

DISSECTING DEMOCRACY Felix Morley, in his new book,

"Freedom and Federalism" (Regnery, \$5.00), has supplied Americans with 300 pages of the kind of wisdom the "liberals" are sure Coryell Today - Local News to try to kill by silence, but which everyone seeking under-1 standing will cherish.

With perception and historic perspective Dr. Morley tells how our federal republic has been slowly,o often unwittingly, eroded by the idea of "democracy."

The Founding Fathers feared democracy. The reason: the history of democracies has always been one of self-destruction and final tyranny as majorities, led by demagogues, ride rough-shod over the undefended rights of individuals and manorities.

It was to save us from this that the framers of the Constitution carefully provided a government of balanced, limited power with guarantee of God-given rights which no majority may violate.

What this federal system means to all of us, and what we need to understand if we are to resist the drift toward centralized power so cleverly disguised under the name of "democracy," Felix Morlev's book makes remarkably clear. I have seldom read a book I can recommend so urgently! -69-

"My great grandfather, Everet Lamont Sydney, panned gold from a secret stream and by 1875 was the richest man in California," said Mrs. Sydney, a sly twinkle in her eye.

"On his death bed, he told two old prospectors, Jepp Hanson and Oscar Tyre, the way to the stream and agreed to let them pan for gold, providing they swore never to divulge the location or make more than one trip themselves.

"Jepp and Oscar signed a contract, which stated: "Whatever gold Jepp Hanson and Oscar Tyre or any individual in their expedition can carry by himself from the stream to the home of Everet Sydney shall be given said individual."

"Naturally, Jepp and Oscar didn't bring anyone else in on their bonanza. They set out by themselves the next morning, having loaded Jepp's old mule with enough tools and provisions to stay in the wilds six months.

'They had hardly got to the stream when a landslide buried their equipment. All the two prospectors salvaged were the shorts they wore at night, the mule, and two pans.

"Since the contract said they could make only one trip, they stayed on, living off wild berries and nuts. After five months they stayed on, living off wild berries and nuts. For here is thrown into sharp relief the international med-dling mental complex of those who do so much tom tom beating for foreign relief programs.

For here is a group of bu-reaucratic meddlers who take it upon themselves to decide that birth control should be practiced in foreign lands, and regardless of how the people in these lands may feel about the matter, they were determined to assess the American taxpayer to propagandize this idea to the foreign peoples.

And this is perhaps also another reason why U. S. foreign aid programs have built up dis-

After all, people in other lands have their own customs, habits, and beliefs. And as-

While the furor over whether American tax money should be can bureaucrats, looking around

And perhaps it is natural. Any time a group of relatively minor people are given bil-lions to throw away around the world, with very little control or check on their activities, they can in a short time attain an Almighty complex that is wondrous and fearful to behold.

But that basic purpose of the postwar program seems to have largely been forgotten, per-haps because the need is not nearly so urgent.

But rather than admit there is not enough to keep the big foreign aid staffs gainfully employed, new and screwier projects must be invented.

Thus this idea to use U. S. tax money to promote world wide birth control was born.

What project these fertile bureaucratic brains will think of
