## State Highway Dept. Announces New Work For Coryell County

Approval of the '61-'62 Consolidated Highway Program has been announced by Herbert C. Perry Jr, Chairman, Texas Highway Commission, for highways in Coryell County under this work schedules: U. S. 84 in Gatesville, Leon River East to State 36; reconstruction and widening pavement; a distance of approximately 1.7 miles.

U. S. 84 in Gatesville, State 36 East to East City Limit; reconstruction and widen grading, structures, and surfacing; a distance of approximatedly 0.8 mile.

U. S. 84 from East City Limit of Gatesville East to F. M. 1829 reconstruction and widen grading structures and surfacing; distance of about 6.7 mile.

Thomas C. Collier, Ditsret Engineer, THD, Waco has general supervision, and Paul T. Hensler, Senior Resident Engineer, will be in charge of work in this area.

The funds for the program are derived from Federal Aid Highway Funds on a dollar for dollar basis.

## FOUR FIFTY HEAR POAGE AND OTHERS AT FARM BUREAU MEETING

Monday evening, 31st, some 450 gathered at the Elementary School Auditorium for the discussion between Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage and Texas Farm Bureau, District 8.

Poage and Dr. Kendrick made initial talks, 15 minutes, Poage describing his views, and Kendrick, Farm Bureau policies.

Poage believes farmers should have more strict controls with 90 per cent support prices. The Farm Bureau view is the net income would be as big without the loss of freedom, and the government never gives without first taking away, and for each dollar cost of a government program, the farmer gets only 47c back.

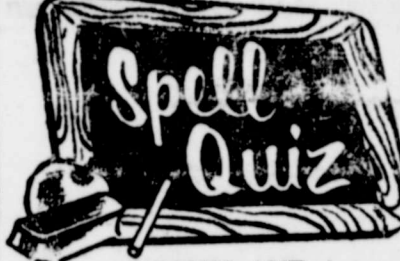
Poage contended they must give up "some freedom" to have reasonable prices for their products, and that others are subsidized, why not the farmer.

The meeting was open for questioning and some people asked questions of both Poage and Kendrick. Then, farmers and ranchers were given 3 minutes each to speak.

One farmer said, "Why talk about the Poage Bill, anyway? It comes up about every 4 years. It never had a chance to pass. It COULDN'T pass in a free country!"

O. G. Tumlinson, president, Milam County FB, said, "I know most of you who have spoken against Farm Bureau. You are only disgruntled because you are in the minority, and I include Mr. Poage in this number."

R. A. Hempel, president of Coryell County FB, closed the meeting and said: "If anyone is not satisfied with the FB policy they should get in and help make the policies. All FB policies are made by the membership, beginning at the county level and State policies are developed from resolutions for the counties, and National policies are developed from the State ones."

