The modern cotton producer pre fers to feed cake and hulls and o plant certified seed.
Cotton gins are practically the only market available to farmer for their cottonseed. The prices which gins receive from cottonseed oil milis presumable determine the pins for their cottonseed. How ever, the margins between the mill prices and prices paid farm ers are affected by the operating methods of the gins and thei buying and selling practices, which niturn affect the costs of hand ing cottonseed
