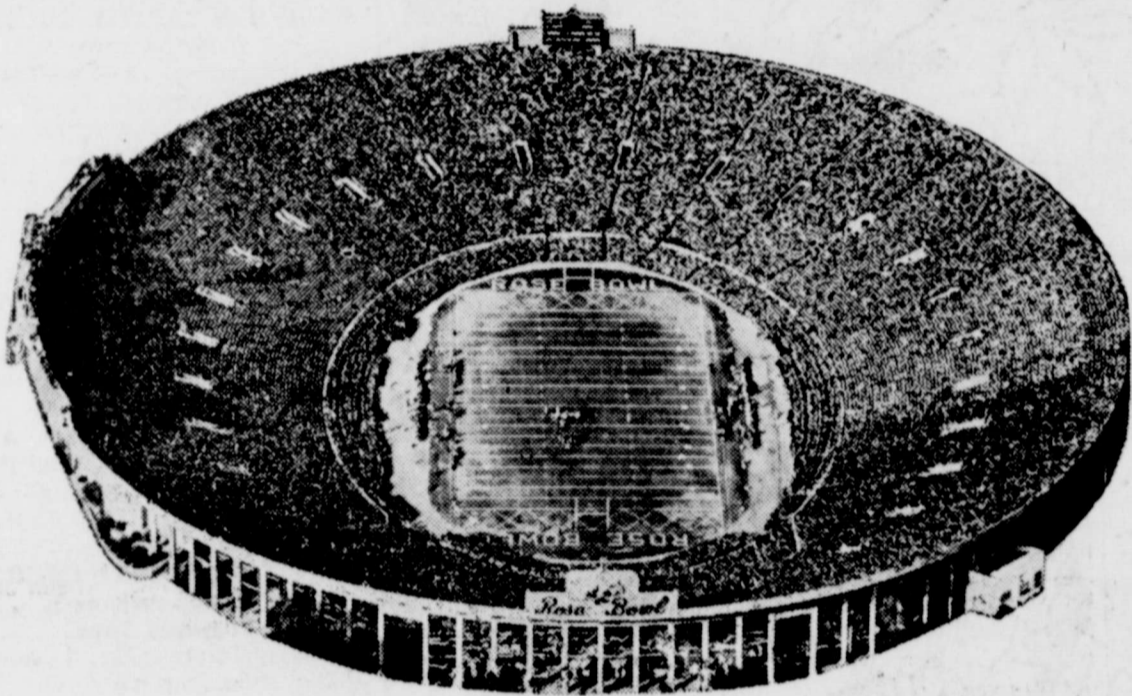



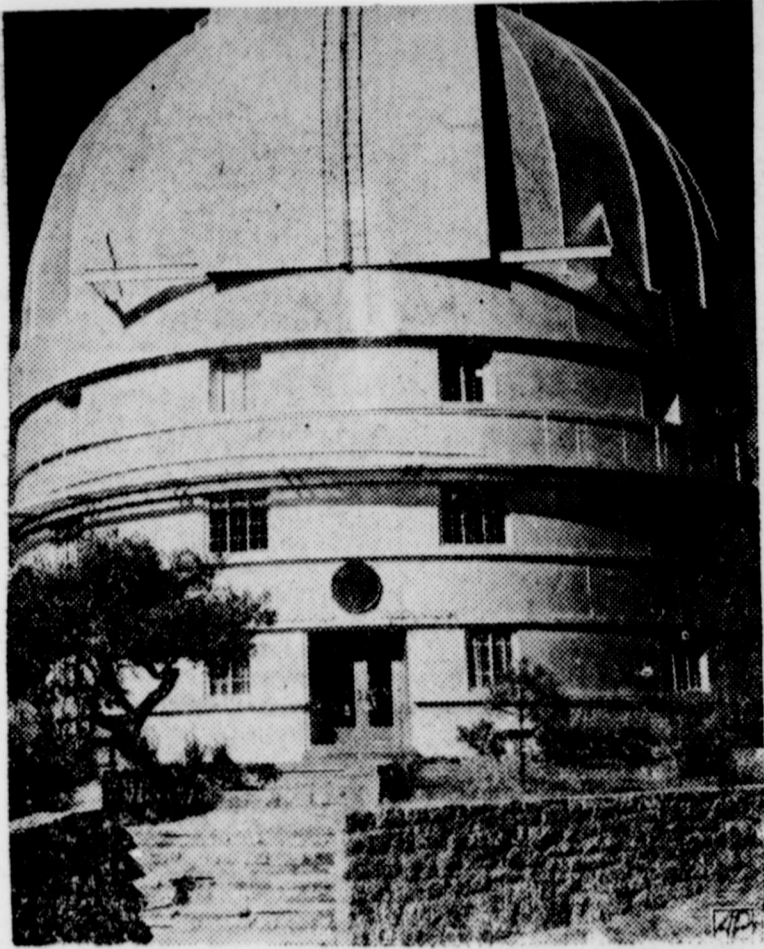

**MCDONALD OBSERVATORY IS BECOMING MORE TEXAS: CHANGES BEING MADE**

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 7, (AP)—McDonald Observatory, owned by the University of Texas but operated in large part by the University of Chicago, is becoming more Texas.

The observatory houses the world's fourth largest telescope. It is atop 6,791-foot Mt. Locke in the Davis Mountains of far West Texas.

Depending on his needs, a graduate student now may begin astronomy studies either at Austin or Chicago, spend a year at Chicago's Yerkes Observatory at Williams Bay, Wis., and one or more years at McDonald with trips to another large observatory to be built soon in Chile for southern hemisphere viewing.

Upon graduation, the Texas student will receive a joint degree from the two schools.

Chairman and director of McDonald Observatory is Dr. Gerald P. Kuiper, considered by many the world's foremost authority on the solar system.

When most of Texas has bedded down for the night, Dr. Kuiper opens the doors to the giant five-story dome and begins his watch on the zodiac, the pathway in which the planets, the moon, and the sun cross the heavens from east to west.

An imaginative public knows Dr. Kuiper best for his 15-year study of Mars. The 53-year-old Dutchman believes most of the red planet's surface is a vast windswept, yellow-ocher desert devoid of the famed canals but supporting lichen, the moss-like growth found on rocks of the earth.

It was Dr. Kuiper who established that Mars' atmosphere had a small amount of carbon dioxide, a necessary element to plant life as we know it.

He has also announced that Pluto is not a planet but probably a former satellite of Neptune which has strayed.

