

Grashopper infestations are hea-

vy in some areas of the county. This pest is small now but is grow ing rapidly. They are infesting range or pasture land at the present time.

Duing the presnet stage of growth, the grasshopper is fairly easily destroyed. Afte they become larger, effective control becomes more difficult. So to protect your ranges and crops, now is the time for control measures to be taken. vin Winningham.

Grasshoppers can be contolled with Aldrin, toxaphene, and dieldrin. These insecticides may be ap plied as dusts, sprays, or bait. The sprays give higher initial kill, continue to kill over a longer period and require less insecticide per acre. Emulsifiable concentrates wettable powders and dusts are obtainable from insecticide dealers. Emulsified concentrates and wettable powders should be diluted with water to suit available spray equipment. Emulsions are less like ly to clog nozzles than wettable

Dosage reccommended follows: eldrin Apply dust at the rate of 10 to 15 pounds per acre. Spray per acre: One half to 1 pint aldrin(2rb)

Dr. C. D. JOHNSON HONORED FOR 28 YEARS SERVICE AT BAYLOR UNIVERSITY

TEXAS AP SUPPLEMENTA. SERVICE

WACO, Tex., June 2, (AP — Tribute is paid Dr. Charles. D. Johnson as time draws near for him to relinquish chairmanship of the Department of Sociology at Baylor University.

He has headed the department since 1938, and will give up sexecutive duties at the end of this school year under the university's retirement rule.

Vice President Abner V. McCall praised Johnson for his work at Baylor, and announced his appointment to the rank of Distinguished Professor, explaining that Johnson will continue to teach certain advanced courses.

"Dr. Johnson has given 28 years of service to Baylor University over of period of 37 years." Mc-Call said. "And that service has been marked by the upmost devotion and the most dynamic creativity. He has earned the respect and admiration of all as a teacher. writer, editor, scholar and Christian gentleman."

McCall cited these accomplishments of Johnson at Baylor:

Founding the Baylor School of Business: founding the Department of Journalism: securing the charter for the first professional fraternity on the campus: founding the first scholarshin fraternity: founding the first social organization for women students; founding the first alumni magazine; coverting the campus newspaper from a weekly to the first daily publication; instituting the first Journalism Week which became the present Southwestern Journalism Congress: founding the SouthernLiterary Festival: and writing the first authentic history of Southern Baptist schools.

"Few men in the history of Baylor University have been so versatile, able, untiling, or effective in their efforts, not only in behalf of Baylor University and its students but of the Baptist denomination of Texas and the South and the educational causes of the nation," McCall



Dear Friends,

The major instrument of disposal of our agricultural surpluses has for several years been known as Public Law 480. This measure was pasesed with support from both parties and from many leading farm organizations. I supported it. I think it has done much good but I think that the time has come when we should review this plan and revise it to fit present needs. Our committee has been working on it for several days.

Basically P. L. 480 allows the sale of surplus agriculture stocks for foreign currency. This made it possible for many countries who did not have dallars, to buy. It has accounted for a substantial part of our agriculture export market. This was helpful to us and to othesr but as the program develop ed our government began to make it less and less helpful to the United States. It is undertsandable that any country is reluctant to allow someone else to hold large amounts of its currency with which goods might be demanded at holder's convenience. Actually, such an arrangement has exactly the same implications to the debtor nation which an outstanding demand note has to an individual debtor.

To make it possible for underdeveloped nations to buy our surphases we began by entering into agreements which generally provided that we would not use more than 30 per cent of currecy we took in to pay regular expenses We would lend, say 70 per cent of

IRRIGATION OF TEXAS SOIL The great demand for irrigation water makes soil and water management increasingly important in crop production.

Much more efficient use of the water and soil resources for crop production will be required if the dwindling water supplies are to be conserved and used most effectively. Since the competition among agriculture, industry, and municipalities for water will become greater in the future, it

An example is the recent billion dollar agreement with India under which we agree to supply India with a billion dollars' worth of surplus grain. In return Idia is to pay us the equivalent of a billion dollars worth of rupees. We awree that we will not use more than 15 per cent for our own benefit. We agree to loan 42.5 per cent to the Indian government & to give them the remaining 42.5 percent . Obviously, this is not what Congress intended when we set up this program. In a later letter I will discuss the policy I think we should follow.

and plant nutrients. The variable distribution of rainfall continues to be the most important factor affecting the yield and quality of crops in Texas. The Solunar Theory, emphasized by John Alden Knight, seeks to prove that fish feed during certain periods of the day and night with no apparent

As many of us have experienced, fish will bite like crazy for a certain length of time, then all of a sudden stop, only to hit again several hours later. According to Knight the positions of the sun and moon have much to do with the activity of fish. That's how the name is derived—"sol" meaning sun and "luna" meaning moon.

Knight says that there are two major and two minor periods during which the fish feed. The major period lasts about two hours or longer and the minor period about one hour.

The periods are accurately timed according to standard time, therefore the fisherman must make the proper adjustments according to the time used

in his fishing region.

As an example, say the major period is 12:55 in the morning and the minor at 6:30 a.m. The other major period occurs at 1:10 and the other minor at 7:00 p.m. All you do to find out the "best fishing time" is to add 10 min-utes to each of these times. Knight, however, contends that this table is not accurate when the barometer is falling and the air warmer than the water and if the weather is cold and windy and the water high.
