INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS

Now and then you may hire someone to do special work for you. In case someone is hurt,

are you legally responsible? It depends on how you "hire" him. Was he an "independent contractor"? An "employee" or an "agent"?

As a rule an independent contractor has an independent calling like that of a plumber, electrician, house painter and the like.

Your agreement with him calls for certain results. You do not tell him how to work. As a rule, you are not legally to blame for any harm he may do. He is an "independent" contractor and an agent or employee.

But what about an employee or an agent? You, the employer or principal, controls and directs how the worker does his job. You are therefore responsible for it, and largely for any harm that may grow out of his work.

But how can you tell the difference between an independent contractor and an agent or employee? You look for facts that show

or do not show control, direction, or independence. Suppose you "hire" an independent contractor to paint your house white. Accidentally his worker splatters some paint on your neighbor's green shutter. He is to blame through lack of due care, not you. But you would be responsible if you employed and directed these painters yourself.

Why this difference? You have no control over the way the independent contractor does the work. Since he owns and manages his enterprise, he is legally responsible for what he does.

But you still may have some legal responsibility for an independent contractor's work as, for example, if you hire someone whose work may cause an

injury. Thus in one such case the contractor dug in the street. A pedestrian fell into the hole and was hurt! He could sue both the owner and the contractor.

One cannot always pass on all the responsibility to the contractor if in itself your project is dangerous -- like blasting in a populous place.

In such cases you have an extra duty to make sure to get skillful and responsible independent contractors to do such work.

A man got an independent trucker to haul lumber. The trucker crashed into a car on the highway. The injured party sued both him and the lumber company and won. As a rule only the independent trucking con-

tractor would have to pay, but here the lumber company should have known that this trucker was reckless.

When you call in a plumber, repairman, or other independent contractor you must make your place safe for him to work in. You must tell him of any traps and hidden dangers (not obvious ones). Otherwise you may be liable to the contractor for any injuries to him or his workers.