In 1948 he discovered Miranda, the fifth satellite of Uranus which he named after a Shakespeare character in "The Tempest."

Dr. Kuiper also determined that the rings of Saturn are composed of snow or ice-covered particles which account for their beauty.

Assistant chairman of the joint department is Dr. Frank N. Edmonds Jr., who has been teaching at the main campus in Austin since 1952.

Dr. Edmonds is currently attempting to calculate temperature fluctuations of the sun's surface by investigating bright spots which are presumably currents of turbulent gasses rising and falling.

The problem is related to the strange temperature reversal on the sun where the outermost layer of the solar atmosphere is more than 100 times as hot as the temperature on the surface. To complicate matters the temperature zooms to even greater heights at the sun's center, thus leaving a comparatively cold surface between the two hotter areas.

Newest member of the department is Dr. Harold L. Johnson. He is credited with the present worldwide magnitude scales used with photoelectric photometers, telescopic attachments which allow researchers, to "see dead or dying stars 15 to 20 times as dim as can be observed by the eye or camera through the normal telescope.

Dr. Johnson divides his time between the main university in Austin and McDonald Observatory.

A Chicago member of the department, Dr. William W. Morgan, with the help of two other astronomers, first mapped the spiral arms of the Milky Way. Their map clearly revealed that the gigantic pinwheel of billions of stars, in which our sun and its planets are located, has giant twisting arms comprised of gas, dust and stars spiralling out from the center.

