**CITY-COUNTY OFFICIALS  
 MET WITH HIGHWAY DEPT.  
 OFFICIALS FROM WACO**

City and County Officials met  
 with officials of the State High-  
 way Department, relative to high-  
 ways early this week.

For the county, Judge Norman  
 Storm said they agreed to a 4.5  
 mile stretch, added to one of 8.5  
 miles already approved on Old  
 Hwy. 7.

The city's part was a discussion  
 on the widening of Main Street,  
 and it got only to the discussion  
 point.

Good control can be achieved by

For Johnson's grass spot treatment  
 with oils or dalapon is the easiest  
 cheapest and most effective meth-  
 od of getting rid of Johnsongrass  
 in row crops. It costs but 5 to 12  
 dollars per acre to rid fields of  
 heavy infestations of Johnsongrass.

In cool weather, naphtha is  
 recommended for spot oiling  
 purposes, but in hot weather a 50-  
 50 mixture of naphtha with either  
 kerosene or diesel oil should be  
 used. One hundred gallons of ke-  
 rosene with 1 gallon of C-56 as  
 an additive is also an effective  
 mixture for killing Johnsongrass.  
 These oils are not for foliage  
 treatments, but must be applied

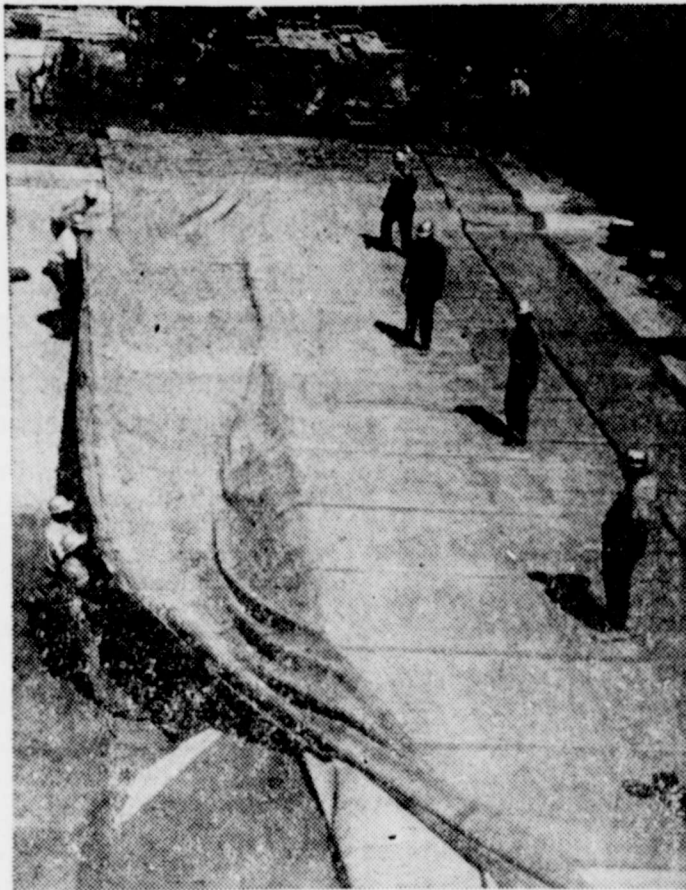
Three questions are very com-

### INVESTING IN LEISURE TIME STOCKS

The key to success in purchasing stocks in today's market is growth and we are selecting a group which we feel will be a prime beneficiary of expansion in sales and earnings over the coming years.

The spread of automation in industry plus pressure from labor unions should result inevitably in a shorter work week. This increase in time for leisure pursuits coupled with higher personal income per capita has made available to many such luxuries as yachting, golfing, traveling, etc., formerly enjoyed only by a few. This trend towards a shorter work week is a continuing one and with a greater number of people seeking such activities we are preparing this study and discussing herein a few selected companies that are expected to be prime beneficiaries. A few sound companies are particularly representative of this field with many more available for the more speculative-minded investor.

Bowling, golfing and yachting are three of the favorite sports of the public and in the field of recreation we favor one stock, particularly, which is Brunswick Corp. This company is No. 1 in the bowling equipment field and has recently expanded into boating through the acquisition of Owens Yacht Co.

A. G. Spalding, a more speculative recommendation, is a manufacturer of athletic goods, while Outboard Marine is the largest manufacturer of outboard motors. Another important activity for

those with greater leisure time is travel. For a participation in increased travel, American Express appears to be the best stock. As one of the leading travel agencies it does a very important business in its widely-used travelers' checks.

