



Whether it's split bamboo, solid or hollow fiber glass-a fishing, rod that works well is an angler's pride and joy.

A good rod can make casting easy and prevent snapped lines and lost fish by cushioning the impact of a strike or sudden lunge.

Today, modern fiber glass rods have pretty much replaced bamboo. A few old-timers still wield split bamboo, and some anglers argue that it provides more "feel", but the fact is that 98 per cent of today's anglers use lighter, more durable, and less expensive fiber glass.



The pro's and con's of hollow vs. solid fiber glass are best understood if one premise is kept firmly in mind—the rod should do the work. The stiff-ness and taper determine HOW the rod works; the construction of the rod determines HOW

WELL it works. Among the most respected hollow fiber glass, rods are those made by Garcia-Conolon in Costa Mesa, Calif. 'These "Companion" rods are made of spun giss; woyen into a gauzelike fabric. The fabric is shaped

a jeweler's ring sizer. The shape of the mandril determines

to a jeweler's ring sizer. The shape of the mandril determines the shape or taper of each rod. When the mandril is removed following a heat bonding process, the hollow shaft is ready for finishing and polishing. Grips and hardware are then added


The fabric-like weave of the hollow rod insures strength and resilience.

While solid glass rods are made similarly of fine spun glass threads, these are not woven but stretched lengthwise, bound. and cut to size.

When the heat bonding is completed, the rod resembles elec-tric cable. The taper of a solid glass rod is ground into the cylinder of bonded fiber glass.

Although slightly more expensive than solid, the hollow fiber glass rod with its interwoven construction provides greater resilience. It works better because it is hollow.

resilience. It works better because it is hollow. Picture a rod bending to a strike. The outside arc stretches while the inside or underneath is compressed. This stretching and compressing takes place throughout the cross section of the rod The core of the solid rod both stretches and compresses—it works against itself. It is not working for the angler. by providing more resilience for the extra weight. When buying a rod, heft it in your hand, feel the balance and action. Find an action such as a fast taper tip that suits your style of casting, and remember to balance the rod to the type of fishing you plan. With too much rod you can't feel the fish--with too little, you can't land him.












### WHAT PRICE GOLD STOCKS?

In the past two and one-half years monetary gold stocks have flowed out of this country at a faster rate than at any time in the last 50 years. The general feeling seems to be that higher interest

rates abroad are attracting gold from this country, but this may not be necessarily so in that we were having a significant inflow of gold from 1945 to 1949 when interest rates were at their postwar lows. More logically it would appear that the outflow of gold has been caused because a balance of trade less favorable to the United States exists and that currently there is somewhat less confidence in the United States investments as compared to those abroad.

Today some drastic steps must eventually be taken to arrest the outflow of gold. Reduction of foreign aid might effectively slow down the loss of gold, but at the same time such a step could have dangerous effects on our relationships with the countries abroad that are on the fringe of going Communistic. Tariffs and quotas could be created, but undoubtedly these would be opposed by foreign countries through prompt and similar retaliation.



Therefore, as present evidence points towards further movement of gold out of this country and as investors come to believe more and more that it will be necessary for the United States to raise the price of gold (a step which is not inevitable but is a possibility in the distant future), there should be a continuing investment interest in gold stocks.

In the past couple of years Dome Mines and Campbell Red Lake have performed the best marketwise of the listed gold mining stocks and therefore perhaps may be regarded most representative of the gold mining group. How-ever, *Homestake*, perhaps the most conservative of the group, also has substantial uranium interests; McIntyre-Porcupine has a large investment portfolio and Hollin-ger Consolidated offers investors a participation in Canadian iron ore. We feel that these stocks are also worthy of consideration.





A reel performs only according to the care it receives.

This adage, says the Evinrude Boating Foundation, should mean plenty to every good fisherman, especially the salt water enthusiast. There are dozens of reels on the market for all types of fishing, however it is up to each individual fisherman to keep his reel performing properly. Fresh water anglers have it a lot


easier than salt water zealots. An angler in fresh water country need only dab his reel with grease and oil a few times a season ... according to the amount of fishing he does. I usually give my reel a thorough cleaning after four or five outings. Some say it's too often, some say not often enough. One thing I can say and that's I've never had any trouble with it! Most reels—fresh and salt water of

all kinds, are anodized, scaled and plated with special enamels to give maximum protection against salt water and hard use. All salt water reels, however, should be cleaned with fresh water after every onling to assure maximum protection.

When overhauling your reel, use a light machine oil and a good, light grease manufactured by a well-known tackle company. Don't use vaseline. It has a tendency to gum the gears and make your reel stick. Clean the gears and other internal parts with kerosene and a small paint or tooth brush before

Take good care of all of your equip-ment and it will last a long time—esially your reel.


