Eric Armbruster had never left New York City in all his 72 vears What enticed him to the Shelby Arms Hotelin Portland, Oregon, and his death was a mystery.
There was no mystery about what killed him - a .22 slug above the Seated in the office of Inspector Winters in New York City, Dr. Haledjian read the report forwarded by the Portland authorities.
