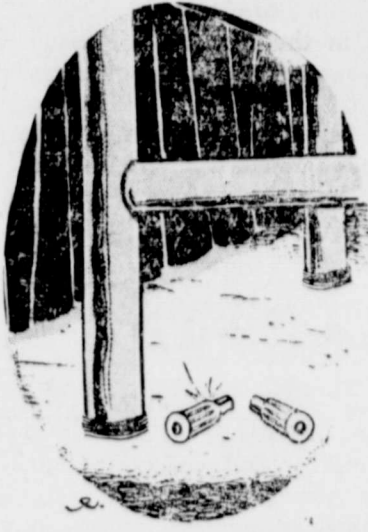

Two metallic objects glinted on the green grass by McKay's cot.

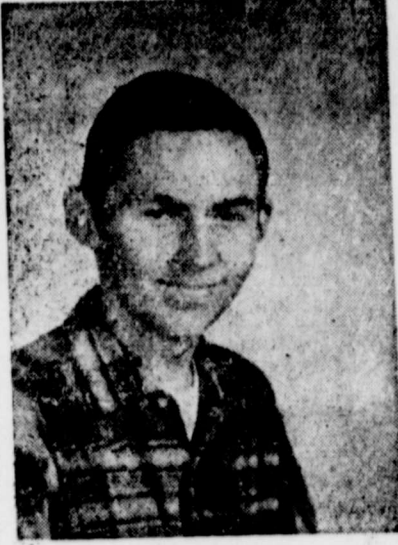
In killing Reynolds," said Haledjian. "You can take us to McKay now, sheriff. He's going to need a new alibi!"

MAYOR DAN McNEIL GIVES REASONS FOR OPPOSING \$3,000 FOR COMMUNITY CENTER

The City Council voted to donate a \$3000 to Coryell County Community Center expansion project. In a prepared statement addressed to the Council, Mayor McNeil recommended that the request for the funds be denied. In opposing the request, Mayor McNeil stated: "I agree that this project is a worthwhile and needed one, and in opposing the donation of these funds to it it is not my desire to hold back or retard Gatesville's progress in any way. I believe that the City Council of Gatesville can best serve the people and further the growth of Gatesville commercially, industrially and otherwise by first providing those services and needs of the people that we are primarily obligated to provide. There are a number of projects which are more urgent. He stated further that he thought the taxpayers of Gatesville had already contributed that and in the past years the City Council had already donated over \$5000 to the Center and furthermore all the city's taxpayers are also county taxpayers and the County had been a heavy contributor to the Center.

The City Council ignored the recommendation and voted unanimously to donate \$3,000.

The City Council authorized Mayor McNeil to enter into a contract with Reeves and Gregory, Consulting Engineers, for a survey of water and sewer facilities of the city.

Mayor McNeil suggested that the City employ another man in the street department to operate the street sweeper so that the downtown streets could be swept every night and the residential streets once or twice a month.

Action was deferred on the purchase of a new police car, and pavement of Straws Mill Road to the City Limits was authorized.

Co. Agent News

Rats are one of the most destructive and dangerous pests to have around a farm or ranch. They contaminate stored grain and exposed feed they kill poultry and young livestock, and they start fires. Disease such as leptospirosis, contagious abortion, trichinosis, distemper, atrophic rhinitis, plague, typhus, salmonella food poisoning and rat bite fever are carried from place to place by these pests.

The rat population on your place can be controlled, however, if you will put forth a little time and effort. An extensive sanitation program coupled with the use of anti-coagulant baits, will effectively control the rat population. Once the rats have been eliminated, a small number of permanent baits and continued sanitation will prevent reinfestation.

