lectures, which began in 1918 as talks for students at Abilene Christina College and grew into the largest annual gathering of denomination members.



Nine thousand men and women | representing almost all states and several foreign countries are expected for the five-day lectures. Of all the annual meetings held in Abilene, the ACC Bible Lectureship is the largest. And each year it gets larger.

Hotels, restaurants and parking lots will be strained to handle the crowd. The normal population of the ACC campus will soar from about 2,500 to about 11,500.

About 2,000 of the visitors will be church leaders - ministers, elders and Bible School teachers. But most of them will simply be church members.

"The lectures have helped the leaders of the church all over the world to learn better ways of accomplishing the work of the church, and to be inspired to carry it out, says Dr. J. D. Thomas, ACC's professor of Bible.

Dr. Thomas is director of the Lectureship and is scheduled to deliver one of the principal talks. His subject will be "The Present Status of the Doctrine of Organic Evolution." Speakers will represent 10 states and three foreign countries.

VALLEY'S BIG CITRUS SEASON

The Rio Grande Valley is about half-way through its first 9,000,-000 to 10,000,000 box citrus season since the disastrous freezes of 1949-51, and improved quality of the fruit is a key point in the recovery program.

The 1959-60 citrus season is figured to yield at least 3.000,000 boxes more than the 1958-59 season, and the Valley is well on its way toward getting back to the peak production years of the late 1940's.

Hard freezes in 1949-51 cut Valley citrus production to 3,000,000 boxes and less, but rapid progress has been made since 1952 in the rehabilitation of the industry.

A few orange trees planted in the 18th century on a Spanish grant north of Edinburg in Hidalgo County are believed to have been the first citrus grove in Texas. Scattered citrus plantings were growing along the Texas Gulf Coast from Victoria to Brownville by the 1850's. By the turn of the century in 1900, however, it had been proven that with the exception of some production in the Winter Garden area, citrus crops could not be grown successfully outside of the Lower Rio Grande Valley counties of Cameron, Hidalgo, Willacy and Starr.

It was not until 1904 that the first commercial grapefruit grove in the Valley was planted. By 1925, about 80 per cent of the Texas citrus crop consisted of grapefruit. Oranges accounted for about 15 per cent, and limes, lemons, tangerines and kumquats for five per cent. The Valley was shipping some 500 boxes of citrus

the 1949-51 freezes. Since that, the quality improvement program has brought the red-blush types, notable the Rudy Red, to the front and nearly all Valley production in now based on these improved types.

The large canning industry that had developed in the peak years of Valley citrus production turned. to processing vegetables and other products while the citrus groves were being established, and this remains a vital and dependable part of the Valley's economy.

CHEMICAL SAFETY

A soothing reassurance to the bitter reaction which developed from scare headlines prompted by Secretary Arthur B. Flemming of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare on use of chemical and drugs in agriculture has been issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In one of those examples of a Federal department seeking to undo and correct damage which might have been done by another Federal department, the USDA asserted that "our food supply in the U. S.is the safest, cleanest and most wholesome in the world."


Then the USDA went on to say that "a wide variety of chemicals are used today in all phases of food production, processing, and rnarketing. They include chemical fertilizers, insecticides, and weed and perservatives; feed additives, fumigants, fungicides, and others.

"These chemicals are as essential for efficient production of foods on the farm as are tractors, improved varieties of crops, and better breeds of livestock. They play as great a part in assuring consumers a continuing supply of eat that we enjoy today.'

right through it. Even the steel strike hasn't seemed to effect business here outside of the automobile boys.

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
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
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



VA Budget Request Is Over 5 Billion

IS UVER 5 Billion The total VA budget request for new fiscal year is \$5,483,845,000, an increase of slightly less than six percent over the \$5,156,721,000 Wee're bouildeling appropriated a year ago.

The largest single item in the new budget request, \$3,840,000,000 is for compensation and pension payments to veterans and dependents, an increase of \$435-million over the Fiscal Year 1960 figure. The budget request for general operating expensive is \$154,054,000; in Fiscal 1960, it was \$166,190,000. The recommended appropriation of \$903,502,000 for inpatient and utpatient care reflects about a percent increase.

