

May 13, 1960 Dear Friends:

Although work progressed rather rapidly on both the Floor of the House and in the Committee this past week, everyone's major interest was fixed on the spy problem and the varied explanations offered our government. those paid a year ago. Very few question the necessity of these flights, but most everyone here wonders why we should say anything at all, and especially why the President should publicly state we are going to continue

these activities. It looks o me

we have talked too much. The Agriculture Committee continued to work on the details of a general farm bill, but on my motion laid it aside long enough to consider and report a continuation on the Mexican Labor Bill. I sponsored the original Bracero Bill and I feel that experience shows clearly that it has gone a long way toward eliminating the evils of the old "wet back" system and at the same time has provided a needed supply of farm labor without in any way hurting American workers. We will, however, probably have difficulty passing the bill through the House as many people completely misunderstand the measure and think of it as a bill to authorize "wet backs."

The House passed the Agricultural Appropriation Bill containing an appropriation of \$1,325, 000,000 for making good the losses of the Commodity Credit Corparation. Here, too, there is much misunderstanding. It is often stated that if we had direct compensatory payments for cotton that it would put the farmers "at the mercy of Congress" meaning that Congess might at any time fail to appropriate the needed money.. That is, of course, true, but it is also true of present program. Direct par ments for wool are made out C. C. C. funds just as dire payments for cotton made, and just as the presen

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





There was nothing approaching a bust, of course, even in the drouth-ridden middle '50's. And as the new decade of the 1960's gets under way there are no real signs to indicate that the boom actually has even reached its peak.

Farmers may and probably will commue to complain of lower farm prices and increasing costs - vaich is well justified by current facts and figures. Some farm families probably will continue to forsake the land and its discouragements, although the number driven away from the farms to the cities is not nearly as high aring the drouth years.

But the value of the land itself appears to be holding a remarkable steady upward trend, and this is observed in nearly all areas of Texas. Prevailing prices of form and ranch land generally is higher than can actually be justified by its value for crop or livestock production.

The factors combining to produce this situation also have developed another over-all condition which is often observed and poinled out in many sections of Texas. The condition is this: More and more land over the State is becoming tightly held and to all practical purposes taken off the market altogether, automatically cutting down the quantity of biddable land available to influence any market fluctuation.

The top strengthening factor in price determination of farm ranch land, not only in Texas but in most other agricultural copulio to be considered against

the fixed amount of land avail able. In Texas, this more or less simple situation of supply and demand is intensified because of the more than normal growth in population.

During the past two decades, the trend of farm folk flocking to the middlesized and big cities in Texas also has had a reverse reaction - a notable rise in weekfrom Texas industry and commerce in th ecits has found ts way back to th land n an everincreasing volume - no accurate measurement has yet been taken of just how large the volume considerable.





Weed beds and rock piles are some very likely places you'll catch those lunkers but many a time you'll have trouble with weeds and snags if you're

not using a weedless rig.

It sometimes happens that your favorite deep-running lure doesn't come equipped with a weedless rig. If this is the case take your eyes away from the television set for a minute and do a bit of rigging yourself.

Actually, there isn't much to do to

make a weedless lure from your favorite artificial bait. Just connect a rubber band to the eye of the hook and slip the other end over the barb. If you have a double hook just slip the rubber band through the eye and slip the ends of the rubber band to the barb of their respective hooks. It won't keep the fish from being hooked because when they strike the rubber band slips from

the barb. One thing you have to remember about hooks, says the Evinrude Boating Foundation. There is no single hook that suits all situations. Hooks come in different sizes and shapes. Hooks with long shanks are usually used for tying streamers and other artificial bait or for live bait when fishing walleye or northern. Short-shanked hooks are used for panfish and certain short-bodied flies.

What type of hook a fisherman uses is a matter of preference. Some anglers feel that an offset hook-one with the point bent out of a flat plane, hooks fish best. Others contend that the flat bend-one with the whole hook in one

plane, is the best. The shape of the hook, the size of the wire, and the type of barb to use is a matter for debate among all fishermen. Whatever hook you prefer be sure that it will hold up under the stress and strain of the fish for which it is intended and that it is secured to your line properly.
