Rats are one of the most destructive and dangerous pests to have around a farm or ranch. They contaminate stored gran and exposed feed they kill poultiv and young livestock, and the start fires. Disease suche as le tospirosis, contagious abortico, trichinosis, distemper, atropl rhinitis, plague, typhus, salmone'l food poisoning and ratbite fever are carried from place to place by these pests.

The rat population on v place can be controlled, howe if you will put forth a little and effort. An extensive sanit program coupled with the no anti-coagulant baits, will effect ly control the rat populati Once the rats have been eliminated ed, a small number of perman baits and continued sanitation v. prevent reinfestation.

As long as there are rats in the area however, your farm or ran is in constant danger of becom infester. If sufficient interest is indicated your county agent and assist you and your neighbors in a county control program. Such progfams are far more effective than localized, one-farm operations.





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
