Duing the presnet stage of growth, the grasshopper is fairly easily destroved. Afte they become larger, effective control becomes larger, effective control
more difficult. So to protect your ranges and crops, now is the time
for control measures to be taken. Grasshoppers can be contolled
with Aldrin, toxaphene, and diel drin. These insecticides may be ap plied as dusts, sprays, or bait. The sprays give higher initial kill, continue to kill over a longer period and require less insecticide per ac table powders and dusts are obtainable from insecticide dealers. Emulsified concentrates and wettable powders should be diluted with water to suit available spray equipment. Emulsions are less like
ly to clog nozzles than wettable powders.