With increased travel there is a much greater demand for cameras than in the past. Eastman Kodak may well be regarded as the No. 1 company in the camera field, but Bell & Howell and Polaroid would also benefit from this trend.

Sportswear comes into increasing use and in this area we recommend two stocks—Kaysor-Roth and McGregor-Doniger.

Finally, movies, TV sets, radios and sound equipment all play an important part in the leisure time program. Although movie stocks are not market favorites, Paramount, Twentieth-Century Fox and United Artists all offer good values. American Broadcasting-Paramount through its theatres and TV network and Columbia Broadcasting Co. through its TV network and its records both merit consideration. In the field of radio, TV and stereo sound equipment apparatus, especially hi-fi and stereo, we favor Magnavox and Motorola.

## COMMISSIONERS URGE FULL PARITY INCOME

An urgent request that Congress adopt necessary legislation to enable the American farmer to achieve 100 per cent parity income was among the most far-reaching resolutions adopted by the 14-state Southern Commissioners of Agriculture at their 1960 meeting in San Antonio.

It was emphasized by the com-

missioners in their resolution that in past several years net farm income has shown a rapid decline \$15 billion to \$11.5 billion and farm mortgage indebtedness has increased from \$7 billion to \$11 billion, and farmers are receiving their share of the national wealth.

The commissioners made it clear that in their opinion present farm programs are obviously inadequate to meet needs.

No attempt was made to spell

Instead, the resolving clause stated simply: "Now therefore be it resolved, that the Southern Commissioners of Agriculture in convention assembled at San Antonio Texas June 10-13, 1960, urgently request the Congress to adopt necessary legislation to enable the farmer to achieve 100 per cent parity income

This is one of the resolutions which was forwarded to Rep. Chester A. Bowles, chairman of the platform committee for the 1960 Democratic National Convention in Los Angeles, to Senate Majority leader Lyndon Johnson and to other national leaders for their consideration. Both the chairman of the platform committee and Sen. Johnson had expressed interest in receiving a full report of the deliberations and decisions reached by the Commissioners at San Antonio.

Another notable resolution adopted by the Commissioners observed that credit is a necessary implement in helping small family sized and interest rates to the farmer are too high. It was resolved that the Congress be urged to appoint a committee to study the needs of small farmers for credit and that appropriate legislation be enacted.

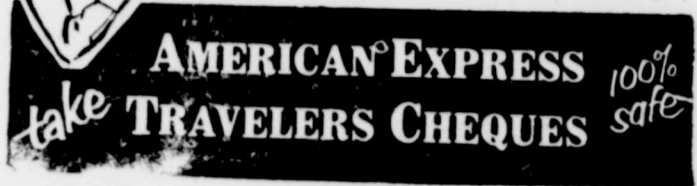

**HOW TO GET YOUR PRAYERS ANSWERED**

One of the greatest statements in the Bible is, "And the Lord heard and answered." That statement is sweet music to a person seeking God in an intimate, personal manner.  
 At some time in every life there comes a need to pray. Every person reaches a point where the sky looks black and the horizon of the future is clouded with uncertainty—then he wants his prayers to be answered.  
 However, there are times when there seems to be no way to get a prayer through or an answer in return. What is the key? Is there some strange secret that God is trying to teach us? I believe there is a way to get prayers answered.  
 The Bible says that those who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength. And each of us needs a daily renewing of strength. We need our determinations strengthened, our expectant faith made stronger, and our love increased in every way. If our prayers were answered immediately every time, we would not wait before God. So the Bible says, "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength."  
 There is no man or woman who can pray and expect God to answer every time in an instant. There are many testings of character, many influences brought to bear upon prayer life and the answer that God would give. It is necessary to understand the value of wait-

ing for God to answer in His own way and in His own time.

He couldn't possibly have done that on any other occasion. How did he do it? His will gave him new strength.  
 That extra strength, that extra power given from God to help us meet emergencies flooded his being, and for a few minutes it made him a superman.  
 God is a good God! He wants to give the very best He has to us, and He is waiting now to answer our prayers.

Henson was driving a '52 Chevy pickup belonging to Joe Bob Reuter, Sinclair S. Sta., operator and ran into and under a dump truck driven by Jack Bankhead, with his son, Bennie Bankhead.

Henson, received a deep gash on his head, and compound fracture of his jaw and mouth, losing a number of teeth, and a fracture of his hip and possibly other injuries besides cuts and bruises. Bankhead was uninjured. Bennie Bankhead's head knocked out the windshield of the Bankhead truck, but didn't seem to phase him. State Highway Patrolman Billy Lam said the investigation, so far, was incomplete.
