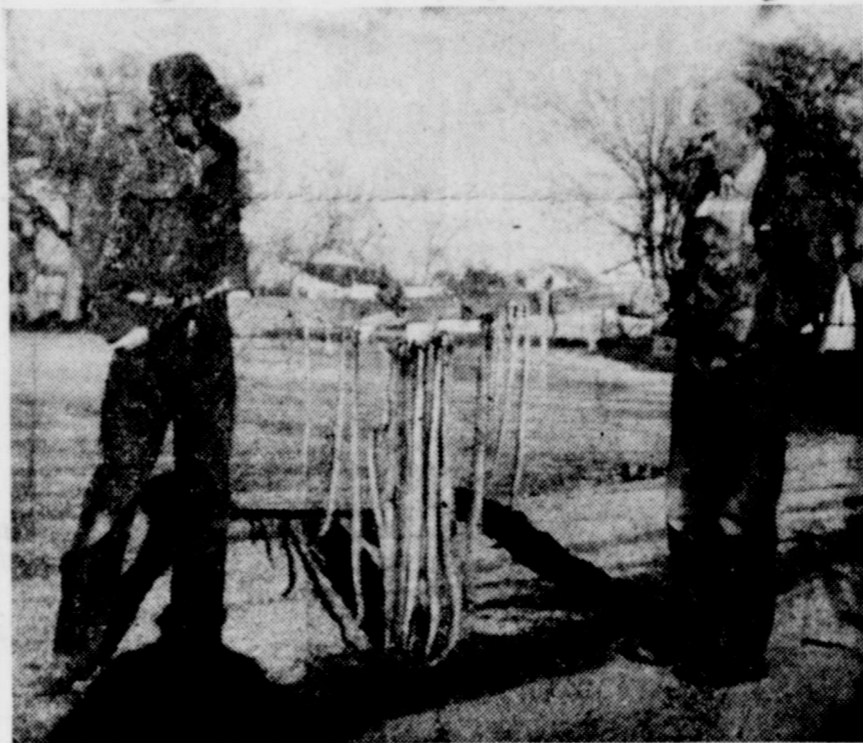

MY POLITICAL PHILOSOPHY

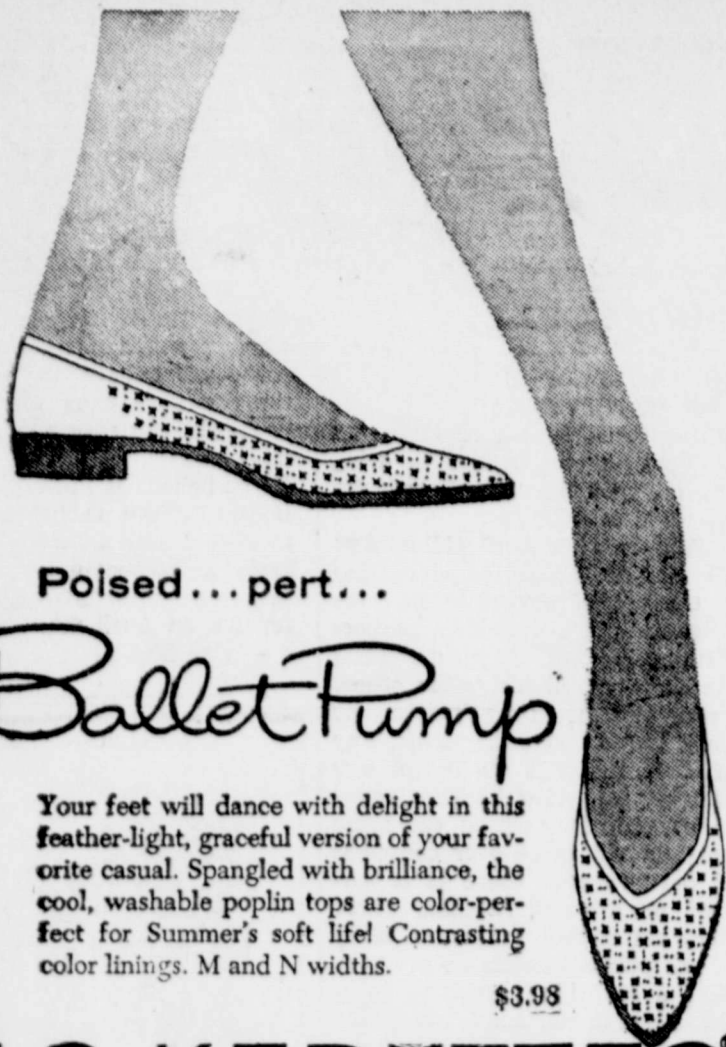

TEXAS CATTLE UP 9PERCENT

It came as not surprise recently when the U. S. Department of Agriculture released its figures on livestock population at the beginning of 1960, showing that cattle on Texas ranges had increased by nine percent over early 1959.

The USDA inventory reported the total of all cattle in Texas as of Jan. 1, 1960, at 9,276,000, compared with 8,510,000 at the same time a year ago. This nine percent increase in population was nearly double the rate of the national increase, which amounted to about five per cent.

It also came as no surprise when the USDA reported that the total value of all livestock — Cattle, hogs, sheep, horses and mules, poultry — had gone down in spite of increased numbers in most categories. The total valuation at the start of 1960 was placed at \$16,236,408,000 compared with \$18,092,870,000 a year ago.

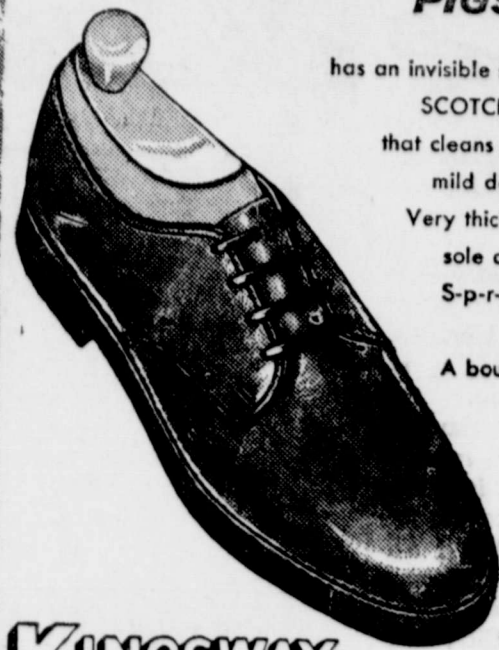
Nationally, the livestock and poultry population figures showed these comparisons: Cattle, 101,520,000 this year and 96,650,000 last year; milk cows, 21,331,000 and 21,488,000; hogs, 58,464,000 and 56,924,000; sheep, 33,621,000 and 32,945,000; horses and mules, 3,089,000 and 3,142,000; chickens, 368,859,000 and 383,529,000, and turkeys, 5,673,000 and 5,923,000. Horses and mules declined two per cent, chickens fell off four per cent in numbers, and dairy cows eased off one percent.

At the same time, the USDA estimated a sharp drop in value per head of livestock, as follows: Cattle, \$136 this year and \$153 last year; milk cows, \$28 and \$219; hogs, \$16.50 and \$20.30; horses and mules, \$112 and \$101; chickens, \$1.05 and \$1.26, and turkeys, \$4.91 and \$4.65. Only horses and mules and turkeys showed a slight increase in price.

Release of the figures reemphasized the attitude of most authorities in their outlook on the 1960 cattle market, which is that the time has arrived for caution in planning any further increases of the livestock population of Texas ranges. Good range conditions in general continue to encourage the trend toward taking full advantage of the conditions, but authorities agree that extreme care should be exercised before any further heavy expansion is developed.