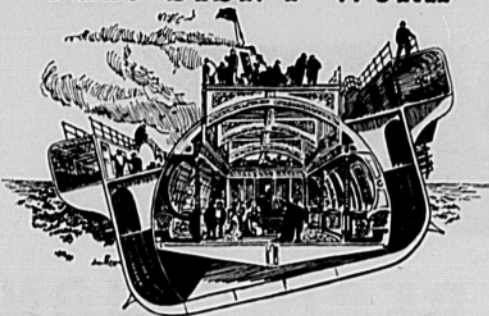

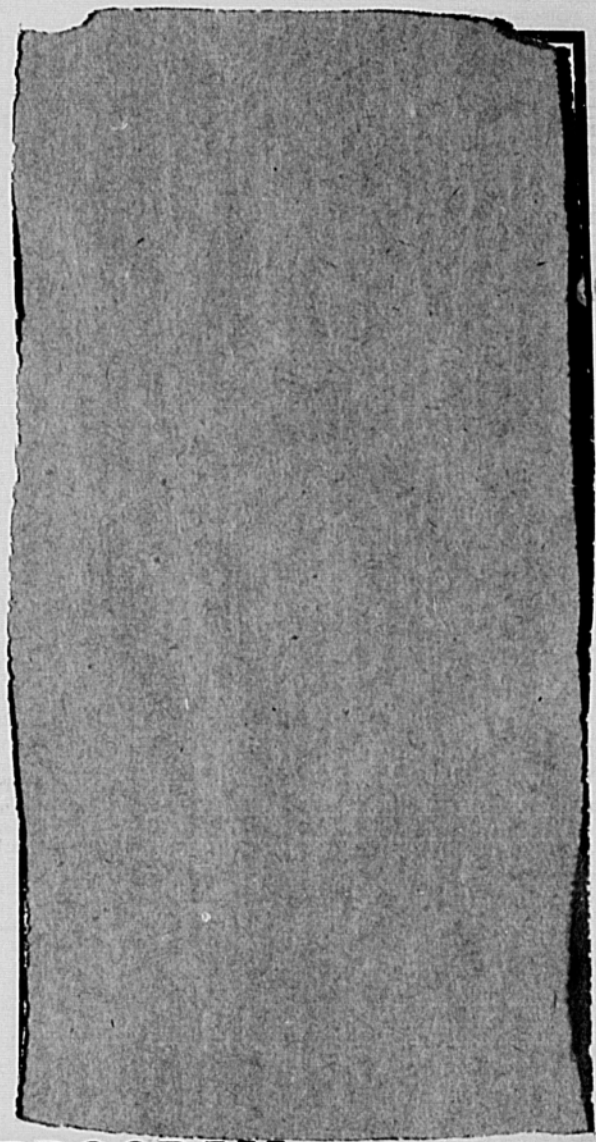

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About Your HEALTH

Helen Keller, the world's most famous blind citizen, has said, "If one tenth of the money we now spend to support unnecessary blindness were spent to prevent it, society would be the gainer in terms of cold economy, not to mention considerations of the happiness of humanity." Any such attempt to prevent

blindness must begin with accidental eye injuries incurred in the home, in the factory, and on the farm.

Statistics indicate that the United States annually has over 300,000 accidents which involve damage to the eyes. This amounts to an accident every 30 seconds or 1000 accidents per 8-hour work day throughout the year.

It has also been estimated that the average period of disability for an eye injury is 15 weeks, in comparison with an average of five weeks for all accidents affecting other parts of the body, and that more eyes are lost from these accidents than are legs, hands and feet combined.

A national health survey has shown that occupational injuries are responsible for 20 percent of all cases of blindness in one eye and eight percent of all cases of blindness in both eyes. The tool of national efficiency caused by industrial blindness is readily apparent in the annual loss of a staggering 53,760,000 man hours - the equivalent of 26,880 full-time employees.

Accidents in the home, most of which could be prevented, account for another large percentage of eye injuries. National figures indicate that 18 percent of all cases of blindness in one eye and five percent of all cases of blindness in both eyes due to all causes were the results of accidents in the home.

Finally, accident as the result of play and games at school add to the grim total. More than a thousand children lost the sight of one or both eyes each year. It is estimated that 95 percent of these accidents are preventable, given adequate eye-testing, adequate illumination and if proper precaution were taken.

"It would seem incredible," says one leading eye surgeon, "that this astonishing waste of resources should be allowed to go on in any economy-minded country."

Question and Answers . . .

Q—I am a veteran on the VA pension rolls. I have been awarded food, clothing and shelter following the recent storms that damaged my home on the coast. Now, I hesitate to accept funds for the restoration of my house because they would raise my income above the limit permissible to draw my pension.

A—Any assistance in the nature of restoration of housing, food, clothing, shelter, medical care, etc., to victims of disasters is not considered as income for the purpose of determining the eligibility to a VA pension.

Q—May two or more periods of marriage between the same two people be tacked together so as to satisfy the marital requirement "for five or more years" when a widow seeks pension?

A—No. Where a woman and a veteran were married and divorced and married to each other again after which he died, only the date of their last marriage is considered in determining whether the widow of the veteran comes with the requirement relating to marriage "for

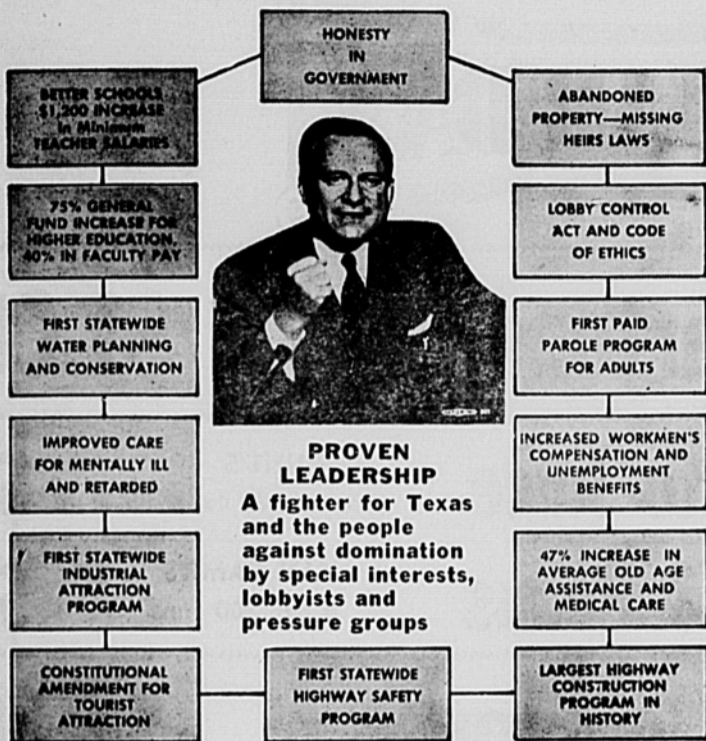
five or more years."