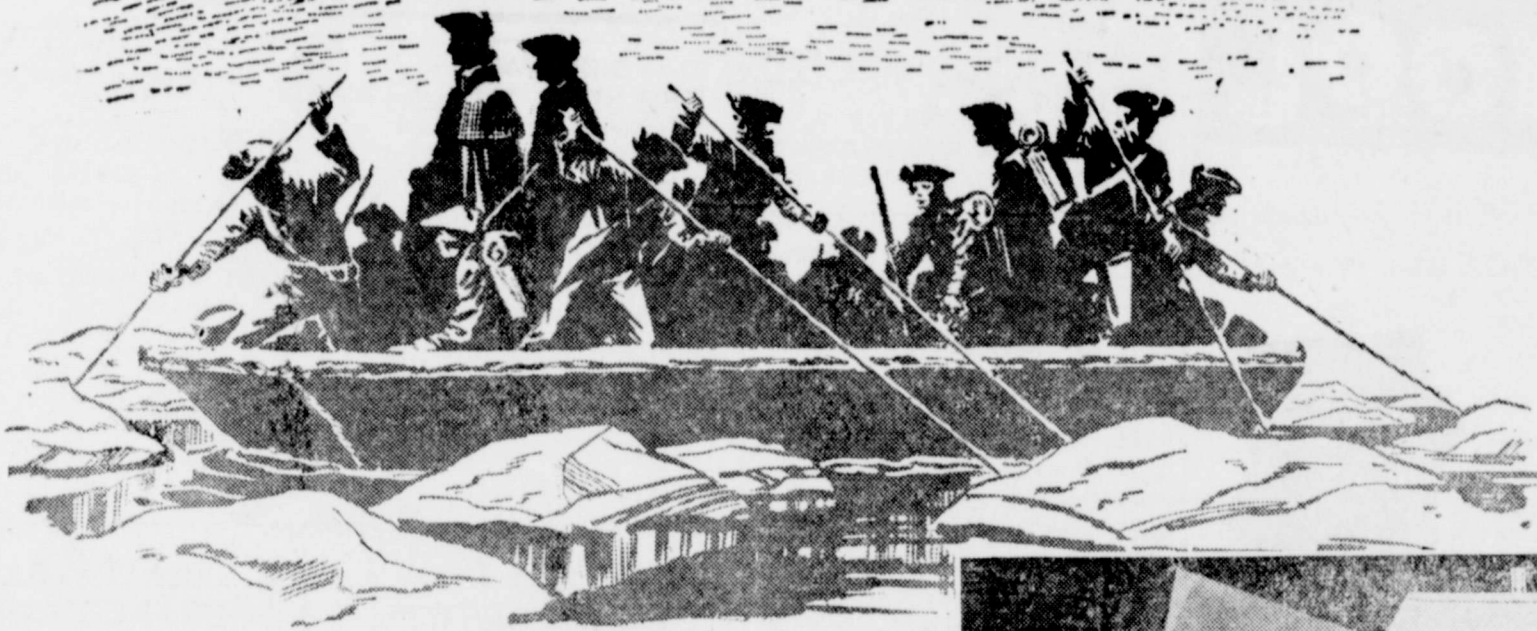
As long as there are rats in the area however, your farm or ranch is in constant danger of becoming infested. If sufficient interest is indicated your county agent can assist you and your neighbors in a county control program. Such programs are far more effective than localized, one-farm operations.

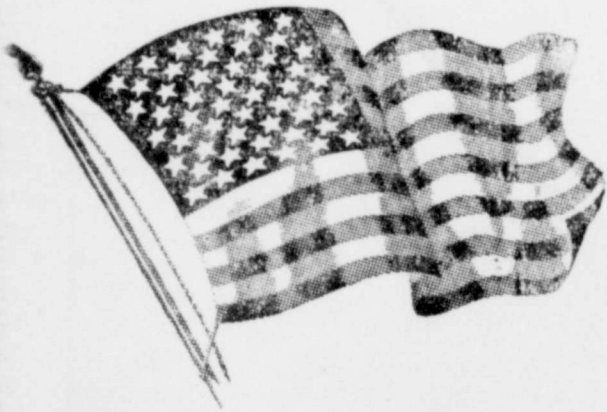

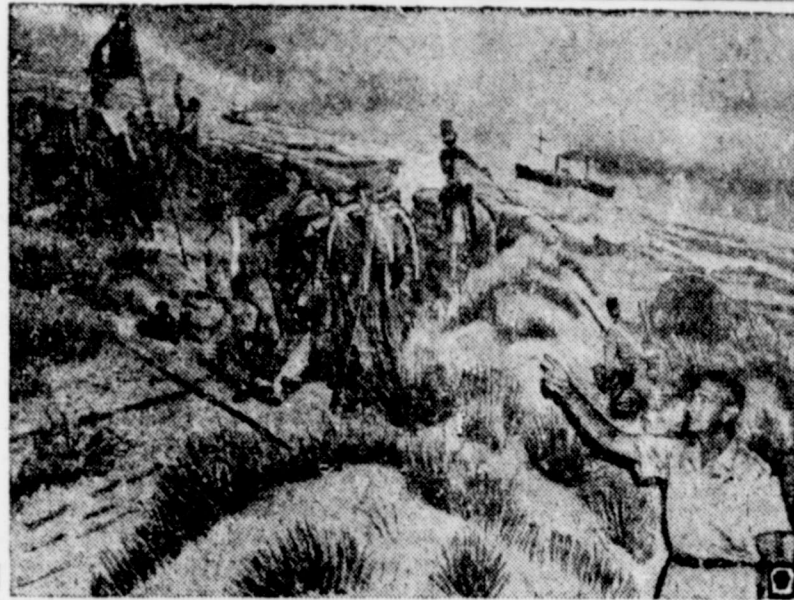
