



A steam iron can be very handy for presing wool garments. Never use it on the right side of the garment The hot metal of an iron tends to overheat the soft surface of the cloth making the fibers bri-

If the iron does not ive enough steam for pressing heavy material or for shrinking out fullness place a wet cloth over the material and touch the cloth with a hot iron. When cerating steam this way put the iron down so that it barely touches the wet cloth then lift it straight up For best results in ma king the material look soft usethis back and forth A wool pressong patting motion instead of ironing cloth is another useful aid in giving wool a soft look instead of a hard shiny one. Place the cloth next to the right side of the garment during uressing. The cloth's soft surface protects the surface of the garment.

The iron and wool raises static electricity which helps raise the soft wool fibers.
