**Co. Agent News**

Farmers are reminded that September 30 is the last day to file form 2240 for the refund on Federal tax on gasoline used on a farm for fiscal year 1959-60. Most farmers were mailed the form directly from the Internal Revenue Service.

If you have misplaced or destroyed your form or if you did not receive one, contact your County Agent's Office. There are ample forms available. If you have not sent your form in, be sure to remember that it must be done by the end of this month or you will lose the refund.

This summer, several Coryell County Ranchers have been assisting the Agriculture Research Service by sending in samples of screwworms found in livestock. The purpose of this statewide survey is to determine the possibility of a scroverm eradication program. The Service reports that the volume of samples has been steady with the heaviest infestation in Central and South Texas. Infestations in east and for west Texas continue to be light.
