HEBRONVILLE, Tex., May 12, (AP) — There's a lost Franciscan monastery here standing high on a hill, its windows staring like sightless eyes over the walled garden where South Texas mesquite is replaced by the tropical lushness of bananas and palms.

Inside, the echoing halls are bare and eeserted, except for three priests and three lay brothers one of whom, a pianist, sometimes looses a flood of melody through corridors and down the marble stairs.

Scotus College, as it is called, had its beginning in 1926 when nuns and priest of the various orders fled Mexico before the social revolution.

After brief stays at various locations, members of the great religious organizations founded by

St. Francis of Assissi reached this brush country haven and started a novitiate for the Mexican province of the Franciscans.

It was named after one of the most prof ound scholars of the Middle Ages, Joannes Duns Scotus Joohn Dun of Scotland - a Franciscan and a professor of theology at Ozford.

In the school, which in the biginning was only a small cluster of frame classrooms, the friars once more began to train laymen for the priesthood and in the tenets of the Franciscan order, whichh has long been identified with great educational institutions.

The white masonry building main structure of the college was completed about 1940 with adcommodations for nearly 40


students and priests, but only 6 remain. When the rigorous treatment of the clergy was relaxed in Mexico, novices once more begain to study at another Franciscan college in Monterrey.

"But maybe next year -manama - the stugents will come, says Father Ramon Solano, one of the three priest in residence. Several churches in the surround ing region are served by the padres and lay brothers, as well as two in Hebbronville, One of these is a little yellow structure which crouches beside the huge pile of the monastery; the other, a new sanctuary for Our Lady of Guadalupe.

This last, with tiled domes and towering walls, may not be finished for years.

COTTONSEED MARGINS OF COOPERATIVE GINS

Cottonseed, once a waste product of the cotton industry, has become an important agricultural product, which contributes to our economy in the form of human food, animal feed and other valuable products.

The competitive market position of cottonseed has been improved by major developments in processing along with improvement in cotton production. In 1959 the Texas cotton crop was valued at almost 737 million dollars of this total. Seed normally contributes 10 to 15 per cent of the total value of the cotton crop.

The modern cotton producer prefers to feed cake and hulls and


to plant certified seed. Cotton gins are practically the only market available to farmers for their cottonseed. The prices which gins receive from cottonseed oil milis presumable determine the price farmers receive from the gins for their cottonseed.
