ARMYWORMS ARE HERE AGAIN

## A small destroyer is again mak

 ing himself felt in Texas. Armyworms are attacking grasses and forage crops. In some cases ther may be more than one kind of armyworm involved. The three spe cies involved all tru armyworms and beet armyworms. Fall armyworms are the major species attacking grass crops The larvae do not becove conspicuous until they are nearlygrwon. Young larvae feed near the ground at first and are not generto 1.5 inches long. Thess young larvae do not consume the entire leaf of the food plant but skeletonize them, leaving the veins and ribs This type of damage causes whitisa areas to appear in lawns ed feeding of the worm occurs. Fulkgrown larvae are atout 1.5 inches long and may be identified by the presence of theprominent by the presencewhite inverted $Y$ on the front of the head. On the back there arethree yellowish white hair lines. running from head to wide there isank stripe, and next to it io an equally wide, somewhat yellow wavy stripe tinted with red.
