



Painting Tips

The peasure of newly painted property is sometimes marred by early paint failure. Frequently, this is nether the cause of the painer nor the painter. Several simpl rules applicable o th epaintng on woden surfaces will usually assure satisfactory resuts.

1. The proper type and quality of paint should be used for the specific job

2. Manufacturers instruction s relating to preparing the painting surface, mixing the paint, prime coats and methods of application should be carefully followed.

3. Painting is undesirable during temperatures under 40 degrees or over 90. A wrinkled surface generally occurs.

4. Repainting should be done before the old paint has worn sufficietly to expose the wood surfac

5. Do ot repaint too frequently. The paint film becomes excessively thick and brittle and cracks and peels easily. A good pain job shoul last for 4 to 6 years.

6. If paint is applied scantily by brushing on too thin a film or by using excessive paint thinner, the paint wlll chalk and wear off

7. If paint is applied too genously it will present a wrinkled, y appearance.

8. The surface to be painted should be smooth and free of dust, dirt, mildew and loose flaky paint.

9. Do not paint moist surfaces, nor dry surfaces in moist weather.







Vritten for the Associated Press BRYAN, Tex., Aug. 18 (AP) he Brazos Valley of Texas looks ke the Blue Grass Country of Centucky. And in the fields of the brazos are Ponies of theAmericas. he breed has mushroomed into opularity and is giving the Bryan rea a new industry.

Of all the Ponies of Americas n the United States, a disproporionately large number are in Texas. The largest group in Texas s in Brazos and Burleson counies, with some others in adjoining Robertson and Milam Counties.

The Pony of Americas popularly s called an Indian pony. It is a strikingly marked animal, larger than a Shetland pony but smaller than a horse. The white, spotted "blanket" is the most distinguishing mark. Other identifications are striped hoofs, mottled noses and eyes showing whites.

Among full-sized horses, these are the marks known as the Appalossa strain. Some full-sized Appaloosa horses are also bred in the Bryan area.

The Pony of the Americas is first recorded as being used by Ghengis Khan, Emperor of the the Mongols, and his chief officers. Lesser officers rode solid coloreed animals, which otherwise were very similar.

The Breed spread through North Afrila, was used by the Moors in honquering Spain and later by the Conquistadores in conquering Mexico and Peru.

In Central America the animals eventually were turned loose to grow wild in an area where horses previously had been unknown.

The pony became popular several years ago but the supply was

Breerers were trying to recreate the Indian pony by crossing Appaloosa horses with Shetland or Welsh ponies.

The late Clay Dunn of Burleson County is credited with starting a program by which the original breed is being renewed. Strikingly colored stallions are bred to solidcolored mares imported from the muntains of Mexico.



It was from the wife of his old friend, Jerome Bridges, the veteran Washington correspondent. 'Jerry's been killed, she sobbed.

Rushing to the Bridges' residence, Haledjian was met by the bereaved woman.

'Jerry hasn't been well - but he never would have committed suicide. I know he wouldn't!" she exclaimed.

The body of the newspaperman lay on his bed. Blood stained the pillow from the wound in his left temple. A small pistol was on the carpet near his left hand.

"I found this on the bureau," said Eleanor Bridges. "It resembles his handwriting, but he didn't write it! Not Jerry!"

Haledian read the brief note: "I shall miss this wonderful town, the sight of the Capital dome, the great pulse of the government at work, the loveliness of the cherry blosoms in bloom. Forgive me, Eleanor, but the pain has become unbearable.

"Jerry was a fearless journalist," said Haledjian. 'He made a lot of friends, and a lot of enemies. What kind of writing was he engaged in at the moment?

"Exposing the labor racketeers," replied Mrs. Bridges. 'He told me
