## DOES AMERICA WANT HOFFA-LAWS?

by Vant Neff

Is Congress representing American citizens these days, or is our chief law-making body destined to be dominated by the interests of a determined and very powerful labor leader who answers to no one?

It's a natural question today. Mr. James Hoffa, President of the powerful Teamsters' Union, has just sent his lieutenants a political memorandum, with instructions for immediate action. It includes a "purge list" of Congressmen who "must go."

This raises another, far more important question. In how many of these United States, and the states' Congressional districts, is Mr. Hoffa entitled to decide who shall represent all the citizens and voters?

Here is what Mr. Hoffa's "list" is based on:

Sidney Zagri, heading the Teamsters' new multi-million-dollar political-action Depart-ment of Legislation and Political Education, supplied Hoffa with the dates of primary elections in each state, each Representative's voting position both on the original Landrum-Griffith labor-reform bill, and their voting record on the final weaker bill — as well as the number of Teamsters' officers in each Congressman's district. Lastly, the information tells the percentage by which each House

member won in 1958.

With such facts, it was easy for Mr. Hoffa to see at a glance which members of Congress were voting as the Teamsters' top command desired or dic-tated. And the Hoffa memor-

andum makes it clear that prolabor means pro-Hoffa. As for the purge list — there are 56, and Hoffa's orders are definite

This type of "purge" is a brutal, vindictive pressure-play that has been tried from time to time by many men in influ-ential positions. It nearly al-ways comes from one whose accumulated power has removed him in a subtle, often sinister way, from the basic traditions of the country and its citizens. A President, a famous and be-



loved figure, once tried to "purge" the Supreme Court. He failed. Has the time now arrived when a man with notorious underworld associates, blatantly dedicated to his own very special, sometimes shady, interests and powers, can succeed where an infinitely greater man

could not? Added to the fundamental insolence and outrage of the "purge list" itself, is the scope of Mr. Hoffa's instructions to his lieutenants. He outlines a positive program, naming

names - too many to give here - and provides instructions for either support or defeat. His instructions to the local leaders are massive and impudent only a single state, he feels, is today immune from his program. This state is South Carolina, and Mr. Hoffa says of this state — "no possibilities — solid Dixiecrat bloc." The word "possibilities" used in this connection describes clearly Mr. Hoffa's intensely personal approach to these Congressmen elected by all the American

people.
The Hoffa memorandum ends with the names of fifteen Congressmen who must get unlimited Teamster support. Mr. Hoffa tells his local men to act directly - these Congressmen are, it seems, "hard-core Con-gressmen (who) should be con-tacted by the local union leadership in their districts . . . to assure them of Teamster allout support."

Here we have the ultimate in blatant, don't-give-a-damn-for-anyone political pressure by a powerful, rich labor Baron who

feels he answers to no one.

This raises two questions in the average American citizen's mind. First: just where does such a labor-leader come off? And second: If these chosen, blindly-pro-labor Congressmen are assured of Hoffa's complete support, and it helps elect them, then who can assure the rest of us that we don't face a future where every law that governs us is to be flatly and exclusively pro-labor — in fact, nothing but a Hoffa-law

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CONSERVATION RESERVE IN 1960

New acreage placed in the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank in 1960 has surpassed the announced acreage goal for the program by more than one million acres

The larger acreage accepted for contracts is chiefly the result of two factors: conservation practices are being established more economically than in the past, and per-acre annual payment rates under 1960 contracts are lower than anticipated.


Approximately 80 per cent of the farmers palcing new land in the program for 1960 elected to come in on a "whole farm" basis. that is, to place all their eligible cropland under contract. This is of maximum effective in checking surplus production, since the entire farm is withdrawn from crops and usually from livestock production as well.

Under a whole farm contract, the family may continue to live on the farm, and recent field studies indicate that most of them are doing so. In some instances farmers who would have sold and moved off their farms are retiring and continuing to live on them. Some who have shifted to nonfarm work and are continuing to live on their farms said they would have moved to towns or cities if they had not had the opportunity to obtain a reasonable return from Nikita! their farm property.

Progra mfarmers voluntarily sign contracts with the government to retire cropland from production and devote it to conservation uses, such as grass and tree cover and wildlife shelter. The contracts provide that the government will make an annual rental payment to the contract signer and will assist in establishing the conservation use on the land.

Contracts may be for three to 10 years, depending upon the conservation use to be established and the wishes of the farmer.


