JAMES HOLLINGSWORTH II DIED 7-30 AM IN HOSPITAL FROM ACCIDENT

James F. Hollingsworth II, 16, son of Col. and Mrs. James F. Hollingsworth, died about 12:30 a. m. in Coryell Memorial Hospital following an accident around 6:30 Sunday evening.

Also, badly, if not critically injured in the accident was Keith Lane who was with Hollingsworth in an MG Sports Car which they were driving on the East Range Road at Henson Creek. They lost control, after hitting a rut or wash, and rolled several times in the creek. Lane has leg, back and arm injuries and is at Ft. Hood Hospital. Lane is a son of Col. and Mrs. Lane of Ft. Hood and is a member of Killbuck High School football team.

Hollingsworth had a deep gash on the back of his head and other injuries. They were brought to the hospital by Scott's ambulance, and a helicopter brought Army doctors and blood for transfusion from Ft. Hood, landing in Henson Stadium. An Army ambulance carried Lane back to the Post hospital. The MG was pronounced total, and investigation was conducted by Army MPs and other personnel.

Hollingsworth's body was taken to Chancellor-Young Funeral Home, Killeen. Arrangements have not been completed.

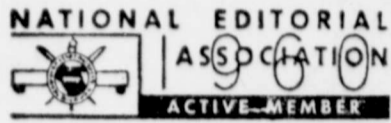

TEXAS DEMOCRATS FOR NIXON OPENS HEADQUARTERS: SHIVERS CHAIRMAN

AUSTIN, Oct. 4 — Texas Democrats for Nixon and Lodge open state headquarters here this week with former governor Allan Shivers as chairman.

Emphasizing the vast difference between the National Democratic platform and the state platform, Shivers said he does not believe that the Los Angeles document is in Texas' best interests.

"As I said in 1952," Shivers remarked. "When it comes to deciding between a party label and what's good for the people, I will vote for Texas."

The former governor reported that response to his Dallas television broadcast last week has been very great and enthusiastic, and he has received thousands of letters, telephone calls and telgrams from citizens endorsing his views.

Texas Democrats for Nixon and Lodge will conduct a vigorous campaign, Shivers said, promising that he will make many speeches and personal appearances throughout the state and in some other states.

Calling for help of all who are interested, Shivers repeated from his television speech the thought that "the name under which you work and vote is not important. We will gladly work with Volunteers for Nixon, Texans, for Nixon, Citizens for Nixon. We are all of these and more —!"

We are Americans exercising our right to stand for and vote for the leaders of our choice. Remember, in spite of specious arguments in spite of jibes and threats and synthetic appeals to 'party loyalty' — you have that right.

"You have that responsibility. You have that high and solemn duty."

NEW SECTION FOR LOCAL GUARD UNIT

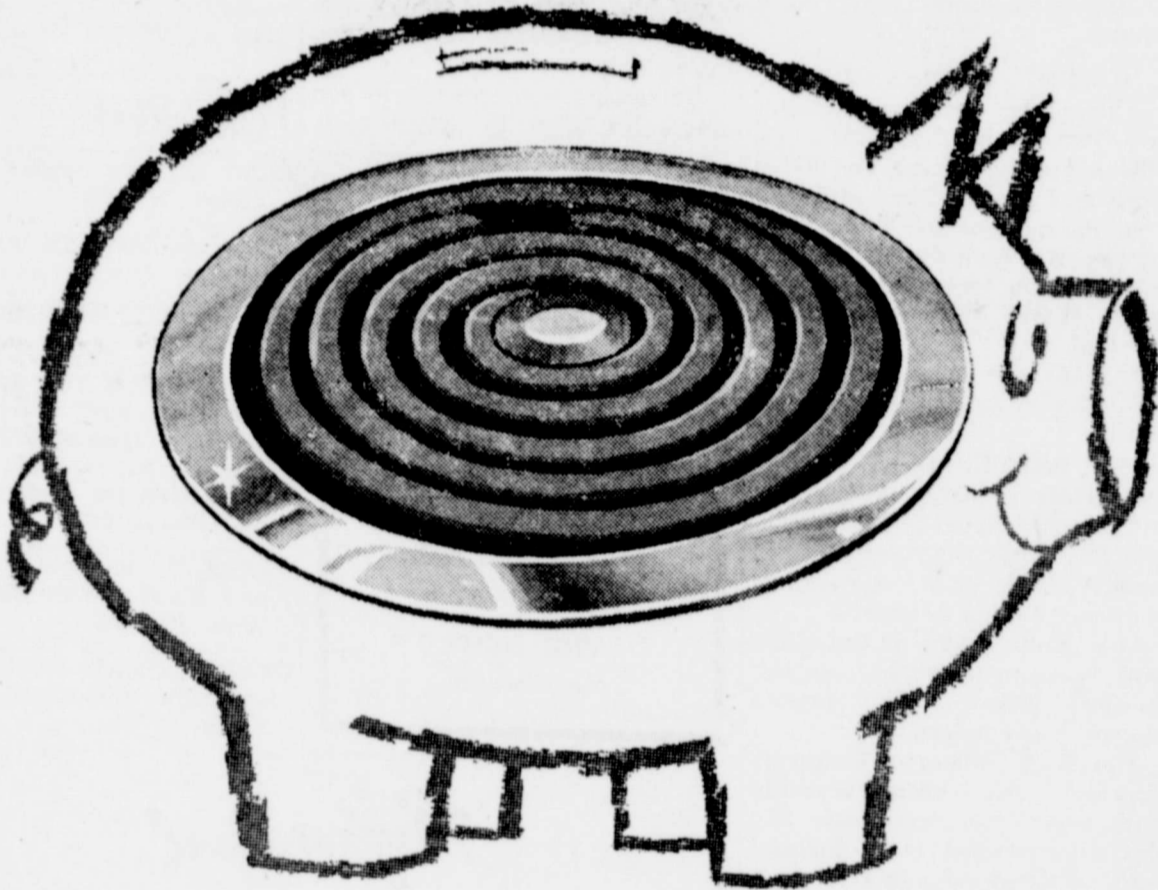
Gatesville's National Guard unit Company D, 949th Ordnance Battalion of the 49th armored division recently reached its full authorized strength of 104 officers and men.

