Tuesday's GISD budet sessiona public hearing brought forth a budget of \$535,653 for '60-'61. It's divided as follows:

Teachers \$317,442, administration, \$25,000, Instruction \$327 642 Health services \$3620, Pupil transportation \$34,500, Operation of plant \$24,500 Maintenance of plant \$11,500, fixed charges (ins. intrest, etc.) \$7600, Capital outlay \$10,000 Debt service \$91,021.

Expected revenue: local, \$105, 248, County, \$405, state \$348000 Federal \$42000 Non-revenue (short term loans) \$40,000

County Budget

... Budget for Coryell County is \$35,991 for 1961, and is due for adop'ion late in August. It's about \$22000 SMALLER than this year due to the fact that county crews do no more road, dirt, or gravel work for private firms and individuals.

The budget is available for inspection at County Clerk A. W. Ellis' office, and the formeal hearing will be Aug. 22, after which it will be adopted.





Wood For Fuel

Almost everyone enjoys the cozy heat of a fireplace in the winter and each of us prefers a certain kind of fuel wood for his fire.

General freferences of long standing frequently lead to mismember of Sigma Alpha Epsilon conceptions regarding wood such fraternity, he is a 1953 graduate as the notion that oak and other hardwoods have a higher fuel value than pine. Such is ont the case In fact pine, pound for pound, will generate more heat than the hardwoods. However the heat from the resinous woods prduces a hot, quick fire which consumes the wood and releases heat quickly. As a result it is diffiiult to maintain a uniform temperaturee when burning resinous woods because the heat is intense at first and then quickly cool.

The denser hardwoods take longer to ignite and while burning

release their heat more slowly than pine. Lon experience has taught us to start fires with pine and maintain hem wih hickory, oak, or similar hardwood species.



Thus ended a 25 year struggle by the American Medical Association and other health groups to have poisonous substances so labeled. This law declares that any hazardous product not so labeled is liable to seizure and its manufacturer can be fined \$3000 and jailed for a year.
