Our exports were at the fowest level since 1936 - some 1,507,930 tons against imports of 4.391,791 tons (twice the previous high set in 1951 during the Korean War). 69





### **RABY PARK SWIMMING POOL**

No matter where you fish or what kind of fish you are fishing it has been proven that every fisherman is similar to his own particular pattern of fishing. Confusing? Well, let me clarify this a bit.

There are four fundamentals which almost every good angler uses as a "bible." Follow these rules and improve on them each time you go fishing. Your fishing "luck" will progress with every trip.

Rise early—get up early in the day when the fish feed. Work the shore with various lures to find the hot spots. Try about 25 casts with a surface are. If you don't get any strikes try a sink-ing plug for another 25 casts. If you still don't have any luck try a hure that runs a little deeper. You're bound to find them sooner or later and when you do you'll have a field day.

Unacquainted -- don't be unacquainted with the water you are fishing. If you don't have a map of the lake's bottom ask the local sporting goods dealer or resort owner for a few tips. They will be more than happy to tell you where the good spots are.

Drift-Approach your fishing hole with caution, especially in shallow water. Your outboard motor won't scare the fish, however, it may stir the bottom, so cut it about 50 yards from where you plan to fish and drift in. Yield—Always yield a good cast. A bit of practice before leaving on your

trip will bring more accurate casts with every outing. Use an inner tube or a pail in your backyard for a target. Remember, practice makes perfect. The first letter of each of these rules

I guess many of us have been caught without an anchor or with a faulty line at one time or another and found ourselves in a bad way. The Evinrude Boating Foundation says that no matter what type of boat you use you need an anchor. What size and type you need depends on the size of your boat and the type of bottom you generally anchor in.

No matter what kind of anchor you have, be sure to have a well condi-tioned line secured to it and ready for use. You must always take into con-sideration the length of line you'll need. In moderate weather a safe ratio is six feet of line for every foot of water, although if your boat is light and there isn't much of a breeze or current, a ratio of three to one is sufficient for a time.

Before you anchor be sure that your line is attached to the anchor properly and that the other end is secured to the boat. Don't throw your anchor out, just lower it alongside your boat— "drop anchor." Be sure that your line doesn't have any knots in it and never stand in or on the coil unless you want to go with it. Sometimes you're going to want to beach your boat. If this is the case always bury your anchor in the sand on the beach a good distance from the boat or tie up to a tree. Never count on the beach alone. A good size wave or high tide might carry your boat to sea if you don't take the proper precautions. Anchoring is important if you want

any length of time. Always carry an anchor and a well-conditioned line be-