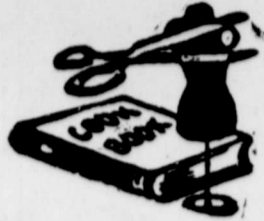

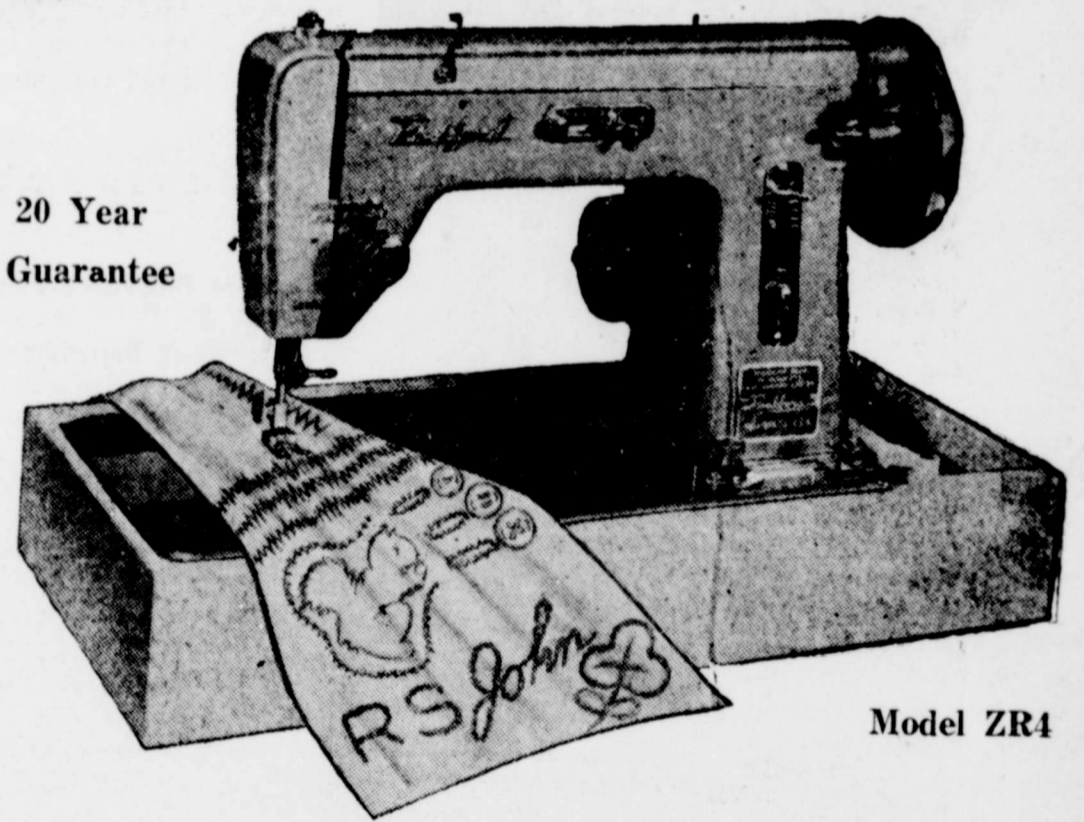