Another program expected to ow a decline involves veterans' surance and indemnities. This rogram is expected to reflect a eduction of \$4.2-million compared with last year. Present request is \$48,800,000, while a year ago, it was \$53-million dollars.

The Veterans Administration budget foresees the need for funds amounting to 175-million dollars for the planned and orderly moderni zation and replacement of some existing obsolete VA hospitals. This proposed figure, reflecting \$43-mil ion dollars more than construction funds a year ago, is part of a long range \$90%-million dollar plan to be spread over twelve con



Tales of Old Waco



During the period in which records have been kept of Waco's weather the variation has been from a low temperature to 10 legrees below zero in February 1899 to a high in 1936 of almost 109 degrees, and from a wet 60.20 nches of rain during the year 1905 to a dry 13.29 inches in 1917. Waco has had its storms, floods and tornadoes but probably the nost unusual occurance was in February 1888

About the middle of a hot sultry afternoon a cloud, described as 'a strange and frightening thing. was seen approaching from the north. It was rolling along the ground and had the appearance of being loaded with fire. It seemed to swallow up the trees and consume the earth as it came. Withn seconds after it arrived it was so dark large objects could be seen a distance of only a few eet and within minutes ice was everywhere. Linotype Becomes Ghost Machine As Holey Tape Passes Through

By R. W. JORDAN

The Waco Citizen a few weeks ago installed a Fairchild Teley typesetter. A \$5,000, ultra-modera gadget which automatically sets type from perforated paper tape which looks somewhat like the piano rolls of other days.

The installation of this speed type-setting machine, together with the Scan-a-graver installed some months ago, makes the Citizer plant, as modern perhaps as any semi-weekly newspaper plant ir the southwest.

The Fairchild Scan-a-graver a comparitively small, unpretentious machine covering a little more than ten square feet of space in the editorial room. But the little gadget is a marvel in elecronics. The operation of it is quite simple. An ordinary photograph is placed on a cylinder at one end. and a piece of blue, specially made plastic is attached to a like cylinder on the other end. A few knobs are then turned, and a button is pressed; and the cylinders start tronic scanning eye starts blinking over the lights and shadows of the moving photograph.

A red hot stylus has begun etching the blue plastic, and in a very few minutes a printing en graving is made in exact duplicate of the photograph. The Scan-a graver makes engraving from line

drawings as well as ordinary photographs. The machines cannot be purchased outright at any price. They are available by lease only The Citizen machine is one o



How Will New **Vets** Pension Affect You?

How will it affect me? Many thousands of veterans and their dependents are asking this about the new pension law recently enacted by Congress. The Wage Citizen asked the Veterans Administration for answers to basic questions about this complex legislation. Here are the answers in the second of five installments.)

Q. What are the changes in methods to be used in computing income under the new system?

A. Income received by a veteran or by his widow from any source, with few exceptions, will be considered as income under the new system. In cases where the veteran's spouse has a separate income the new law provides that all such income over \$1200 per year shall be counted as the veteran's income, unless to do so would create a hardship.

Q. What would constitute "hardship" in this instance? A. If the evidence shows that







The reason the machines are in such demand is, they have opened up an entire new field of scrap metal salvage. Thin steel, the sort used in automobile bodies, or in tin cans, or in bed springs or fence wire or the like, will burn like paper in a steel mill furnace, unless it compressed into a mass. Before the balers came into use, it was really junk; no good to anybody. Old automobiles were stripped on their heavy steel parts, and the thin metal bodies were left to rust in automobile grave-yards and iunk pies, or dumped into gulleys to prevent erosion. TIN CANS weren't worth saving after the immediate need for extracting the in coating from them during the war. Old baling with and barbed wire was fit only to mess up the landscape. With the baler. it is Miferent bodies and other stuff of the are pushed into the box of one of the Mosley balers, the operator pulls a lever, a heavy lid smashes down on the junk, a 1,000-pound ram with 130 tons pressure crams it against the back of the box, a lateral ram smashes it into a con ner, and the result is a solid cube of steel, weighing from 250 to 500 pounds. The press is taken off, an ejector throws the bale of scrap from the box, and the baler is ready for another.










