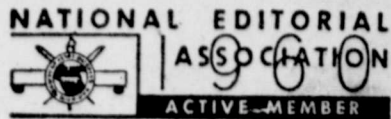

Dear Friends:

About two months ago I joined with some 20 members of the House in the introduction of a general farm bill intended to allow producers to work out stabilization programs for each crop. Of course these programs which would be developed by farmer committees working with the Sec. of Agriculture would have to follow the guidelines established by Congress.

Actually we proposed that the farmers could use any tools or methods they want so long as they did not force the government to acquire title to any more commodities and so long as they did not commit the government to spend more than 10 per cent of the value of the crop on support.

The agriculture committee has held hearings both on general bills and a number of other bills dealing especially with wheat. As a was natural, a great many objections were raised as to details and many helpful suggestions were made both in the committee and from other sources. The authors have tried to improve the plan and yesterday I introduced a revised bill.

In this new bill we retain the idea of letting farmers work out their own programs (basic democracy). We retain the protection to the taxpayers a fixed limitation on the amount which can be spent on any program. We are absolutely stopping the accumulation of further surplus under the new program. We assure farmers of a fair price equal to 90 per cent of parity. We require a balance between demand and supply and we provide for controls in its of production rather than in acres. We help farmers to achieve this balance without too much economic hardship by making payment in kind to encourage the retirement of unneeded acres now in production. We recognize the

chase of food for needy people an charging the costs to welfare and not to agriculture.

Finally the new bill contains a section which would establish a wheat program to be in effect until wheat farmers changed it. It would balance demand and supply by reducing wheat allotments 25 per cent. It would support wheat prices at 85 per cent of parity This is 5 per cent less than last year. We are trying to compromise with the President who said 90 per cent was too much. At the same time we protect wheat growers' incomes by raising the "in-kind" payments on the acreage taken from their allotments from 33 per cent to 55 per cent.