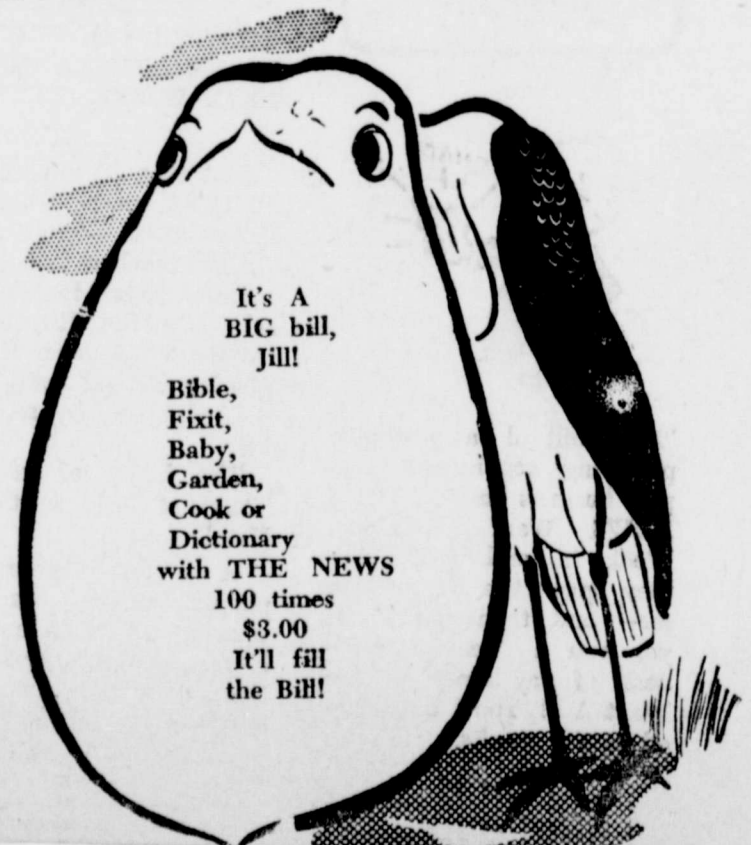
The "extended educational discussion" of Civil Rights has been transferred from the Senate to the House, but it is evident that under our rules of strictly limited debate there can be nothing comparable to the Senate filibuster. On the contrary, the bill was brought before the House on yesterday. A rule was adopted allowing fifteen hours of general debate. I voted against it because, as I have pointed out before, I feel that the best way to protect everybody's civil rights is to protect our time-honored judicial procedure which this bill sets aside.

The debate will continue through tomorrow and most of Monday. On Tuesday, and possibly Wednesday, of next week, amendments to the bill will be considered. Although I expect to vote against it, it is a foregone conclusion that the bill will pass. We can only hope that the House may adopt a more reasonable bill than the one now pending in the Senate, and that the Senate may then accept the House bill.

Our Agriculture Committee

continues daily hearings on my general farm bill and on various wheat bills. The Farm Bureau proposes that we take off all restrictions on the production of wheat and let the price sink to the level of corn. I fear that this would result in a terrible flood of wheat which not only would destroy wheat growers but which would demoralize all livestock and livestock feed prices as well. All of the other national farm organizations propose to establish effective controls on the amount of wheat which can be sold for food and keep the price high enough that it will pay the producer a reasonable return. I cannot believe that the taxpayers should be expected to support unlimited production. The bill I introduced would allow farmers themselves through their elected committees, to work out the program they wanted— so long as it is one which the Secretary of Agriculture says will balance supply and demand, and will not build up any new surpluses nor cost more than 5 per cent of the value of the crop.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Anyone who doubts that the bureaucratic mind reaches a point where it holds itself superior to the Congress should carefully read the just published of the hearing held by a sub committee of the Senate Small Business Committee on the Federal Trade Commission's interim report on mergers and unfair competition in food marketing.

Sen. Hubert Humphrey heads the sub committee. C. W. Harder Flanked by various functionaries, Earl Kintner, FTC chairman, appeared.

Kintner has perhaps created more personal publicity for himself than any person to ever serve on the FTC through his inconsequential disc jockey probe. Presumably he will go down in history as the Don Quixote of Tin Pan Alley.

In 1958 Senate Small Business Committee requested FTC to study in food retailing.

