Mrs. Jim Ed Pruner stepped off a bus in Houston recently and was hit by a car allegedly driven by a drunk. She was badly injured.

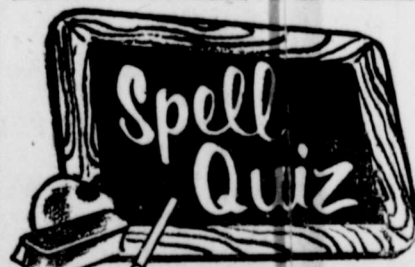

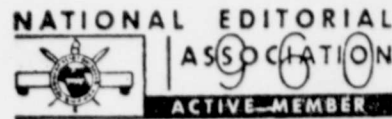

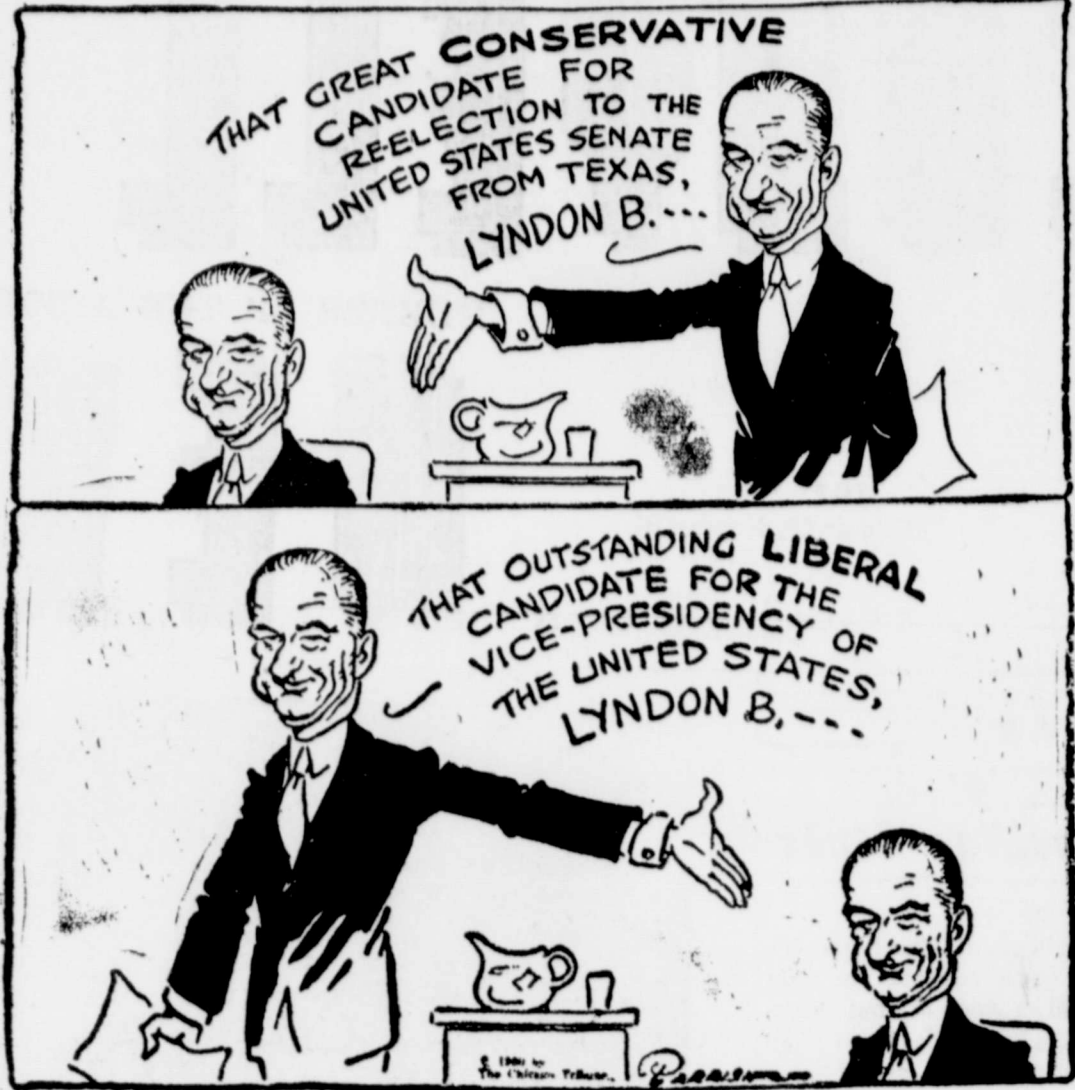

SAN CLEMENTE ISLAND, Calif. (FHTNC) - Charles D. Hitt, seaman, USN, son of X L. L. Hitt of Gatesville, serving aboard the tank landing ship USS Plummas County, is taking part in a joint Navy-Marine Corps amphibious training exercise at San Clemente Island, Calif.