Q—My husband was killed in service during World War II. If our son is eligible for the War Orphans Education program, at what age could he qualify?

A—The age period generally is between 18 and 23, but there are exceptions. The benefit may be provided for children under 18 if they have graduated from high school or if they are above the age of compulsory school attendance and the VA finds it

would be to their best advantage to begin schooling before reaching 18. Some handicapped children may begin a special vocation or restorative course as early as age 14. Please get in touch with the nearest VA regional office for details on eligibility, vocational counseling and application for enrollment.

Mental Health Week April 29 - May 5

It is high time that Texas, a state which likes to consider itself a leader in many things but has found itself in the lower fourth of the states in provision of Mental Health Services, can point to two firsts in the services it provides to 900,000 Texans with emotional disorders who are in need of treatment.

Opening April 1 in Wichita Falls was Texas' first Regional Mental Health Center. Its major purpose will be to coordinate the work of ministers, general practitioners, school personnel, court personnel, public health nurses and other helping professions as their work relates to persons with emotional problems and their families. The Regional Mental Health Center first of 25 hoped for in the state, is primarily financed by the community with initial assistance from the state through the Texas State Department of Health.

Making treatment available as near to the patient and his family as possible is the cooperative arrangement developed among the El Paso County Hospital District, seven El Paso psychiatrists in private practice, and the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools. This will enable El Paso County citizens needing hospitalization to be treated in a 40 bed psychiatric unit in their county hospital rather than being transported over 300 miles to the nearest state hospital. Advantages to this are multiple: patients are in their home com-

State or Federal mail statutes had been violated in what he termed as fraudulent use of the term Legislative Service, as the return address on an envelope containing what Mr. Gibbens termed "scurrilous propaganda filled with half truths and innuendo."

Mr. Gibbens accused interests outside the district of beginning a smear campaign designed to discredit him in his campaign for election. He accused

Austin lobbyists of using the name of a respected legislative service in their efforts to give their charges a "false veil of truth."

He said that District Attorney Jack Neal of Graham and Federal Postal Inspector L. H. Stephens of Fort Worth, had been contacted and asked to investigate the matter, and that both had agreed to do so.

The mailing piece in question contained what was purported

to be the voting records on the so-called horse racing bill and the Carling Beer Bill, and contained the return address of Legislative Service, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas. Mr. Gibbens said that Mr. Walter Long, head of the Texas Legislative Service in Austin denied any knowledge of the mailing.

Education Privileges Granted By Congress

One of the five major misunderstandings - or a combination of them -- seems to keep eligible children of deceased servicemen from applying for the educational privileges granted them by Congress, according to Edward F. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas.

1. The fact that one party still

lives makes some children believe they do not qualify as "orphans."

For this benefit, an "orphan" is a child whose veteran-parent is dead as the result of a wound, accident or illness, attributable to service in the Armed Forces.

2. The fact that the dead parent had no wartime service makes others believe they are ineligible.

If the veteran-parent's death resulted from the performance of duty or from extra-hazardous service during peacetime, the child is eligible.

3. The fact that they are married makes some believe they are no longer "children."

Marriage does not affect eligibility. Any son or daughter of a serviceman, whose death is attributable to his service, is eligible for the educational benefits provided he or she is between 18 or 23 years of age. (There are even exceptions to these age limits and full details may be obtained at any VA office.)

4. The fact that their living parent, usually their mother, has remarried and their stepfather has legally adopted them, makes some children believe they are ineligible.

The marriage of the parent and the subsequent adoption does not affect the eligibility of the children.

5. The fact that many children do not wish, nor are prepared, for education at the college level makes some believe they cannot take advantage of this benefit.

Although training for a high school diploma is not permitted, eligible children may take vocational courses and other non-college training that will help them earn a living.

VA officials will be glad to explain the War Orphans Educational Program in detail to children or parents at any time.

There are 41,500 children in the nation who have already taken or who are now taking advantage of this program.
