#### PURMELA SCHOOL PLANS TO CONSOLIDATE WITH EVANT INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS -69-

Plans are in the making for the consolidation of Purmela School District with Evant School District, at the recent joint meeting of the two school boards. Purmela has been a 'contract' school with Evant the past two years. A few of the Purmela students have been coming to Gatesville.

The proposals by the schools were:

1. The school building is to 'be given to the Purmela Community Center to be used for a community Center as long as it is used for a community center.

2. The money in the Purmela trustee school fund is to be used on and for Community Center use provided it is legal by law to b kept for community center use. 3. The students of Purmela that are now going to Gatesville I. S. D. now, shall continue to go there

and Evant School District will not protest a transfer of those students now or in the future. The school bus that is now running through Purmela school district will not be asked not to run .n attending Gatesville School.

4. A school board member from Evant will resign provided Purmela consolidates with Evant and School District will be recommended by Purmela School Board and will be appointed as trustee in the Evant Independent School District.

5. The above mentioned transfer of propertys will be done within ten days after consolidation provided a community center 's


## **CIRCUS IS COMING** TO GATESVILLE

For 1060 cotton the minimum is as follows When cotton is sold the minimum sales price will 110 per cent of the choice loan rate When cotton is sold by New Orleans CSS office eht minimum sales price will be the higher of the two mentioned above

Carrying charges will be adde to the sales price beginning with 10 points in October and increasing 20 points per month to a max imum 190 points in July 1961. The current monthly increase for carrying charges is 15 points mon th after October 1959.


### MINIMUM COTTON SALES FOR MARKETING YEAR

The USDA announced that the minimum sale price of upland cotton in its inventory will be the higher of the market price set by the CCC or 115 per cent of the choice loan rate during the market year.

For 1960 cotton the minimum will be 110 per cent of the choice loan when sold by local agencies and will be the higher of the 2 for the rate when sol by the New Odleans CSS.

Dejartment officials announced that this determination of sales levels is to place emphasis on farmers' marketings of 1960 cotton.

#### TEXAS EGG LAW WORKS

#### \_60\_

March is National Egg Month, and is as good a time as any to make note of the outstanding success achieved in the operation and enforcement of the Texas Egg Law.

Within the short span of a little more than two years since it became effective, the Texas Egg Law has come to be accepted as one of the bulwarks of their business by producers, wholesalers, dealers and retailers alike. As the licensing and enforcement agency, the Texas Department of Agriculture was able to develop a program of education and explanation which was credited largely with bringing about this acceptance.

As enacted by the 55th Legisalture in 1957, the Texas Egg Law was aimed at preventing eggs of poor quality or unfit for human consumption from reaching ournsumers. For many years Texas had been a dumping ground for poor quality eggs which failed to meet prescribed standards and would not be sold in the states where they were produced. This not only brought poor quality eggs from other states into the homes of Texas consumers but also acted to depress the price of premium eggs produced in Texas.

Rules and regulations promulgated by the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture under authority of the texas Egg Law prescribe the standards of weight and grade,


along with our pledge to do everying the quality of eggs offered for sale, and these various grades must be plainly marked on each package of eggs offered for sale. Widespread physical inspection

is accomplished through field inspectors who work out of the six District field offices of the Texas Department of Agriculture. Weekly reports are filed by each inspector as to the number of lots of eggs inspected, along with the results of the inspection.

The general acceptance of the new law is reflected in the reports covering the last fiscal year of its operation. In that year, 19,-444 lots of eggs were inspected, amounting to 1,346,311 dozen ggs. Out of this huge quantity, only 610 lots were found to be in violation of the Texas Egg Law, 89 by retailers offering the eggs for sale and 521 by the wholesaler or dealer who had graded and cartoned the eggs. This was a ratio of violations amounting to only three per cent of the eggs inspected.



#### NEWS PUBLISHER NAMED **CO-CHAIRMAN OF BOND** SALES

-69-A letter from Nathan Adams, Chairman, State Savings Bonds Adams, State Chairra Committee, Dallas, and Ed Gossett, Co-chairman in a letter to the NEWS named Mat Jones, Advattising and Publicity Co-chairman of Coryell County Savings Bonds Committee. They didn't say who we "Co'd" with. H. Wade Sadler, County Chairman recommended us, the letter said.
