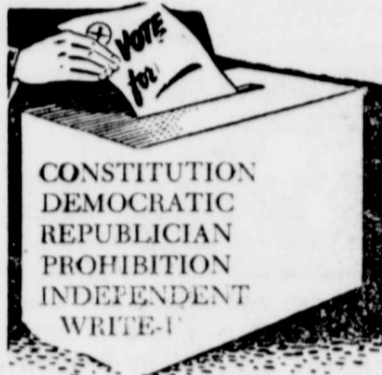

BREAD TRUCK AND PRIVATE AUTOMOBILE COLLIDE AT 7th & MAIN

About 2:10 a. m. Saturday, Clinton Dee Newton, Killeen Bobby Lee Williams, also of Killeen and an unnamed Ft. Hood soldier were in an accident with a Holsum bread truck at the corner of 7th and Main in Gatesville.
The truck, belonging to Holsum Bakery of Waco, was forced onto the sidewalk in front of The First National Bank of Gatesville, knocking off some tile on the bank wall, broke off a fire plug. The car skittered across the wet pavement, stopping near the courthouse lawn, according to a report in the Temple Daily Telegram.

Newton was reported recovering satisfactorily from bruises and broken ribs in Coryell Memorial Hospital, and the others were treated for minor injuries and released. Officers investigating, according to the Telegram story, didn't say what charges were filed. Damage to the vehicles was not given.

TEXAS SUPREME COURT TO RULE ON APPEAL OF JP CASE IN CORYELL COUNTY

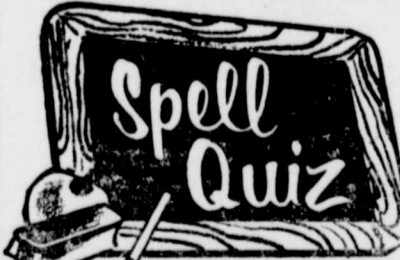

Donald Wayne Pruitt brought a \$975 damage suit against Turner when Turner refused the jury trial because Pruitt did not post a \$5 jury fee.
The court will hear the case on December 1.

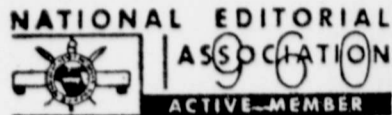

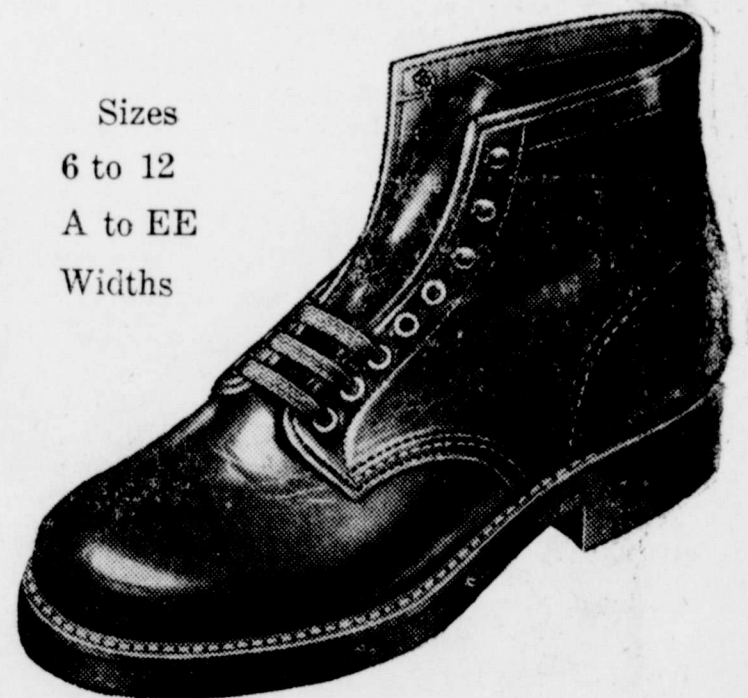
The "His" plane retails for \$149,000 and Her plane retails for only a mere \$27,000 and a simple little wrap the lady in the picture has goes for \$9,750.

2 #303 (1 lb.) cans water pack red cherries
 1 cup sugar
 4 tablespoons corn starch
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 2 teaspoons lemon juice
 1/2 package pie crust mix

Combine cherries, sugar, cornstarch, salt and cinnamon. Cook until thick and clear, stirring constantly. Add lemon juice. Pour into 6 individual dessert dishes. Prepare pie crust mix from package directions. Roll 1/8-in. thick. Cut out pumpkin faces. Bake in hot oven, 450° F., for 7 to 8 min. Place pumpkin face on each cherry dessert.