FTC dilly-dallied finally releasing major press release on an "interim" report just before appearing before committee.

Sen. Humphrey did not appreciate this procedure at all. In fact, he told FTC Chairman Kintner, "The Federal Trade Commission is not an executive agency. Your responsibility is that of a quasi-judicial or quasi-independent regulatory body established by Congress. The Senate Small Business Committee made a request to the FTC for this investigation

agency, an independent agency, that is fulfilling the request of a duly constituted body of the elected representatives of the people ignores the request of Congress."

In defense for delay in complying with the request of Congress the FTC introduced a resolution it had adopted initiating a study into the economic abuses in the food industry.

Senator Humphrey then said, "I merely want to be sure we are not going to content ourselves with some more of these pious platitudes. "Whereas" sections of resolutions are just about as worthwhile as fluff in the sky. And many people "whereas" themselves to death in the hopes that somehow this will appease the people who are injured or claiming injury."

The Senator then pointed out that the FTC resolution rather ignored instructions to probe into collusive pricing. Kintner replied he and his four colleagues would give it prayerful consideration.

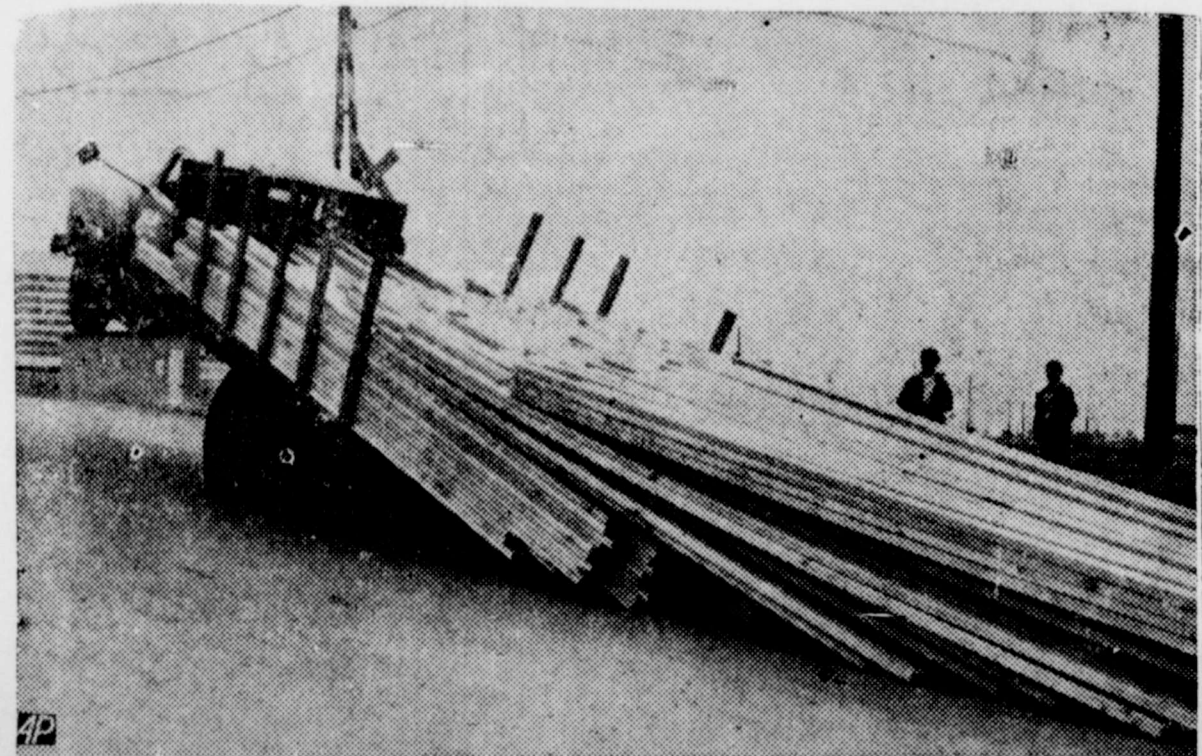