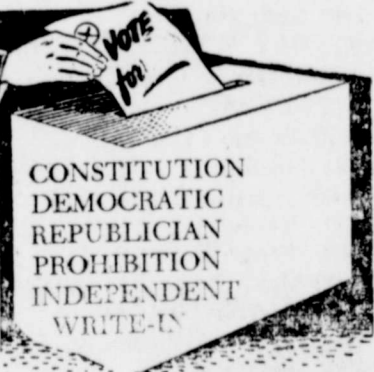

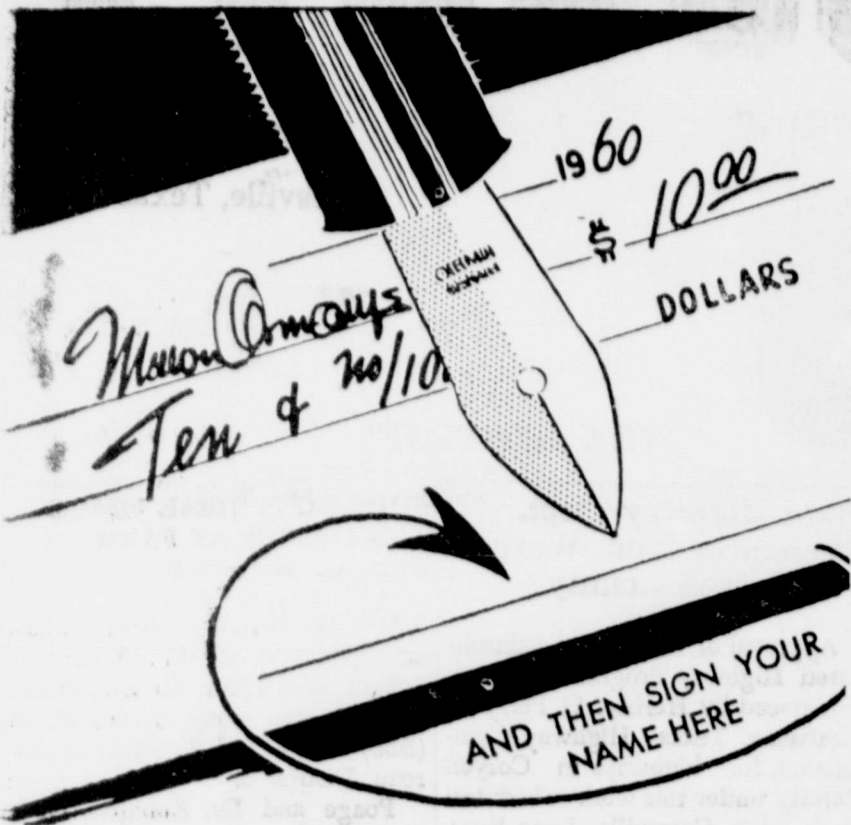

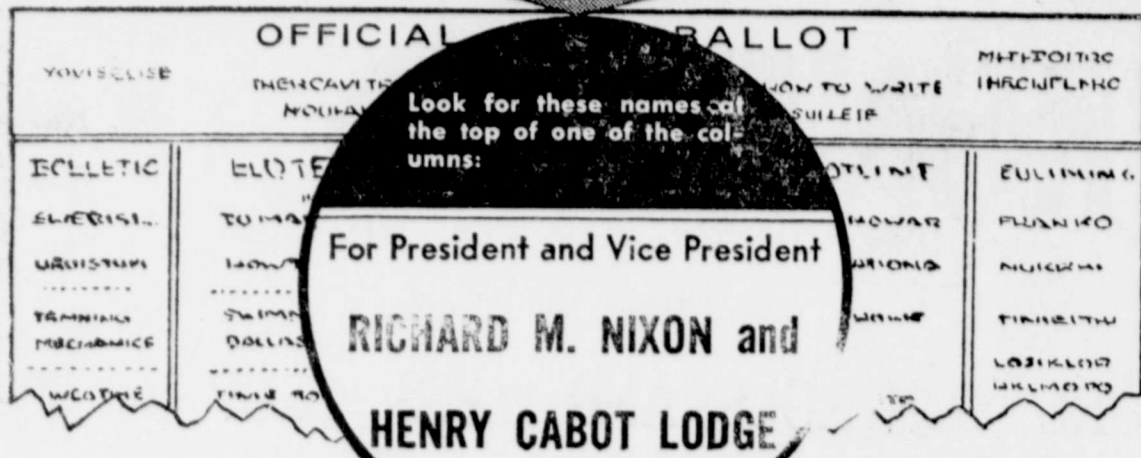

He spoke principally on the Forand Bill, and other bills aimed at socialized medicine, and pointed out these evils: It would incur tremendous cost to taxpayers; lower standards of medical care; overflow hospitals already overcrowded; throw enormous burdens on doctors by people who are not sick, but would say, "I have it coming to me; it won't cost me, anyway."

He said in Great Britain socialized medicine is costing over 2 billion annually, and doctors have 200 or more patients daily. If medical care for 16 million old people were attached to social security, we would soon be paying social security tax of 20, 25 or 30 percent. There is no such thing as free medical care. Someone has to pay.

Farm Bureau opposes the Forand Bill and other similar bills.

Blanchard, who has been in the Navy eight years, has served the last six aboard the Sproston. While aboard he has served under four commanding officers and has seen the entire crew change. "There is not a man aboard now who was there when I first reported to her for duty," Blanchard said.

When she left Pearl Harbor on October 17, Blanchard was on hand not only to say goodby to his shipmates but to cast off the last mooring line, thus putting her officially at sea.

Blanchard will remain in the Pearl Harbor area as a master-at-arms at the Submarine Base.

He is the son of X John I. Blanchard of Rt. 1, Gatesville. He attended Gatesville High School.
