## Dear Friends:

About two months ago I joined with some 20 members o the House in the introduction of a general farm bill intended ot allow producers to work out stabilization programs for each crop. Of course these programs which would be developed by farmer committees working with the Sec. of Agricul-
 the guidelines established by Congress.
Actually we proposed that the farmers could use any tools or methods they want so long as they did not force the government to acquire title to any more commo-
dities and so long as they did not commit the government to spend more than 10 per cent of the value of the crop on support.

The agriculture committee has held hearings both on general bills and a number of other bills dealing especially with wheat. As a was natural, a great many objections were raised as to details and many helpful suggestions were made both in the committee and from other sources. The authors
have tried to improve the plan and yesterday I introduced a revised bill.
In this new bill we retain the idea of letting farmers work out their own programs (basic democracy). We retain the protection to the taxpayers a fixed limitation on the amount which can be spent on any program. We are absolutely stopping the accumula-
tion of further surplus under tie tion of further surplus under this new program. We assure farmers
of a fair fair price equal to 90 per cent of parity. We require a bal ance between demand and supply and we provide for controls in un its of production rather than in acres. We help farmers to achieve this balance without too much ec onomic hardship by making pay ment in kind to encourage the re ltireement of unneeded acres now
in production. We recognize the
