FISHING TIPS EVINRUDE BOATING FOUNDATION

Last week I talked about the Temperature Theory. This week I'll touch upon another theory—the effect of barometric are on fish.

The Barometer Theory has been a guide for many fishermen for a great number of years and has "proved very successful." According to this theory the fish bite at their best when the barometer rises and do not strike during a stormy, windy period when the barometer is falling. When the barometer rises after a storm or rain, fishing is said to be at its best.

Like the Temperature Theory there are those who deny any fact behind the Barometer Theory, reports the Evinrude Boating Foundation. I read a story the other day, written by a wellknown fisherman-author. He said: "In analyzing three years of my fishing-from opening of trout season to closing I found three and one-third days out of every ten windy, rainy or snowy . . but happily, some excellent trout fishing, if not the very best is often available during such s. Water that is normally unproductive in sunny weather has a way of suddenly yield-

ing big fish during a storm."
One theory is that when the barometer is above 29.90 the fish are on or near the surface and when it's below 29.90 the fish are on the bottom. When the barometer is changing rapidly the fish are not feeding. Fishing is said to be at its best on the lee shores during the first two hours of daylight when there is a steady breeze. After the two initial hours of daylight, fishing is at