Dr. W. Albert Hiltner, also of Chicago University, has helped dispel early thought that interstellar space was a vast emptiness which is void of everything.

He recently announced that starlight from the Milky Way is polarized—brighter in one direction than another. The polarization results when light passes through great clouds of tiny dust particles floating through space. The particles of these interstellar clouds are not round, but rather needle-shaped. Oriented in certain directions, they allow light to pass with greater ease one way than another.

The polarization is regarded as evidence for the possible existence of weak magnetic fields in space. Indeed, Dr. Hiltner, using the polarization as a guide, has mapped what may be a magnetic field. Dr. Hiltner recently supervised the installation of a new 36-inch telescope atop Mt. Locke.

The larger telescope (82 inches) is exceeded in size only by three giants in California. But it has certain advantages in that it is higher, has better weather allowing more hours of viewing, and is farther south, thus scanning a portion of the universe not seen by the other three.

If the earth were flat, the instrument's accuracy and power would allow the viewing of a man in Lima, Peru, from Houston—some 3,000 miles.

The success of the newly formed joint department spurred university administrators to go a step further and try the co-operative effort on an international basis. Recently, South America's University of Chile was brought into the program.

Dr. Jurgen Stock, resident astronomer at McDonald, is now studying several sites in the mountains of Chile for a 60-inch telescope to be installed under the sponsorship of the three universities and the National Science Foundation.

The Chilean telescope will be outranked south of the equator by two 74-inch telescopes, one in Africa, the other in Australia. Significantly, however, the new telescope will be at a much greater altitude (7,000 to 9,000 feet), thus minimizing atmospheric better images.

**ATTRACTIVE EQUITIES DEPRESSED BY TAX SELLING**

Traditionally at the end of the year investors and speculators alike are offered some unusually good values in stocks which have been depressed by tax selling: that is, stocks selling near their lows of the year which investors have sold for the purpose of establishing capital losses for income tax purposes. In the year 1959 when we have had an unusually sharp rise in stock prices generally, the rise was marked with selectivity and as a result there are some issues whose performance has been disappointing. There may be good reason for the decline in some of these issues, but it has probably been overdone as a result of the tax selling which has taken place in the last couple of months.

Several of these stocks are classified as quality investments according to the leading investment services. Recently the leadership of the stock market has changed from the electronics, space and so-called glamor stocks to the investment-grade stocks.

This change is not surprising in view of the fact that many institutional funds have money for investment at this time. As institutional buying should run well into January many of the so-called, oversold, depressed issues offer rather unusually good values which should attract some of this investment money. The oils have been a particular target of tax selling, although there is no indication of any great improvement in their general picture for the next year or so. Many of them nevertheless offer rather unusually good investment values. The stocks which we have selected in the investment group as good values to purchase at the present time are: American Can, Atlantic Refining, Lone Star Cement, Ohio Edison, Socony Mobil and Union

nified by tax selling fall in the businessman's risk column. Many of these issues have not fared too well in 1959, but are expected to turn in considerably improved performances in 1960. Our selections are: American Airlines, Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul; General Dynamics; Harshaw Chemical; Island Creek Coal and Phelps Dodge. For the investor willing to assume slightly more risk than normally assumed by investment-grade stocks these issues are recommended.

In our final category we have selected a group of speculations, some of them relatively low-priced which we feel should do very well in 1960. In some cases 1959 performances have been disappointing and in other cases they have not been at all bad. Nevertheless for one reason or another they have been targets of selling which have depressed the issues and in turn generated further tax selling. Stocks in this group should only be bought by more speculation-minded people, realizing there is a relatively fair degree of risk involved. Our selections include: Curtis Publishing, Decoa Record, Gabriel, Northwest Airlines and 20th Century-Fox.

Obviously there are a great many more issues that should be selected in any of these three categories and in fact some of them may outperform the ones we have listed.

In selecting other issues the investor should bear in mind the reasons the stocks were depressed in 1959 other than through tax selling, their prospects for 1960 and based on their prospects for 1960, their relatively true value as compared to their present market value.
